10.2.1 Proposals for new and amended postgraduate courses**10.2.1.1 Faculty of Architecture, Design and Planning****(1) Master of Architecture***pages F6-F8*

The Faculty of Architecture, Design and Planning is proposing to amend the honours requirements for the Master of Architecture. The current resolutions of the degree require students to commence participation in the honours stream from the second semester of this four semester degree. This means the Faculty does not have an adequate indication of the likelihood of a student being able to gain honours at the point of admission to the stream.

The proposed change will mean that students are admitted to the honours stream in their final semester when the Faculty will have a very good indication of their academic achievements. It also has the advantage of allowing honours students greater flexibility with elective choices.

The streams of the MURP are taken as electives. The streams do not have separate CRICOS codes or Course codes. The streams represent 18 credit points in a 72 credit point Masters degree.

The Faculty of Engineering and Information Technologies is proposing to amend the Master of Project Management (MPM) for new students and also to provide a transitional pathway for existing MPM students to transfer to the new MPM in 2009. This proposal is aimed at offering candidates the opportunity to specialise in a particular area of practice or to elect to have a general MPM without specialisations. The following MPM Specialisations are proposed: (i) Project Economics Management; (ii) Project Planning and Scheduling Management; (iii) Global Project Management; (iv) Project Procurement Management; (v) Project Risk/Disaster Management; (vi)

Project Quality Management; and, (vii) Strategic Project Management Implementation.

Currently, the Dissertation unit of study for the Honours component of the Master of Exercise and Sport Science (Clinical Exercise Science) and Master of Exercise and Sport Science (Sport Performance) is 12 credit points. The change to a 24cp Research Dissertation is consistent with the recommendation from Provost's working parties, to provide students with research pathway options and a capstone research experience. In addition, the change allows alignments between all Exercise and Sport Science Masters degrees.

Resolutions of the Faculty

Master of Architecture

The Resolutions of the Faculty relating to the Master of Architecture in the Faculty of Architecture, Design and Planning are amended, with effect from 1 January 2009, as follows (additions indicated by underlined, deletions indicated by strikethrough):

Master of Architecture

1. Admission

1.1 An applicant for admission to candidature for the degree of Master of Architecture shall have:

1.1.1 completed all the requirements for the degree of Bachelor of Design in Architecture or such other equivalent degree as the Faculty may approve and have achieved a Weighted Average Mark of at least 65.

1.1.2 completed the units of study shown as prerequisites for the Master of Architecture in the table of units of study for the Bachelor of Design in Architecture degree, if proceeding to candidature from the Bachelor of Design in Architecture; and

1.1.3 satisfied the Architectural Experience Requirement.

1.2 Pursuant to 1.1.3 above, an applicant for admission to the Master of Architecture may satisfy the Architectural Experience Requirement by the date of enrolment,

1.2.1 by completing the requirements for award of the degree of Bachelor of Design in Architecture with honours; or,

1.2.2 by completing professional work experience as an employee in architecture (minimum of 630 hours recorded in the Architects Accreditation Council of Australia (AACA) Log Book); or

1.2.3 by admission to an approved University of Sydney international exchange for the first semester of enrolment; or

1.2.4 by completing professional work experience in an approved related industry (minimum of 630 hours appropriately recorded); or

1.2.5 by completing field study in relation to architecture (including, but not limited to, international field study), appropriately documented to the satisfaction of the Faculty; or

1.2.6 by a combination of methods described in 1.2 above.

2. Units of study

2.1 The units of study which may be taken for the degree are set out in the Table M, the table of units of study for the Master of Architecture, together with:

2.1.1 credit point values;

2.1.2 assumed knowledge, corequisites and prerequisites;

2.1.3 the semesters in which they are offered;

2.1.4 the units with which they are mutually exclusive; and

2.1.5 designation as core or elective.

3. Requirements for the Master of Architecture

3.1 To be eligible for award of the Master of Architecture a candidate must complete successfully units of study giving credit for a total of 96 credit points, including:

3.1.1 78 credit points from the core units of study, and

3.1.2 18 credit points from the elective units of study.

4. Requirements for the Master of Architecture with honours

4.1 To be admitted to the honours program a candidate must have a Weighted Average Mark of at least ~~75 in coursework completed to date within the degree~~ 80 over a minimum of 72 credit points, including three research studios.

