Faculty of Rural Management: Bachelor of Land Management (Ecological Agriculture) and Advanced Diploma of Land Management (Ecological Agriculture)

Degrees, Diplomas and Certificates in the Faculty of Rural Management

The Resolutions of the Senate relating to the Degrees, Diplomas and Certificates in the Faculty of Rural Management (pp 587-588, *Calendar 1999, Volume 1: Statutes and Regulations*) are amended as follows:

1. Insert in paragraph 1 a new part (b)
'(b) *Bachelor of Land Management (Ecological Agriculture) BLandMgmt (EcolAgric)*'
and renumber the remaining parts.
2. Insert in paragraph 2 a new part (b)
'(b) *Advanced Diploma of Land Management (Ecological Agriculture) AdvDipLandMgmt (EcolAgric)*'
and renumber the remaining parts.

Bachelor of Business (Agricultural Commerce), Bachelor of Equine Business Management, Bachelor of Farm Management, Bachelor of Horticultural Management, Bachelor of Land Management, Bachelor of Management, Bachelor of Rural Business Administration, Advanced Diploma of Business (Agricultural Commerce), Advanced Diploma of Equine Business Management, Advanced Diploma of Farm Management, Advanced Diploma of Horticultural Management, Advanced Diploma of Horticulture, Advanced Diploma of Land Management, Advanced Diploma of Management, Advanced Diploma of Rural Business Administration, Advanced Diploma of Viticultural Management

The Resolutions of the Senate relating to the above courses in the Faculty of Rural Management (pp 588-595., *Calendar 1999, Volume 1: Statutes and Regulations*) are amended as follows:

1. Insert in appropriate alphabetical order the names *Bachelor of Land Management (Ecological Agriculture)* and *Advanced Diploma of Land Management (Ecological Agriculture)*
2. Insert in paragraph 4 a new part (b) as follows and renumber the remaining parts:
 - (b) *To qualify for the Bachelor of Land Management (Ecological Agriculture) Pass degree, candidates must satisfactorily complete 24 units (144 credit points):*
 - (i) *11 core units (66 credit points),*
 - (ii) *a minimum of 9 course selection units (54 credit points) with at least 2 units (12 credit points) from each of Group A, B and C,*
 - (iii) *a maximum of 4 option units (24 credit points)*
as indicated in the table of units appended to these resolutions, and
 - (iv) *a Capability Portfolio as may be prescribed by the Faculty of Rural Management from time to time.*
3. Insert in paragraph 8 a new part (b) as follows and renumber the remaining parts:
 - (b) *To qualify for the Advanced Diploma of Land Management (Ecological Agriculture), candidates must satisfactorily complete 16 units (96 credit points):*
 - (i) *8 core units (48 credit points),*

- (ii) a minimum of 5 course selection units (30 credit points) with at least 2 units (12 credit points) from each of Group A, B and C,
(iii) a maximum of 3 option units (18 credit points)
as indicated in the table of units appended to these resolutions, and
(iv) a Capability Portfolio as may be prescribed by the Faculty of Rural Management from time to time.

4. Add the following *Table of Units: Bachelor of Land Management (Ecological Agriculture) and Advanced Diploma of Land Management (Ecological Agriculture)*

4. The units of study which may be taken for the degree are set out under subject areas in the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts Part A and Part B together with

- designation as Junior, Intermediate (in the case of Science units), Senior or Honours, and where appropriate as Advanced, units of study,
- credit point values,
- assumed knowledge, corequisites / prerequisites,
- the semesters in which they are offered,
- the units of study with which they are mutually exclusive.

5. A student who wishes to enrol in a unit of study prescribed for a bachelor degree other than for the degree in which they are enrolled must obtain written permission from the Chair of department responsible for the unit of study and from the Dean of the Faculty of Arts.

Requirements for the Pass Degree of Bachelor of Arts

6. To qualify for the award of the degree a student shall complete units of study having a total value of 144 credit points, including

- (a) at least 96 senior credit points;
- (b) at least one major from the list of Part A majors, which shall include no more than 16 senior credit points from cross-listed units of study, except in the case of Semiotics, Medieval Studies, and European Studies where the entire major may be cross-listed and in such other subject areas as may be approved by the Dean;
- (c) no more than 48 junior credit points, except that the Dean may give permission for a further 12 junior credit points to be counted when taken in the student's third or later semester of study at the University of Sydney;
- (d) no more than 18 credit points from units in which a grade of Pass (Concessional) has been awarded;
- (e) no more than 18 junior credit points from the same subject area;
- (f) no more than 64 senior credit points from the same subject area.

7.(a) A Part A major consists of 32 senior credit points in a single subject area listed in Part A of the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts or of at least 16 senior credit points from a Part A subject area combined with no more than 16 senior credit points from units of study approved by the Dean for cross-listing with the major, except in the case of Semiotics, Medieval Studies, and European Studies where the entire major may be cross-listed and in such other subject areas as may be approved by the Dean.

