10.2.1 Proposals for New and Amended Undergraduate Courses**10.2.1.1 Faculty of Arts****(1) Bachelor of International and Global Studies***pages D7-D10*

The purpose of this proposal is to introduce a new award course – the Bachelor of International and Global Studies – thereby restructuring and amalgamating two existing degrees, the Bachelor of International Studies and Bachelor of Global Studies. A core recommendation of the 2006 Review of Social Sciences Report was that after the creation of a proposed School of Social Sciences in the Faculty of Arts, the Faculty should seek to identify and reduce overlap and duplication in degrees as a consequence of new programs being brought into the Faculty. The two degrees in question (International and Global) have long been seen as obvious candidates for rationalisation (and were cited as such in the Social Sciences Review Report, p.10) as both deal with similar questions and problems – how a world system of governance, economy, culture and migration works – but from different perspectives.

The purpose of the proposal is to introduce a new combined award course: the Bachelor of International and Global Studies/Bachelor of Laws. This new degree will replace the previous combined Bachelor of International Studies/Bachelor of Laws, taking into account the reform of International studies into International and Global Studies. The focus of the new degree will be on combining a rigorous law curriculum with a Bachelor degree aimed at developing an understanding of international affairs, awareness of the major currents of global change, an ability to think critically about the issues and debates these changes raise, as well as a capacity for effective communication including linguistic communication across cultural boundaries.

- A UAI within 5 points of the main round UAI
- Completed a minimum of four years secondary education at a rural school
- Lived for a significant time in a rural area
- A demonstrated commitment to a career in rural health.

Details of the current scheme are enclosed for the information of members.

1. Requirements for the Bachelor of International and Global Studies

- 1.1 To qualify for the award of the Bachelor of International and Global Studies a student must:
 - 1.1.1 complete successfully units of study giving credit for a total of 144 credit points; and
 - 1.1.2 satisfy the requirements of all other relevant By-laws, Rules and Resolutions of the University including Faculty Resolutions relating to the course.

2. Requirements for the honours degree

- 2.1 To qualify for the award of the honours degree a student must complete the honours requirements published in the Faculty Resolutions relating to the course.

Resolutions of the Faculty

Bachelor of International and Global Studies

The Resolutions of the Faculty relating to the Bachelor of International and Global Studies in the Faculty of Arts are inserted, with effect from 1 January 2009, as follows:

Bachelor of International and Global Studies

1. Admission

All applications for admission to candidature to an undergraduate degree in the Faculty of Arts will be subject to the Undergraduate Admissions Policy of the Faculty of Arts.

2. Units of study

See Table of Unit of Study – *Arts Undergraduate Handbook*

3. Requirements for the Bachelor of International and Global Studies

3.1 To qualify for the award of the Bachelor of International and Global Studies students must be admitted to candidature for the degree and complete 144 credit points in total, including:

3.1.1 no more than 48 junior credit points in total;

3.1.2 a minimum of 96 senior credit points;

3.1.3 units of study in International and Global Studies (units coded INGS) to the value of 24 credit points as may be prescribed annually by the Degree Director;

3.1.4 at least one major from the following subject areas:

3.1.4.1 Anthropology

3.1.4.2 American Studies

3.1.4.3 Arab World, Islam and The Middle East

3.1.4.4 Asian Studies

3.1.4.5 Australian Studies

3.1.4.6 European Studies

3.1.4.7 Government and International Relations

3.1.4.8 Political Economy

3.1.4.9 Sociology

3.1.5 a second major or elective units from Table A or Table B of the Faculty of Arts units of study.

3.1.6 A Faculty of Arts major consists of 36 senior credit points in a single subject area, or from pre-approved cross-listing between subject areas, as outlined in Section 3 *The major and cross-listing* in the Arts Undergraduate Resolutions; a major from another faculty is as defined by that faculty. The testamur for the degree shall specify the major/s.

4. Requirements for honours degrees

To qualify to enrol in an honours course as a Bachelor of International and Global Studies candidate, a student must:

4.1 have qualified for the award of the pass degree of Bachelor of International and Global Studies from the University of Sydney, or have qualified for the award of the pass degree from another faculty of the University of Sydney, or from another university, and

4.1.1 have completed the pre-requisites as outlined in the *Table of units of study*; and

4.1.2 have written permission of the chair of department concerned.

4.2 A student who is qualified to enrol in two honours courses may either:

4.2.1 complete the honours course in the two subject areas separately, or

4.2.2 complete a joint honours course, equivalent to an honours course in a single subject area, in two subject areas. A joint honours course shall comprise such units of the two Honours courses as may be decided by the Dean.

4.3 An honours course consists of 48 credit points at 4000 level in International and

Global Studies, or as a joint honours year in International and Global Studies and one other approved subject area, completed with a minimum overall mark of 65.

5. **Award of Bachelor of International and Global Studies**
 - 5.1 There are no special requirements for the award of the Bachelor of International and Global Studies apart from the successful completion of units of study.
6. **Details of units of study**

13. **Satisfactory progress pursuant to the University of Sydney (Coursework) Rule 2000**
 - 13.1 The Faculty requires students to demonstrate satisfactory progress with their studies.
 - 13.2 A student may be deemed not to have made satisfactory progress in any semester if the student:
 - 13.2.1 fails to complete at least half the credit points in which he/she is enrolled; or
 - 13.2.2 obtains a Weighted Average Mark (WAM) of less than 50 based on units of study for a given semester; or
 - 13.2.3 fails a unit of study for the second time; or
 - 13.2.4 has an unsatisfactory attendance record; or
 - 13.2.5 is unable to complete the degree in the maximum time permitted
 - 13.3 A student who fails to demonstrate satisfactory progress in any semester of enrolment may be considered to fall into the "Students at Risk" category and will be subject to the procedures of University policy on Identifying and Supporting Students at Risk.
 - 13.4 A student who has been identified as being at risk on three consecutive instances will normally be called upon to show good cause why he or she should be allowed to re-enrol in the degree course.
 - 13.5 Where a student fails to show good cause why he or she should be allowed to re-enrol, the Dean may exclude the student from re-enrolment in the degree
14. **Time limit**

- 1.1.2 satisfy the requirements of all other relevant By-laws, Rules and Resolutions of the University.