4.2 To be eligible for the award of honours a candidate must complete 96 credit points including: 24 credit points from designated honours units of study listed in Table M and

4.2.1 three research studios;

4.2.2 one honours report;

4.2.3 one honours studio;

4.2.4 the remaining specified core and elective units of study of the pass degree; and

4.2.5 achieve a Weighted Average Mark of at least 80 in all units of study attempted for the degree.

~~4.1.1 achieve a mark of at least 75 in each honours unit of study; and~~

4.3 Candidates who do not achieve a Weighted Average Mark of at least 80 shall be awarded the degree at the level merited.

4.4 A student awarded the degree with honours shall lodge with the Faculty one copy of the Honours Advanced Study Report bound and printed to the standards specified for a Doctor of Philosophy thesis, for retention in the Faculty library.

5. Award of the degree

5.1 The Master of Architecture degree shall be awarded to a candidate who has completed the requirements of the degree as specified in resolution 3.

5.2 The degree shall be awarded in three grades:

5.2.1 Honours, with a Weighted Average Mark of at least 80 and additional compliance with resolution 4;

5.2.2 Pass with Merit, with a Weighted Average Mark of at least 75; or

5.2.3 Pass, with a Weighted Average Mark below 75.

[Section 2]

6. Cross institutional enrolment

6.1 Provided that permission has been obtained in advance, the Dean may permit a student to complete a unit of study at another institution and have that unit credited to his or her course requirements, provided that:

6.1.1 the unit of study content is not taught in any corresponding unit of study in the University; or

6.1.2 the student is unable for good reason to attend a corresponding unit of study at the University; and

6.1.3 the total credit points does not exceed the maximum allowable credit for the course.

7. Restrictions on enrolment

7.1 A candidate may not enrol in units of study with a total value of more than 30 credit points in any one semester.

7.2 Candidates may not enrol in undergraduate units of study.

7.3 A candidate for the degree shall normally maintain a full-time enrolment of at least 18 credit points per semester.

8. Suspension of candidature

8.1 Unless suspension of candidature has been approved, a student is required to re-enrol each calendar year.

8.2 A student who has completed units of study may, with approval, suspend candidature for up to two semesters. At the end of that time the student may reapply to extend the suspension for a maximum of another two semesters. After that time, or if extension is denied, the candidature will be deemed to have lapsed and the student shall be required to reapply for admission to the degree.

9. Re-enrolment after an absence

9.1 Except where the Dean determines otherwise, a student who re-enrols after an absence or a suspension of candidature for any period shall proceed under the by-laws and resolutions in force at the time of re-enrolment.

10. Satisfactory progress

10.1 The Faculty requires students to demonstrate satisfactory progress with their studies.

10.2 A student may be deemed not to have made satisfactory progress in any semester if the student:

10.2.1 fails to complete at least half the credit points in which he/she is enrolled; or

10.2.2 obtains a WAM of less than 50 based on units of study for a given semester; or

10.2.3 fails a unit of study for the second time; or

10.2.4 has an unsatisfactory attendance record; or

10.2.5 is unable to complete the degree in the maximum time permitted.

10.3 A student who fails to demonstrate satisfactory progress in any semester of enrolment may be considered to fall into the "Students at Risk" category and will be subject to the procedures of University policy on Identifying and Supporting Students at Risk.

10.4 A student who has been identified as being at risk on three consecutive instances will normally be called upon to show good cause why he or she should be allowed to re-enrol in the degree.

10.5 Where a student fails to show good cause why he or she should be allowed to re-enrol, the Dean may exclude the student from re-enrolment in the degree.

11. Time limits

11.1 All candidates shall complete the requirements for the degree no later than at the end of the tenth semester of candidature.

11.2 All candidates must complete the requirements for the degree within eight calendar years of first enrolment.

12. Assessment

12.1 When a student is permitted to submit additional work other than on the grounds of illness or misadventure, and the temporary grade INC has been given, the maximum result that may be awarded is 50 Pass.

13. Weighted Average Mark

13.1 A student's Weighted Average Mark (WAM) shall be calculated using the formula:

$$\text{WAM} = \frac{\text{sum}(M \times \text{CPa} \times \text{CPw})}{\text{sum}(\text{CPa} \times \text{CPw})}$$

13.1.1 where M is the mark achieved, CPa is the credit points attempted and CPw is the credit point weighting of any given unit of study. The weighting is determined by the Faculty administering the unit.

13.2 In the Faculty of Architecture, Design and Planning a weighting of zero is given to junior units and one for senior and graduate units.

14. Attendance requirements

14.1 A student who is absent without leave may be deemed not to have completed a particular unit of study or course.

14.2 A student who fails to meet the attendance requirements of a unit of study will be deemed not to have completed that unit of study.

15. Credit transfer policy

15.1 Credit will not be granted for units of study completed more than nine years prior to application, except with the permission of the Dean.

15.2 Credit will not be granted for units of study gained with a "Concessional Pass" or equivalent.

15.3 Credit may be granted as Specific Credit if the unit of study is considered to be directly equivalent to a unit of study in the table of units of study for the degree, or as non specific credit.

15.4 Credit will not be granted on the basis of units of study completed in the Bachelor of Design in Architecture or such equivalent degree except for units of study in excess of those used to satisfy the requirements of the degree, and then only if the unit of study is deemed to contribute to the degree requirements of the Master of Architecture.

15.5 The total amount of credit may not be greater than 48 credit points.

15.6 A student may apply to have credit granted on the basis of non-credentialled learning or experience that is equivalent to a unit of study in the table of units of study for the degree. The Dean will determine the method of demonstrating the achievement of the equivalent academic standard.

Graduate Certificate in Urban and Regional Planning Graduate Diploma in Urban and Regional Planning Master of Urban and Regional Planning Master of Urban and Regional Planning (Honours)

1. Requirements for the Graduate Certificate in Urban and Regional Planning

1.1 To qualify for the award of the Graduate Certificate in Urban and Regional Planning a student must:

- 1.1.1 complete successfully units of study giving credit for a total of 24 credit points; and
- 1.1.2 satisfy the requirements of all other relevant By-Laws, Rules and Resolutions of the University.

2. Requirements for the Graduate Diploma of Urban and Regional Planning

2.1 To qualify for the award of the Graduate Diploma in Urban and Regional Planning a student must:

- 2.1.1 complete successfully units of study giving credit for a total of 48 credit points; and
- 2.1.2 satisfy the requirements of all other relevant By-Laws, Rules and Resolutions of the University.

3. Requirements for the Master of Urban and Regional Planning

3.1 To qualify for the award of the Master of Urban Design a student must:

- 3.1.1 complete successfully units of study giving credit for a total of 72 credit points; and
- 3.1.2 satisfy the requirements of all other relevant By-Laws, Rules and Resolutions of the University.

4. Streams

4.1 The Master of Urban and Regional Planning may be awarded with one of the following streams,

- 4.1.1 heritage conservation; or
- 4.1.2 housing studies. ~~;~~~~or~~
- 4.1.3 ~~urban design~~

5. Requirements for the honours degree

5.1 To qualify for the award of the honours degree a student must complete the honours requirements published in the Faculty Resolutions relating to the course.

Resolutions of the Faculty

Master of Urban and Regional Planning, Graduate Diploma in Urban and Regional Planning and Graduate Certificate in Urban and Regional Planning

The Resolutions of the Faculty relating to the Master of Urban and Regional Planning, Graduate Diploma in Urban and Regional Planning and Graduate Certificate in Urban and Regional Planning in the Faculty of Architecture, Design and Planning are amended, with effect from 1 January 2009, as follows (additions indicated by underlined, deletions indicated by strikethrough):

Graduate Certificate in Urban and Regional Planning Graduate Diploma in Urban and Regional Planning Master of Urban and Regional Planning Master of Urban and Regional Planning (Honours)

1. Admission

1.1 An applicant for admission to candidature for the Graduate Certificate in Urban and Regional Planning shall:

1.1.1 hold a bachelor degree of the University of Sydney, or hold qualifications deemed by the Dean to be equivalent; or

1.1.2 furnish evidence which satisfies the Dean that he or she is qualified to enter upon the prescribed units of study.

1.2 An applicant for admission to candidature for the Graduate Diploma in Urban and Regional Planning shall:

1.2.1 hold a bachelor degree of the University of Sydney or hold qualifications deemed by the Dean to be equivalent; or

1.2.2 hold or have qualified for the award of the graduate certificate with a weighted average mark of at least 70 across all units attempted for the award.