2. Requirements for the honours degree

2.1 To qualify for the award of the honours degree a student must complete the honours requirements published in the Faculty Resolutions relating to the course.

Resolutions of the Faculty

Bachelor of International and Global Studies/Bachelor of Laws

The Resolutions of the Faculty relating to the Bachelor of International and Global Studies/Bachelor of Laws in the Faculty of Arts and the Faculty of Law are inserted, with effect from 1 January 2009, as follows:

Bachelor of International and Global Studies/Bachelor of Laws

1. Cross-faculty management of the combined award course

- 1.1 Students will be under the general supervision of the Faculty of Arts until the end of the semester in which they complete the requirements for the Bachelor of International and Global Studies.
- 1.2 They will then be under the general supervision of the Faculty of Law.
- 1.3 The Deans of the Faculty of Arts and the Faculty of Law shall jointly exercise authority in any matter concerning the combined award course not otherwise dealt with in these resolutions.

2. Units of study

- 2.1 The units of study which may be taken for the Bachelor of International and Global Studies are set out under the *Tables of undergraduate units of study* in the Faculty of Arts Handbook, together with:

- 3.6 Except with the permission of the Dean or Associate Dean (Undergraduate), candidates in the Combined Law program must successfully complete Foundations of Law before enrolling in any other Bachelor of Laws units of study.
- 3.7 Students must complete the requirements for the Bachelor of International and Global Studies before proceeding to the Bachelor of Laws (unless they have permission from the Faculty of Law stating otherwise).
- 3.8 On written application to the Faculty of Arts, a student may abandon their candidature in the combined degree program and elect to transfer to the Bachelor of International and Global Studies degree in accordance with the Resolutions governing that degree at the time of transfer.

1.2 Admission is determined on the basis of the New South Wales Higher School Certificate, or its interstate or overseas equivalent, at a level determined each year by the Faculty of Economics and the Faculty of Medicine. Candidates should normally:

1.2.1 have gained a Universities Admission Index (UAI) through the Higher School Certificate;

1.2.2 attend an interview with a panel organised by the Faculty of Medicine.

2. Units of study

2.1.1 designation as junior, senior or honours level;

7.3 Prerequisites, corequisites, assumed knowledge, mode of delivery, assessment and course content for units of study are as published annually in the Faculty of Economics and Business Handbook and the Faculty of Medicine Handbook and as advised in unit of study outlines.

8. Variation of normal load

8.1 A normal full-time load is defined as an enrolment in a program of units of approved study to a total value of 24 credit points in any one semester.

8.2 Providing the student maintains a full-time load, permission to vary the normal pattern of progression may be granted at the discretion of the Undergraduate Program Adviser at the Faculty of Economics and Business and the Dean of the Faculty of Medicine.

8.2.1 A student who is permitted to undertake a minimum of three quarters of the full number of units prescribed for a course in any semester or year shall be regarded as a full-time student for that semester or year.

8.2.2 Except with the approval of the Undergraduate Program Adviser at the Faculty of Economics and Business and the Dean of the Faculty of Medicine, a student shall not be permitted to undertake a load that exceeds the normal full-time load by more than one quarter in any one semester.

9. Cross-institutional study

9.1 It is not possible for students enrolled in the Bachelor of Commerce/Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery to undertake cross-institutional study.

10. Restrictions on enrolment

10.1 Rules on enrolment in units of study in the Bachelor of Commerce are governed by subsections of the Rules of the Faculty of Economics and Business, published in the Faculty's Handbook.

10.2 Rules on enrolment in units of study in the Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery are governed by the Faculty of Medicine Resolutions published in the Faculty of Medicine Handbook.

11. Discontinuation of enrolment, suspension of candidature and re-enrolment after an absence

11.1 Rules on Discontinuation of Enrolment, suspension of candidature and re-enrolment after an absence are governed by subsections of the Rules of the Faculty of Economics and Business published in the Faculty's Handbook and website.

11.2 Rules on Discontinuation of Enrolment, suspension of candidature and re-enrolment after an absence in the Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery are governed by the Faculty of Medicine Resolutions published in the Faculty of Medicine Handbook.

12. Satisfactory progress

12.1 During the first three years of the degree, on the recommendation of the Associate Dean for Undergraduate Studies within the Faculty of Economics and Business, and the Dean of the Faculty of Medicine, a candidate may be called upon to show cause as to why that candidature should not be terminated by reason of unsatisfactory progress towards completion of the combined degree; and

12.1.1 where, in the opinion of the Associate Dean for the Faculty of Economics and Business and the Dean of the Faculty of Medicine, the candidate does not show good cause, terminate the candidature.

12.2 The Resolutions and Rules on satisfactory progression in both faculties will also comply with the University's policy on Identifying and Supporting Students at Risk of Exclusion.

13. Time limit

13.1 A student shall be required to complete the degrees of Bachelor of Commerce/Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery according to section 3 of these Resolutions.

14. Assessment policy

14.1 Rules on assessment in the program are provided through the Unit of Study Outlines in the Faculty of Economics and Business and by the Faculty of Medicine Resolutions published in the Faculty of Medicine Handbook.