1.3 An applicant for admission to candidature for the degree of Master of Urban and Regional Planning shall:

1.3.1 hold a bachelor degree of the University of Sydney or hold qualifications deemed by the Dean to be equivalent; or

1.3.2 hold or have qualified for the award of the graduate diploma; or

1.3.3 hold or have qualified for the award of the graduate certificate with a weighted average mark of at least 70 across all units attempted for the award.

1.4 An applicant for admission to candidature for the degree of Master of Urban and Regional Planning with honours must:

1.4.1 have achieved a weighted average mark of at least 75 in all other coursework required for the award of the degree; and

1.4.2 have the approval of the program coordinator, including having an agreed supervisor.

1.5 The number of students admitted to the courses may be limited in accordance with University policies depending on available teaching resources.

2. Units of study

2.1 The units of study that may be taken for the courses are set out in Table G, the table of graduate units of study, in the Faculty of Architecture, Design and Planning Handbook, together with:

2.1.1 credit point values;

2.1.2 assumed knowledge, corequisites and prerequisites;

2.1.3 the sessions in which they are offered;

2.1.4 the units with which they are mutually exclusive;

2.1.5 designation as core, optional or elective; and

2.1.6 any special conditions.

3. Requirements for the Graduate Certificate, Graduate Diploma and Master of Urban and Regional Planning and designated streams

3.1 To qualify for the award of the Graduate Certificate in Urban and Regional Planning, a candidate must successfully complete 24 credit points from units of study selected from Table G, the faculty's table of graduate units of study, to the limits specified in the table of requirements below.

3.2 To qualify for the award of the Graduate Diploma in Urban and Regional Planning, a candidate must successfully complete 48 credit points from units of study selected from Table G, the faculty's table of graduate units of study, to the limits specified in the table of requirements below.

3.3 To qualify for the award of the Master of Urban and Regional Planning, a candidate must successfully complete 72 credit points from units of study selected from Table G, the faculty's table of graduate units of study, to the limits specified in the table of requirements below.

3.4 To qualify for the award of the Master of Urban and Regional Planning with any of the designated streams, a candidate must successfully complete 72 credit points from units of study selected from Table G, the faculty's table of graduate units of study, to the limits specified in the table of requirements below.

3.5 Table of requirements

3.6 Core units completed in excess of the minimum requirements may count as options or electives.

3.7 Optional units completed in excess of the minimum requirements may count as electives.

3.8 Candidates may substitute graduate units of study from outside the faculty's table of graduate units of study to the limits shown in the table of credits and substitutions in section 2.

4. Requirements for the honours degree

4.1 To qualify for the award of the Master of Urban and Regional Planning with honours, a student must successfully complete units of study amounting to 72 credit points, comprising

4.1.2 60 core credit points selected from Table G, the faculty's table of graduate units of study, including a 24 credit point dissertation with a grade of at least Distinction; and

4.1.3 12 elective credit points selected from Table G, the faculty's table of graduate units of study.

5. Award of the Graduate Certificate, Graduate Diploma and Master of Urban and Regional Planning

5.1 The Graduate Certificate and Graduate Diploma in Urban and Regional Planning are awarded in the Pass grade only.

5.2 The Master of Urban and Regional Planning will be awarded in two grades, namely pass and honours.

5.2.1 A candidate will graduate with the grade merited.

5.2.2 A candidate who fails to satisfy the requirements for the honours degree, but who is otherwise eligible, shall be awarded the pass degree.

5.3 A candidate who enrolls in the following semester, in a higher level award course in this embedded sequence, will not graduate until the completion of the highest award attempted.

5.4 A candidate who has completed the requirements for a course, and who does not enrol in the following semester in a higher level embedded course in this sequence, will graduate from that course.

1.3.2 A candidate proceeding by coursework only shall:

1.3.2.1 complete coursework prescribed by the Committee to a total value of 48 credit points comprising a minimum of 12cr of foundation UOS, a minimum of 12cr UOS from the area of specialisation, a minimum of 12cr UOS from professional practice units, and a minimum of 6cr to a maximum of 12cr of elective UOS;

1.4 A candidate proceeding by coursework and project shall:

1.4.1 complete coursework prescribed by the Committee to a total value of 48 credit points comprising a minimum of 12cr from foundation UOS, a minimum of 12cr of specialisation, a minimum of 12cr of research practice unit, a minimum of 6cr of elective and a minimum of 6cr of professional practice UOS;

1.1 be a graduate of Engineering or other discipline at the University of Sydney; or

1.2.1 be a graduate of any other Faculty of the University of Sydney; and

1.2.2 have completed courses acceptable to the Faculty of Engineering and Information Technologies.

1.3 be a graduate of another institution holding equivalent qualifications to those of a graduate of the University of Sydney.

1.4 admission to graduate certificate may be based on candidates prior learning and work experience.

1.5 An applicant for admission to candidature shall apply in writing to the relevant School or School of the Faculty of Engineering and Information Technologies for such admission to candidature.

2. Probationary admission

2. A candidate shall:

2.1 if required by the head of the school or school concerned, produce evidence of such engineering and other discipline experience as the Committee for Postgraduate Studies shall consider satisfactory;

2.2 engage in such study in project management as the Committee shall prescribe for not less than one year of full-time candidature or two years of part-time candidature;

2.3 unless granted an extension by the Committee, complete the requirements for the degree within two years (full-time) or three years (part-time) of admission.

3. Credit transfer policy

3.1 Credit may be available for time spent or study done towards the Graduate Certificate of Project Management, the Graduate Diploma of Project Management, and the Master of Project Management or other relevant degree with a focus on project management subject to the approval of the Faculty and to the following guidelines:

3.1.1 If no award has been conferred for this study, credit may be transferred in full to the Graduate Certificate of Project Management, the Graduate Diploma of Project Management, and the Master of Project Management.

3.1.2 If an award has been conferred for this study, credit to a limit of 12 credit points may be transferred to the Graduate Certificate of Project Management, Graduate Diploma of Project Management, and Master of Project Management subject to the standing of the institution and grades as well as the conditions of the credit assessment policy of the Graduate School of Engineering and IT of the University of Sydney.

3.1.3 Credit may be transferred provided a credit average has been obtained and subject to the approval of the Faculty.

4. Satisfactory Progress

4.1 The Dean may advise a student when his or her performance has been such that a rule would normally be applied and call upon that student to show good cause why the rule should not be applied; and where the student does not show good cause, apply the rule.

4.2 A student who has failed a cumulative total of 12 credit points at any stage of enrolment in the Master of Project Management will be required to show good cause why he or she

should be allowed to re-enrol and, if good cause has not been established, the student's enrolment will be transferred to the Graduate Diploma;

4.3 A student who has failed a cumulative total of 18 credit points at any stage of enrolment in the Master of Project Management and/or the Graduate Diploma will be required to show good cause why he or she should be allowed to re-enrol and, if good cause has not been established, the student's enrolment will be transferred to the Graduate Certificate;

4.4 A student who has failed a cumulative total of more than 18 credit points in the Master of Project Management and/or the Graduate Diploma and/or the Graduate Certificate will be required to show good cause why he or she should be allowed to re-enrol.

4.5 If good cause has not been established, the Dean may, in accordance with the in accordance with clause 16 of the *University of Sydney (Coursework) Rule 2000 (as amended)*:

4.5.1 exclude the student from the degree course; or

4.5.2 permit the student to re-enrol in the degree course subject to restrictions on units of study, which may include: completion of a unit or units of study within a specified time; exclusion from a unit or units of study; and specification of the earliest date on which a student may re-enrol in a unit or units of study.

5.3.3 A candidate proceeding by coursework and project shall:

5.3.3.1 complete coursework prescribed by the Committee to a total value of 48 credit points comprising a minimum of 12cr from foundation UOS, a minimum of 12cr of specialisation, a minimum of 12cr of research practice unit, a minimum of 6cr of elective and a minimum of 6cr of professional practice UOS;

5.3.4 carry out under supervision a project in a field of study approved by the Committee and submit for examination a report on such a project;

5.3.5 lodge with the school/schools two bound copies (typewritten or printed) of the project report.

6. The degree of Master of Project Management may be awarded in the following subject areas and the named testamurs for the degree shall specify the subject area: To qualify for one of these streams, students will have completed 18cp of the specific subject area.

6.4 Project Procurement Management;

6.6 Project Quality Management

6.7 Strategic Project Management Implementation

7. Time limits

7.1 A student shall, unless special permission is granted by the Faculty, complete the requirements of the degree, in the case of a full-time student not later than two years, and in the case of a part-time student not later than three years, after the commencement of candidature.