14.2 Candidates may be assessed by a combination of written and oral examinations, written essays, assignments and reports, seminar, workshop and meeting participation, professional experience or any combination of these as the faculties may determine.

14.3 Further assessment may be permitted in a unit of study in cases of special consideration, in accordance with Academic Board policy, the Faculty Resolutions for both faculties, governing illness or misadventure.

15. Credit transfer policy

15.1 nil

Resolutions of the Faculty

Bachelor of Commerce and Bachelor of Science

The Resolutions of the Faculty relating to the Bachelor of Commerce and Bachelor of Science in the Faculty of Economics and Business and the Faculty of Science are amended, with effect from 1 January 2009, as follows (additions indicated by underlined, deletions indicated by strikethrough):

Bachelor of Commerce and Bachelor of Science

1. Cross-faculty management of the combined award course

1.1 The Faculty of Economics and Business is the primary Faculty of management for the combined award course.

1.2 The Deans of the Faculty of Economics and Business and the Faculty of Science shall jointly exercise authority in any matter concerning the combined award course not otherwise dealt with in these Resolutions.

2. Units of study

2.1 The units of study which may be taken for the combined award course are set out under the tables of undergraduate units of study in the Faculty of Economics and Business Handbook, and the Undergraduate tables and units of study in the Faculty of Science Handbook together with:

2.1.1 designation as junior, intermediate, senior or honours level;

2.1.2 credit point value;

2.1.3 the units of study with which they are mutually exclusive;

2.1.4 the semesters in which they are offered;

2.1.5 corequisites/prerequisites/assumed learning/assumed knowledge;

2.1.6 the faculty responsible for the unit of study; and

2.1.7 any special conditions.

2.2 The Dean of the Faculty of Science may permit a student admitted to the Talented Student Program to undertake Science units of study other than those specified in Table I: Bachelor of Science in the Faculty of Science Handbook (see the tables of undergraduate units of study in the Faculty of Economics and Business Handbook).

3. Requirements for the Bachelor of Commerce and Bachelor of Science

3.1 To qualify for the award of the pass degrees a student must complete successfully units of study amounting to a total of 240 credit points (but no more than 96 credit points of junior units of study), including:

3.2 *In the Faculty of Economics and Business:*

3.2.1 at least 96 credit points (minimum of 48 senior credit points) of units of study from the Faculty of Economics and Business, as specified in the Faculty of Economics and Business Handbook, which must include;

3.2.1.1 7 core units of study (comprising 36 junior and 6 senior credit points), as specified in the Faculty of Economics and Business Handbook; and

3.2.1.2 either a major (minimum of 36 senior credit points) or an extended major (minimum of 48 senior credit points), comprising units of study as specified in the Faculty of Economics and Business Handbook, from one of the following subject areas:

3.2.1.2.1 Accounting;

3.2.1.2.2 Business Information Systems;

3.2.1.2.3 Commercial Law;

3.2.1.2.4 Econometrics;

3.2.1.2.5 Economics;

3.2.1.2.6 Finance;

3.2.1.2.7 Industrial Relations and Human Resource Management;

3.2.1.2.8 International Business;

3.2.1.2.9 Management;

3.2.1.2.10 ~~Management Decision Sciences; or~~

3.2.1.2.10 Marketing; or

3.2.1.2.11 Operations Management and Decision Sciences

3.3 *In the Faculty of Science:*

3.3.1 at least 12 credit points of units of study from the Science subject area of Mathematics and Statistics;

3.3.2 24 credit points of junior units of study from at least two Science subject areas (excluding Mathematics and Statistics);

3.3.3 at least 60 credit points of intermediate and senior Science units of study;

3.3.4 a major (normally 24 senior credit points) comprising units of study specified in Table I: Bachelor of Science listed in the Undergraduate tables and units of study in the Faculty of Science Handbook.

3.4 In the Bachelor of Science (Advanced), those requirements specified in 4(2) and in addition, except with the permission of the Dean of the Faculty of Science:

3.4.1 include no more than 48 credit points of junior Science units of study;

3.4.2 include at least 12 credit points of intermediate Science units of study at either the advanced level or as TSP units;

3.4.3 include at least 48 credit points of senior Science units of study of which at least 24 credit points are units of study in a single Science subject area, taken at the advanced level (or as TSP units); and

3.4.4 maintain in intermediate and senior units of study in Science subject areas an average mark of 65 or greater in each year of enrolment.

3.5 In the Bachelor of Science (Advanced Mathematics), those requirements specified in 4(2) and in addition, except with the permission of the Dean of the Faculty of Science:

3.5.1 include no more than 48 credit points of junior Science units of study;

3.5.2 include at least 12 credit points of intermediate Mathematics and Statistics units of study at either the advanced level or as TSP units;

3.5.3 include at least 48 credit points of senior Science units of study of which at least 24 are completed at the advanced level (or as TSP units) in Mathematics and Statistics; and

3.5.4 maintain in intermediate and senior units of study in Science subject areas an average mark of 65 or greater in each year of enrolment.

4. Transfer between Bachelor of Science streams

4.1 Students in the Bachelor of Science (Advanced) or Bachelor of Science (Advanced Mathematics) streams who fail to maintain a Credit average will be transferred to the Bachelor of Science in the next year of enrolment with full credit for units completed in the Advanced or Advanced Mathematics stream.

4.2 Students in the Bachelor of Science (Advanced) or Bachelor of Science (Advanced Mathematics) streams who fail to achieve a Credit average across all units attempted in their final year of the degree will be awarded the Bachelor of Science.

4.3 To transfer to the Bachelor of Science (Advanced) or Bachelor of Science (Advanced Mathematics), a student must satisfy the following:

4.3.1 completion of at least 48 credit points;

4.3.2 an average of 75 or greater over all attempted units of study; and

4.3.3 be able to enrol in the required number of advanced level or TSP units.