7.2 The Faculty may include in the minimum period of candidature time spent in advanced study and research in the University of Sydney Faculty of Engineering and Information Technologies (or any other institute as approved by the Faculty) prior to the application for admission to candidature.

8. Details of units of study

8.1 The units of study for the Master of Project Management are listed in Table for Master of Project Management of the Faculty of Engineering and Information Technologies Handbook.

8.2 A candidate for the course shall proceed by completing units of study as prescribed by the Faculty.

8.3 A unit of study shall consist of such lectures, seminars, tutorial instructions, essays, exercises, practical work, or project work as may be prescribed.

8.4 All units of study for a particular subject area may not be available every semester.

8.5 The Dean may allow substitution of any unit of study by another unit of study, including units of study from other postgraduate coursework programs in the Faculty and elsewhere in the University.

9. Enrolment in more/less than minimum load

9.1 A candidate proceeding on a full-time basis may enrol in a maximum of 24 credit points per semester.

9.2 A candidate proceeding on a part-time basis may enrol in a minimum of 6 credit points to a maximum of 24 credit points per semester.

10. Cross-institutional study

10.1 Cross-institutional study shall not be available to students enrolled in the Graduate Certificate, Graduate Diploma and Master of Project Management except where the University of Sydney has a formal cooperation agreement with another university.

11. Discontinuation of enrolment

11.1 A student who does not enrol in any semester without first obtaining written permission from the Dean to suspend candidature will be deemed to have discontinued enrolment in the course.

11.2 Students who have discontinued from the course will be required to apply for admission to the course and be subject to admission requirements pertaining at that time.

12. Suspension of candidature

12.1 A student may seek written permission from the Dean to suspend candidature in the course.

12.2 Suspension may be granted for a maximum of two semesters.

13. Re-enrolment after an absence

13.1 A student who plans to re-enrol after a period of suspension must advise the Graduate School of Engineering and IT in writing of their intention by no later than the end of October for Semester One or the end of May for Semester Two of the same year.

1.1.2 admit to candidature for the Graduate Diploma of Science in Medicine an applicant who holds the degree of bachelor with first or second class honours, or an applicant who holds the degree of bachelor of the University of Sydney without first or second class honours and who has completed equivalent work or passed a preliminary examination or examinations as prescribed by the faculty, and who has completed any courses in the subject area in which the applicant seeks to proceed as determined by the faculty on the recommendation of the head of the discipline concerned.

2. Method of progression

2.1 A candidate for the Graduate Diploma of Medicine or Graduate Diploma of Science in Medicine shall proceed by coursework.

2.2 A candidate shall proceed by completing units of study as prescribed by the faculty.

2.3 Successful completion of a unit of study requires candidates to:

2.3.1 formally enrol in the unit of study and pay associated tuition fees, if any; and

2.3.2 attend lectures, tutorials, practical sessions, seminars, Web forums or conduct research, if any; and

2.3.3 satisfactorily complete assignments, practical work, treatise or dissertation, if any; and

2.3.4 pass the written and practical examinations of the unit of study, if any.

2.5 The ~~degree of~~ Graduate Diploma of Medicine by coursework shall be awarded in the following streams:

2.5.1 Clinical Epidemiology

2.5.2 Dermatology

2.5.3 Ophthalmic Science

2.5.4 Interdisciplinary Medicine

2.5.5 Paediatric Medicine

2.5.6 Pain Management

2.5.7 Refractive Surgery

2.5.8 Renal Medicine

2.5.8 Sexually Transmitted Diseases/HIV

2.5.9 Sleep Medicine

2.6 The Graduate Diploma of Science in Medicine by coursework shall be awarded in the following streams:

- 2.6.1 Clinical Epidemiology
- 2.6.2 Ophthalmic Science
- 2.6.3 Pain Management
- 2.6.4 Sexually Transmitted Diseases/HIV
- 2.6.5 Sleep Medicine

2.7 The certificate for the diploma shall specify in parentheses the stream in which the diploma is awarded.

3. Units of study

3.1 For unit of study details relating to the degrees of Graduate Diploma of Medicine and Graduate Diploma of Science in Medicine by coursework please refer to the Faculty handbook.

4. Requirements

4.1 A Graduate Diploma of Medicine or Graduate Diploma of Science in Medicine candidate proceeding by coursework shall:

4.1.1 complete such units of study as may be prescribed by the Faculty on the recommendation of the head of the discipline concerned.