5. Requirements for the Honours degrees

5.1 On completion of the Bachelor of Commerce and Bachelor of Science (or equivalent), students who are qualified to do so may undertake an honours year in either or both of the award courses.

5.2 Joint honours courses are also available.

5.3 To qualify for the award of honours in the Bachelor of Commerce a student must complete successfully an additional year of study (the honours year), as specified in the Faculty of Economics and Business Handbook.

5.3.1 The Bachelor of Commerce may be awarded with honours in any of the subject areas where honours units are listed in the *Table of undergraduate units of study* - Faculty of Economics and Business or, as approved by the Faculty of Economics and Business, with joint honours in two of these subject areas.

5.3.2 Honours may also be awarded in any other area offered by another Faculty of the University, as approved by the Faculty of Economics and Business.

5.3.3 To enrol in the honours year, a student must satisfy the following:

5.3.3.1 confirmation of the student's eligibility for entry to the honours year from the relevant Discipline(s)/Department; and

5.3.3.2 any other requirements for entry into the honours year set by the relevant Discipline(s)/Department and the Faculty of Economics and Business, unless otherwise approved by the Faculty of Economics and Business.

5.4 To qualify for the award of honours in the Bachelor of Science a student must complete successfully an additional year of study (the honours year), as specified in the Faculty of Science Handbook.

5.4.1 The Bachelor of Science may be awarded with honours in any of the subject areas in Table VI: Honours units of study listed in Undergraduate tables and units of study of the Faculty of Science Handbook or, as approved by the Faculty of Science, with joint honours in two of these subject areas.

5.4.2 To qualify to enrol in an honours course a student must satisfy the following:

5.4.2.1 have completed a minimum of 24 credit points of senior units of study relating to the intended honours course;

5.4.2.2 have achieved either at least a credit average in 48 credit points in relevant intermediate and senior Science units of study or a SCIWAM of at least 65; and

5.4.2.3 any additional criteria set by the Head of Department concerned.

5.5 The classes for the award of honours are specified in the following table:

6. Award of Bachelor of Commerce and Bachelor of Science

6.1 A student who completes the requirements for the Bachelor of Commerce and the Bachelor of Science shall receive at graduation a separate testamur for each of the degrees.

6.2 The Bachelor of Commerce and the Bachelor of Science may be awarded in two grades, namely pass and honours.

6.2.1 The testamur for the pass degrees shall specify the major(s) completed.

6.2.2 The testamur for the honours degrees shall specify the subject area(s) and the class of honours.

6.2.3 It shall not include majors.

6.3 The Bachelor of Science may be awarded in the following streams:

6.3.1 Bachelor of Science;

6.2.2 Bachelor of Science (Advanced); or

6.2.3 Bachelor of Science (Advanced Mathematics).

6.3 Students may abandon the combined award course and elect to complete either the Bachelor of Commerce or the Bachelor of Science in accordance with the Resolutions governing those award courses.

2.1.5 any special conditions.

2.2 The units of study which may be taken for the Bachelor Laws (LLB) are set out under the *Tables of undergraduate units of study* in the Faculty of Law Handbook, together with:

2.2.1 designation as compulsory or elective;

2.2.2 credit point value;

2.2.3 the units of study with which they are mutually exclusive;

2.2.4 corequisites/prerequisites/assumed learning/ assumed knowledge;

2.2.5 any special conditions.

3. Requirements for the Bachelor of Commerce (BCom) and the Bachelor of Laws (LLB)

3.1 To qualify for the award of the pass degrees a student must complete successfully units of study amounting to a total of 240 credit points.

3.2 To qualify for the award of the Bachelor of Commerce (BCom) degree a student must complete successfully units of study amounting to a total of 144 credit points, including:

3.2.1 7 core units of study (comprising 36 junior and 6 senior credit points), as specified in the Faculty of Economics and Business Handbook; and

3.2.2 either a major (minimum of 36 senior credit points) or an extended major (minimum of 48 senior credit points), comprising units of study as specified in the Faculty of Economics and Business Handbook, from one of the following subject areas:

3.2.2.3 Commercial Law;

3.3 To qualify for the degree of Bachelor of Laws (LLB), in the Bachelor of Commerce and Bachelor of Laws (BCom/LLB) combined degree program a student must complete units of study to the value of 144 credit points, made up of the following:

3.3.1 96 credit points of the compulsory units of study, which includes the 48 credit points of LAWS units of study listed below in 3.5.1 and counted towards the Bachelor of Commerce (BCom);

3.3.2 48 credit points of the elective units of study, as specified in the Faculty of Law Handbook, that must include:

3.3.2.1 a maximum of 42 credit points from the units of study listed in Part One of the *Undergraduate units of study table*; and

3.3.2.2 a minimum of six credit points from the units of study listed in Part Two of the *Undergraduate units of study table*.

3.6 Except with the permission of the Dean or Associate Dean (Undergraduate) of the Faculty of Law, candidates in a Combined Law program must successfully complete *Foundations of Law* before enrolling in any other Bachelor of Laws units of study.

3.7 Students must complete the requirements for the Bachelor of Commerce (BCom) before proceeding to the Bachelor of Laws (LLB) (unless they have permission from the Faculty of Law stating otherwise).

4. Requirements for the award of honours

4.1 Both the Bachelor of Commerce (BCom) and the Bachelor of Laws (LLB) may be awarded with honours.

4.2 To qualify for the award of honours in the Bachelor of Commerce (BCom) a student must successfully complete an additional year of study (the honours year), as specified in the Faculty of Economics and Business Handbook.

4.2.1 Students who qualify to undertake the honours year may elect to do so either:

4.2.1.1 by suspending candidature from the Bachelor of Laws (LLB) (including the combined Commerce/Laws award course) for one year with the permission of the Faculty of Law; or

4.2.1.2 after completion of the combined award course.

4.2.2 The Bachelor of Commerce (BCom) may be awarded with honours in any of the subject areas where honours are listed in the *Tables of undergraduate units of study*, with joint honours in two of these subject areas.

4.2.3 To enrol in the honours year, a student must satisfy the following:

4.2.3.1 Successful completion of the requirements for the pass degree;

4.2.3.2 confirmation of the student's eligibility for entry to the honours year from the relevant Discipline(s)/Department; and

4.2.3.3 any other requirements for entry into the honours year set by the relevant Discipline(s)/Departments and the Faculty of Economics and Business, unless otherwise approved by the Faculty of Economics and Business.

4.2.4 The classes for the award of honours in the Bachelor of Commerce (BCom) are specified in the following table:

4.3.1 Honours in the Bachelor of Laws (LLB) may be awarded in two classes: Class I and Class II.

4.3.2 To qualify for the award of honours in the Bachelor of Laws (LLB) students must obtain the following WAM across all Law units, including those taken as part of the combined award course and any failures:

4.3.2.1 First class honours are awarded to students who obtain an average mark of 75 percent or higher (weighted in accordance with the credit points for each unit of study).

4.3.2.2 Second class honours are awarded to students who obtain an average mark of between 70 percent and 74.9 per cent (weighted in accordance with the credit points for each unit of study).

4.3.3 Students who qualify for the award of first class honours, and whose work is of outstanding merit in the opinion of the Faculty, may be considered for the award of a University medal.

4.3.4 An honours year is not required.

5. Award of Bachelor of Commerce (BCom) and Bachelor of Laws (LLB)

5.1 A student who completes the requirements of the Bachelor of Commerce (BCom) and Bachelor of Laws (LLB) shall receive at graduation a separate testamur for each of the degrees.

5.2 The Bachelor of Commerce (BCom) and the Bachelor of Laws (LLB) may be awarded in two grades, namely pass and honours.

5.2.1 The testamur for pass degree of Bachelor of Commerce (BCom) shall specify the major(s) completed.

5.2.2 The testamur for the Bachelor of Commerce (BCom) with honours shall specify the subject area(s) and the class of honours. It shall not include majors.

5.2.3 The testamur for the Bachelor of Laws (LLB) with honours shall specify the class of honours.

5.3 Students may abandon the combined award course and elect to complete the Bachelor of Commerce (BCom) in accordance with the Resolutions governing this award course.

1. Cross-faculty management of the combined award course

1.2 Students will be under the general supervision of the Faculty of Engineering and Information Technologies for administrative matters.

1.3 Students will be under the supervision of the Faculty of Economics and Business in relation to the Bachelor of Commerce component and will be under the supervision of the Faculty of Engineering and Information Technologies in relation to the Bachelor of Information Technology component.

1.4 Students will be subject to conditions on admission, stream requirements, enrolment restrictions, assessment, advanced standing, progression, academic honesty, degree completion times and transition arrangements as shown in the resolutions for Bachelor of Information Technology published in the Faculty of Engineering and Information Technologies Handbook.

1.5 The Faculty of Economics and Business and the Faculty of Engineering and Information Technologies shall jointly exercise authority in any matter concerning the combined course not otherwise dealt with in these resolutions.

2. Requirement for the Pass degrees of Bachelor of Information Technology and Bachelor of Commerce

2.1 To qualify for the award of the pass degrees of Bachelor of Information Technology and Bachelor of Commerce a student must complete successfully units of study that total at least 240 credit points and include:

2.1.1 in the Faculty of Engineering and Information Technologies

2.1.1.1 the program of units of study set out in the BIT table, relating to the Bachelor of Information Technology Stream (Computer Science or Information Systems) that the student is pursuing; and

2.1.2 in the Faculty of Economics and Business

2.1.2.1 at least 96 credit points in units of study taught by the Faculty of Economics and Business (including at least 48 credit points of 2000 and/or 3000 level units), which cannot be counted towards the award of the Bachelor of Information Technology;

2.1.2.2 7 core units of study in Economics and Business (comprising 36 junior and 6 senior credit points as specified in the Faculty of Economics and Business Handbook); and

2.1.2.3 either a major (minimum of 36 senior credit points) or an extended major (minimum of 48 credit points), comprising units of study specified in the Faculty of Economics and Business Handbook, from one of the following subject areas:

2.1.2.3.1 Accounting

2.1.2.3.2 Business Information Systems

2.1.2.3.3 Commercial Law

2.1.2.3.4 Econometrics

2.1.2.3.5 Economics

2.1.2.3.6 Finance

2.1.2.3.7 Industrial Relations and Human Resource Management

2.1.2.3.8 International Business

2.1.2.3.9 Management

2.1.2.3.10 Operations Management and Decision Sciences

2.1.2.3.11 Marketing

3. Requirements for the Bachelor of Information Technology and Bachelor of Commerce degrees with Honours

3.1 Bachelor of Information Technology with Honours

3.1.1 On completion of the requirements for the combined degree, a student may qualify for the award of the Bachelor of Information Technology degree with Honours in accordance with the requirements set out in the resolutions of the Faculty of Engineering and Information Technologies relating to the Bachelor of Information Technology degree as shown in the faculty handbook.

3.2 Bachelor of Commerce with Honours

3.2.1 On completion of the requirements for the combined degree, a student may qualify to enrol in Honours in the Bachelor of Commerce.