4.1.2 complete the specified number of credit points as detailed in 4.3.1 or 4.3.2;

4.1.3 satisfy the requirements of all other relevant By-laws, Rules and Resolutions of the University.

4.2 The head of the discipline concerned shall report the result of the examination of the coursework and other work, if any, to the Faculty which shall determine the results of the candidature.

5. Award of Graduate Diploma of Medicine or Graduate Diploma of Science in Medicine

5.1 A candidate for the degree of Master of Medicine or the degree of Master of Science in Medicine in a particular stream may apply for the award of the Graduate Diploma of Medicine or the Graduate Diploma of Science in Medicine in that stream if, in the opinion of the faculty and on the recommendation of the head of the discipline concerned, the candidate fulfils the requirements in 1., and has completed work for that degree equivalent to that required in 4.

5.2 Such a candidate shall thereupon cease to be a candidate for the degree of Master of Medicine or the degree of Master of Science in Medicine in that stream.

6. Enrolment

6.1 A student must be enrolled in each semester in which he or she is actively completing the requirements for the award course.

6.2 The candidature of a student who has not re-enrolled and who has not obtained approval from the faculty for a suspension of candidature for the relevant semester will be deemed to have lapsed.

7. Restrictions on enrolment

7.1 Admission to candidature may be limited by a quota. In determining the quota the dean will take into account:

7.1.1 availability of resources

7.1.2 availability of adequate and appropriate supervision.

7.2 In considering an application for admission the Dean will take into account the quota. Entry will be based on applicants who are most meritorious in terms of 1 above.

8. Discontinuation of enrolment

8.1 A candidate who wishes to discontinue enrolment from the Graduate Diploma of Medicine or Graduate Diploma of Science of Medicine must notify the faculty in writing and will be presumed to have discontinued enrolment from the date of that notification, unless evidence is produced showing:

8.1.1 that the discontinuation occurred at an earlier date; and

8.1.2 that there was good reason why the notification could not be made at the earlier time.

8.2 A discontinuation of enrolment may be recorded as *Withdrawn (W)* or *Discontinued Not To Count As Failure (DNF)* where that discontinuation occurs within the time-frames specified by the University and published by the Student Centre, or where the student meets other conditions as specified by the faculty.

9. Suspension of candidature

9.1 A candidate who wishes to suspend their candidature must apply, in writing, to the faculty.

9.1.1 The application must be received by the faculty prior to the commencement of the relevant semester.

9.1.2 A candidate may only apply for a period of suspension for one semester at any one time. Should a candidate wish to suspend their candidature for more than one semester another application must be made to the Faculty for each subsequent semester, prior to the commencement of the relevant semester.

9.1.3 Late applications may be considered at the faculty's discretion.

9.1.4 Where a student has previously enrolled for the relevant semester, a suspension of enrolment may be recorded as *Withdrawn (W)* or *Discontinued Not To Count As Failure (DNF)* where that application is received within the time-frames specified by the University and published by the Student Centre, or where the student meets other conditions as specified by the faculty.

9.2 Where the candidate has previously had two semesters of suspension the application will be considered by the Board of Postgraduate Studies for the faculty.

10. Re-enrolment after an absence

10.1 A student must enrol in the semester following a period of approved suspension.

10.2 A student whose candidature has lapsed must apply for re-admission in accordance with procedures determined by the faculty.

11. Satisfactory progress

11.1 The faculty requires students to demonstrate satisfactory progress with their studies as set out in the current relevant University policy on progress.

12. Credit

12.1 Refer to *University of Sydney (Coursework) Rule 2000 (as amended)*, Division 3. Section 8 and the Board of Postgraduate Studies for the Faculties of Dentistry, Medicine and Pharmacy, *Academic Credit, Advanced Standing, and Exemption Policy*.

13. Time limits

13.1 A full-time candidate shall complete the requirements for the degree not earlier than two semesters after the commencement of candidature and, except with the permission of the faculty on the recommendation of the head of the discipline concerned, not later than two years after commencement of candidature.

13.2 Except with the permission of the faculty on the recommendation of the head of the discipline concerned, a part-time candidate shall complete the requirements for the degree

not earlier than two semesters after the commencement of candidature and not later than three years after commencement of candidature.