3.2.2 To qualify for the award of the Bachelor of Commerce with Honours, a student must complete successfully an additional year of study (the honours year), as specified in the Faculty of Economics and Business Handbook.

4. Units of study

4.1 The units of study, which may be taken for the degrees of Bachelor of Information Technology and Bachelor of Commerce, are set out in the resolutions of the Faculty of Engineering and Information Technologies and the Faculty of Economics and Business respectively.

4.2 The faculty Resolutions (which are reproduced in the Engineering and Information Technologies and Economics and Business Handbooks, as the case may be) specify:

4.2.1 credit point values;

4.2.2 corequisites/perquisites/assumed learning/assumed knowledge; and

4.2.3 any special conditions.

5. Award of the degrees

5.1 A student who completes the requirements for the Bachelor of Information Technology and Bachelor of Commerce degrees shall receive at graduation a separate testamur for each of the degrees.

1. Requirements for the award of the Bachelor of Social Work with Honours

1.1 To qualify to enrol in the Honours program, students shall have a WAM (weighted average mark) of at least 70, averaged across 48 credit points comprising 24 credit points in semester 1 of year 3 and 24 credit points of compulsory units of study in year 2.

1.1.1 Eligibility to apply for the Honours program for candidates entering the BSW in the third year under the accelerated entry provisions will be based on a WAM of at least 70 for units of study in semester 1 of the 3rd year of the BSW.

1.2 For eligible candidates, entry to the honours program will be competitive.

1.3 Availability of places in the Honours program will be determined on the availability of suitable research projects.

1.4 Candidates in the Honours program shall enrol in the specified units of study as set out in the Table of units of study in second semester of year 3 and second semester of year 4 of the BSW.

1.5 The Honours program shall be assessed, at least in part, by a dissertation.

1.6 The Faculty, on the recommendation of the Board of Examiners or the Delegated Faculty Officer, will determine the class of honours.

2. Award of the degree

2.1 In accordance with Academic Board policy, the honours degree of the Bachelor of Social Work shall be awarded to eligible candidates with the following grades:

2.1.1 Honours class 1 (with a HWAM of at least 75%) or

2.1.2 Honours class II, Division 1 (with a HWAM of at least 70%) or

2.1.3 Honours class II, Division II (with a HWAM of at least 65%)

2.2 Honours students who have maintained an outstanding academic record throughout the degree and who have achieved Honours Class I, may be eligible for the award of a university medal, in accordance with Academic Board policy and on nomination by the Faculty with the recommendation of the Board of Examiners.

2.3 Candidates in the Honours program who achieve a WAM of less than 65% shall be awarded the Bachelor of Social Work pass degree.

1.2 A prerequisite unit of study means a unit of study which must have been completed with a result of Pass or better prior to a candidate enrolling in another unit of study for which it is a prerequisite.

1.3 A corequisite unit of study means a unit of study which must be taken concurrently with the unit of study for which it is a corequisite.

1.4 The Dean or Associate Dean (Undergraduate) may vary the entry requirements for units of study for particular candidates in special circumstances.

1.5 All units of study for the degree will be of semester length.

1.6 No unit of study may be credited more than once for the degree.

1.7 All elective units of study are worth 6 credit points. The compulsory units of study total 96 credit points. The credit points for each compulsory unit of study are as indicated in the *Requirements for the pass degree*.

1.8 The elective units of study which may be taken for the degree are as set out in the *Table of undergraduate units of study* including:

2.5 Except with the permission of the Dean or Associate Dean (Undergraduate), candidates in a Combined Law program must successfully complete *Foundations of Law* before enrolling in any other Bachelor of Laws (LLB) units of study.

2.6 Candidates enrolled in the Bachelor of Engineering/Bachelor of Laws (BE/LLB) or the Bachelor of Arts (Media and Communications)/Bachelor of Laws (LLB) must take the Combined Law 4 program in the fifth year of the combined degree and the Combined Law 5 program in the sixth year of the combined degree.

2.7 Candidates in a Combined Law program are under the general supervision of the other Faculty in which they are enrolled until the end of the semester in which they complete the requirements of the other degree. After that, they will be under the general supervision of the Faculty of Law.

2.10 Candidates are normally enrolled in four compulsory units of study in Semester 1 of Combined Law 4/Graduate Law 2, and in four compulsory units of study in Semester 2 of that same year.

2.10.1 If candidates so elect, they may replace one compulsory unit with one elective unit in each semester.

2.10.2 Where such a replacement has occurred, candidates must enrol in the postponed compulsory unit(s) in the final year of their candidature.

3. Requirements for the honours degree

3.1 Honours in the Bachelor of Laws (LLB) may be awarded in two classes: Class I and Class II.

3.2 To qualify for the award of honours in the Bachelor of Laws (LLB) candidates must obtain the following Weighted Average Mark (WAM) across all Law units, including those taken as part of the combined award course and any failures:

3.2.1 First class honours are awarded to candidates who obtain a WAM of 75 percent or higher.

3.2.2 Second class honours are awarded to candidates who obtain a WAM of between 70 percent and 74.9 percent.

3.3 Candidates who qualify for the award of first class honours, and whose work is of outstanding merit in the opinion of the Faculty, may be considered for the award of a University medal.

3.4 An additional honours year is not required.

4.3.1 Candidates satisfy the compulsory jurisprudence requirement of the Bachelor of Laws (LLB) degree by completing at least one 6 credit point unit from Part 2.

4.3.2 A unit may be included in Part 2 if a focus on legal theory is the unit's primary educational goal.

4.3.3 If a focus on the area of law itself is the primary educational goal, the unit should be placed in Part 1.

5. Enrolment in more/less than minimum load

5.1 Except with the permission of the Dean or Associate Dean (Undergraduate), candidates may not enrol in more than 24 credit points in a semester.

5.2 Except with the permission of the Dean or Associate Dean (Undergraduate) candidates may not enrol in less than 18 credit points in a semester.

5.3 A student may not enrol in more than two units of study in any one summer or winter session.

5.4 Except with the permission of the Dean or Associate Dean (Undergraduate), candidates may not enrol in a unit of study after the degree requirements of 144 credit points have been completed.

6. Cross-institutional study

6.1 The Dean or Associate Dean (Undergraduate) may permit candidates to enrol in a unit of study at another tertiary institution and have that unit of study credited to the requirements of the Bachelor of Laws (LLB) degree at the University of Sydney.

6.2 Applications to enrol cross-institutionally as per 6.1 will only be considered if:

6.2.1 the student has already completed 48 credit points towards the Bachelor of Laws (LLB) degree;

6.2.2 the student is seeking credit towards elective units in Part 1 only. Students are not permitted to undertake compulsory units of study or elective units that satisfy the Part 2 requirement on a cross-institutional basis;

6.2.3 the content of the unit of study is not taught in any corresponding unit available at the University of Sydney or the student is unable for good reason to attend a corresponding unit at the University of Sydney;

6.2.4 the student satisfies the usual progression rules, and the maximum enrolment requirements;

6.2.5 the student has not exceeded, or will not exceed in any particular application, the maximum limit of 24 credit points of unspecified credit for all cross-institutional study.

7. Restriction on enrolment

7.1 Restriction on enrolment

7.2 A student may not enrol in any unit of study which overlaps substantially in content with a unit of study already completed, or, for which credit or exemption has been granted towards the degree requirements.

7.3 A student may not enrol concurrently in another award course except where a combined law student is completing the requirements of their Arts, Arts (Media & Communications), Commerce, Economics, Economic and Social Sciences, International and Global Studies, Engineering or Science degree.

8. Discontinuation of Enrolment

8.1 A student seeking a total discontinuation of enrolment in a degree must lodge a change of candidature form with the Faculty of Law by the relevant census date.

8.2 Students seeking to re-enrol must apply to Universities Admissions Centre (UAC) and be reselected for admission in competition with other applicants, and will be subject to the admission criteria of the Faculty at the time.

8.3 Except with the permission of the Dean or Associate Dean (Undergraduate) candidates may not enrol in a unit of study after the degree requirements of 144 credit points have been completed. Students wishing to undertake units of study additional to award course requirements must enrol as a non-award student.

9. Suspension of candidature (Faculty procedures for readmission)

9.1 Candidates must re-enrol each calendar year unless the Dean or Associate Dean (Undergraduate) has permitted a suspension of candidature.

9.2 A student's candidature lapses if they do not re-enrol after an approved suspension of candidature, or they do not seek appropriate approval for a leave of absence.

9.3 Students seeking to suspend their candidature must do so by submitting a change of candidature form to the Faculty by the relevant census date.

9.4 A student whose candidature lapses must re-apply to the Universities Admissions Centre (UAC) and be reselected for admission in competition with other applicants, and will be subject to the admission criteria of the Faculty at the time.

9.5.1 Students are entitled to suspend their law candidature for one year.

9.5.2 The Associate Dean (Undergraduate) may permit a further suspension of one year.

9.5.3 However, suspensions exceeding two years in total will not be approved except in cases of serious illness or misadventure.

9.6 Students will not be permitted to suspend in order to undertake another award course, unless the student can provide evidence that the award course can be completed within two years and the student has not previously suspended.

10. Re-enrolment after an absence

10.1 A student wishing to re-enrol after an approved suspension must notify the Faculty in writing in October of the year preceding enrolment.

11. Satisfactory progress

11.1 The Faculty will require candidates to show good cause why they should be permitted to re-enrol in the Faculty of Law if they have not made satisfactory progress towards fulfilling the requirements of the degree.

11.2 Candidates who do not pass at least 24 credit points in any year of enrolment shall not have made satisfactory progress except when fewer than 24 credit points are required to complete the degree.

11.3 Candidates who fail a unit of study more than once shall not have made satisfactory progress.

11.4 Where the Faculty permits the re-enrolment of candidates whose progress has been unsatisfactory, the Faculty may require the completion of specified units of study or a specified number of credit points in a specified time.

11.5 Candidates who fail to comply with these conditions shall not have made satisfactory progress.

11.6 Candidates must complete the requirements for the degree within ten calendar years of admission to candidature.

12. Time limit

12.1 A time limit of 10 years for completion of the Bachelor of Laws (LLB) degree applies to both Graduate and Combined Law students. This time limit is, however, subject to the Faculty's rules on minimum progression and suspension of candidature.

12.2 Combined Law students should note that the time limit of 10 years also applies to the completion of all the requirements of their Arts, Arts (Media & Communications), Commerce, Economics, Economic and Social Sciences, International and Global Studies, Engineering and Science degrees.

13. Assessment policy

13.1 Candidates are required to attend at least 70 per cent of the scheduled classes in each unit of study for which they are enrolled.

13.2 Candidates whose attendance record falls below this level without reasonable excuse may be precluded by the Dean or Pro-Dean (Teaching Programs) from taking the final assessment in that unit of study.

13.3 Candidates may be assessed by written and oral examinations, exercises, essays, class participation, mooting, a supervised research project, or practical work, or any combination of these as the Faculty may determine.

13.4.1 The Dean or Associate Dean (Undergraduate) may permit further assessment in a unit of study in cases of special consideration, in accordance with Academic Board policy governing illness and misadventure, provided that such assessment can be completed within 44 7 days following the end of the examination period, and no later than that.

~~13.4.2 Only in exceptional circumstances, and only with the permission of the Dean, will further assessment be allowed to be undertaken after this 14 day period.~~

13.4.2 Further assessment refers to any piece of outstanding assessment as defined in clause 13.3. It does not refer to supplementary assessment following a failed attempt.

13.4.3 Only in exceptional circumstances, and only with the permission of the Dean, will further assessment be allowed to be undertaken after this 7 day period.

14. Credit transfer policy

14.1 A minimum of 96 credit points must have been studied at the University of Sydney in order to qualify for the degree.

14.2 Candidates may be granted credit for up to 48 credit points for units of study completed during a previous candidature in an award course of the University of Sydney or at an equivalent institution approved by the Faculty.

14.3 Non-specific credit may be granted for up to 24 of these 48 credit points for units of study not sufficiently related to units of study in Part 1 or Part 2 of the *Table of undergraduate units of study* which form part of a Bachelor of Laws (LLB) degree, or its equivalent in another jurisdiction, or which otherwise relate to the study of Law.

14.4 A candidate will not be granted credit toward the degree for any units of study;

14.4.1 for which the result is a Terminating Pass, Conceded Pass or the equivalent;

14.4.2 which were completed more than nine years before admission to candidature for the degree;

14.4.3 undertaken in the Bachelor of Arts and Sciences (BAS) degree at the University of Sydney.

14.5 Candidates will not be granted credit toward the degree for any units of study which have been relied upon to qualify for another degree or academic qualification except for units of study which were taken as part of a Combined Law degree program and credited to the non-law degree component of that program.

14.6 Candidates who have completed a law degree or an equivalent professional legal qualification from a recognised institution outside Australia may be granted up to 48 credit points of non-specific credit.

15. Transitional provisions

15.1 All candidates who enrolled first in a Combined Law degree prior to 1 January 2007 will proceed under the resolutions in place when they commenced the degree, except as provided below.

15.2 All candidates who first enrolled in a Graduate Law degree prior to 1 January 2008 will proceed under the resolutions in place when they commenced the degree, except as provided below.

15.3 All candidates who first enrolled in Combined Law prior to January 1 2007, and who had completed no more than *Foundations of Law, Torts and Legal Research* prior to 1 January 2007 (or are given credit for these units of study), will be transferred to these degree resolutions.

15.4 If they have completed *Legal Research*, then they will be given credit for *Legal Research II*. In the event of any inconsistency between the 2004 resolutions for the Bachelor of Laws (LLB) degree and these resolutions, these resolutions shall apply.

15.5 All candidates who first enrolled in Graduate Law prior to January 1 ~~2007~~ 2008, and who had completed no more than *Foundations of Law, Torts* and *Legal Research* prior to 1 January 2007 (or are given credit for these units of study), will be transferred to these degree resolutions.

15.6 If they have completed *Legal Research*, then they will be given credit for *Legal Research II*. In the event of any inconsistency between the 2004 resolutions for the Bachelor of Laws (LLB) degree and these resolutions, these resolutions shall apply.

15.7 All students who commenced this degree in 2006 (Combined Law) and 2008 (Graduate Law) shall complete under these resolutions.

15.8 Notwithstanding the preceding transitional provisions, any candidate who commenced the degree prior to 1 January 2009 and who has completed less than 24 credit points under the former 2005 revised degree resolutions, will be automatically transferred to these degree resolutions and given credit for those units of study.

16. Variation of requirements for the degree

16.1 The Dean may vary these resolutions for a particular candidate in exceptional circumstances.

Rural Student Entry Scheme to Physiotherapy 2008

OUTLINE OF THE SCHEME

The purpose of the Rural Student Entry Scheme is to redress the imbalance that currently exists in the proportion of health care professionals within urban and rural settings. The Discipline of Physiotherapy endeavours to support the rural health community by enabling suitable students with significant rural backgrounds to compete for a separate entry quota. The Discipline has set aside up to five places in its physiotherapy course for prospective rural students who meet the selection criteria outlined below (see criteria numbered 1 to 4). (The reduced UAI will reflect a degree of educational disadvantage, but should not compromise the applicant's ability to meet the academic requirements of the course). Applicants must be Australian Citizens, New Zealand Citizens or Australian Permanent Residents.

Criteria for Selection

1. For 2007 New South Wales HSC students or equivalent, a UAI of not less than 5 points below the main round cut off mark for the year of application.

Additionally, all 2006 New South Wales HSC students (or equivalent) are eligible to apply if they have not completed one full-time year (or part-time equivalent) of tertiary study and meet the UAI cut off as described above for 2007 New South Wales HSC students. (Tertiary study refers to Diploma, Advanced Diploma, Bachelor Degree or higher qualification recognised by the University of Sydney).

2. You must have completed at least the last four years of secondary education at a rural school (the definition of "rural" is detailed below).
3. You must have lived in a rural area for a significant period of time (the definition of "rural" is detailed below).
4. You must be able to demonstrate a commitment to a career in a rural health setting. (This may include an exceptional record of involvement and achievement in community affairs at school or local community level in a rural environment).

Definition of "Rural"

The basis for the definition of "rural" will be the area encompassing the rural NSW Area Health Service regions, as announced by the NSW Department of Health on 16 March 1966, or the equivalent definition of rural applicable to other States. Basically, all of New South Wales is considered rural with the exception of Sydney, Central Coast, Newcastle, Wollongong, the Blue Mountains and their surrounding areas.

Application Process

In addition to lodging an application with the University Admission Centre (UAC), applicants must complete a Rural Student Entry Scheme application form and return it to the Faculty of Health Sciences by 30 November 2007. All supporting documentation including a reference from your school principal and at least one other rural community leader must be attached to your application form. Applicants who meet all of the criteria for selection will then be ranked according to their confirmed UAI score.