(b) A Part B major consists of a major in a subject area from the Faculties of Economics and Business, Education and Science as defined in the regulations of those faculties

8. Units of study completed at the University of Sydney Summer School which correspond to units of study in the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts may be credited towards the course requirements.

9. The testamur for the pass degree of Bachelor of Arts shall specify the major(s).

11. To qualify to enrol in an honours course, students shall
- (a) (i) have qualified for the award of the pass degree, or
(ii) be a pass graduate of the Faculty of Arts or of another Faculty of the University of Sydney, or
(iii) be a pass graduate holding a Bachelor of Arts degree or an equivalent degree from another institution
and
- (b) (i) have completed at least 48 senior credit points in the subject area concerned, completed at an average of credit level, or
(ii) have completed the requirements of the Faculties of Science, Economics and Business, and Education, for subject areas listed in Part B of the Table of Units of Study for the BA, as appropriate
and
- (c) have met any other entry requirements as specified in the Table of Units Study for the BA, except that the entry requirement must not exceed 64 Senior credit points in the subject area concerned
and

-
- (d) have the written approval of the Chair of department concerned.
12. A student who is qualified to enrol in two honours courses may either:
- (i) complete the honours courses in the two subject areas separately and in succession, or
- (ii) complete a joint honours course, equivalent to an honours course in a single subject area, in the two subject areas. A joint honours course shall comprise such parts of the two honours courses as may be decided by the Dean.
13. Candidature is normally full-time. Full-time students must complete the requirements over two consecutive semesters.
14. A student may seek permission from the Dean to undertake the honours course on a part-time basis. Part-time candidature must not exceed four consecutive semesters.
15. A student may seek written permission from the Dean to suspend candidature.
16. Suspension may be granted for a maximum period of one semester.
17. In the case of a student being granted suspension the student must not exceed five consecutive semesters, including the semester of suspension.
18. Students resuming the honours course after a period of suspension must advise the Faculty of Arts office in writing of their intention to re-enrol.
19. A student may not:
- (a) enrol in any fourth year unit of study without first qualifying for the award of the pass degree,
- (b) be awarded the pass degree while enrolled in final year honours, or
- (c) enrol concurrently in a fourth year unit of study and any other course or unit of study,
- (d) enrol in more than two fourth year units per semester.
20. Candidates for combined degrees are required to transfer to the single Bachelor of Arts candidature when enrolled in fourth year units of study.
21. To qualify for the award of an honours degree, students shall complete 48 credit points of honours units of study, comprising four, 12 credit point semester length units of study.
22. The grade of honours and the honours mark are determined by performance in the honours course.
23. The award of honours degrees, the level at which they are awarded and the award of the University Medal shall be determined by the Dean on the advice of the Faculty Honours Committee.
24. A student with an honours mark of 90 and a meritorious record in previous studies may be considered by the Dean on the advice of the Faculty Honours Committee for the award of the University Medal.
25. The testamur for the honours course shall specify the subject area or areas and the grade of honours, and the medal if awarded. It shall not include majors.
26. Students who fail or discontinue - fail final year honours may not re-enrol in it.
27. The provisions of resolutions 11 to 26 shall also apply to candidates for the Diploma of Arts, the Diploma of Language Studies and the Diploma of Social Sciences, as well as for non-degree, Access to University, exchange and Study Abroad students.

Requirements for the Bachelor of Arts (Asian Studies)

28. To qualify for the award of the pass degree a student shall complete units of study having a total value of 144 credit points, including
- (a) at least 96 senior credit points in units of study in the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts including at least 64 senior credit points from the following Asian Studies subject areas which must include at least 32 senior credit points in one of the Asian languages:
- Arabic Language, Literature and Culture
Arab World, Islam and the Middle East
Asian Studies, including units of study cross-listed for the Asian Studies major
Chinese Studies
Hindi-Urdu
Indonesian and Malay Studies
Japanese
Korean
Sanskrit
Thai

(b) no more than 48 junior credit points, except that the Dean may give permission for a further 12 junior credit points to be counted when taken in the student's third or later semester of study at the University of Sydney.

(c) no more than 18 credit points from units in which a grade of Pass (Concessional) has been awarded.

29.(a) A Part A major consists of 32 senior credit points in a single subject area listed in Part A of the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts or of at least 16 senior credit points from a Part A subject area combined with no more than 16 senior credit points from units of study approved by the Dean for cross-listing with the major, except in the case of Semiotics, Medieval Studies, and European Studies where the entire major may be cross-listed and in such other subject areas as may be approved by the Dean.

(b) A Part B major consists of a major in a subject area from the Faculties of Economics and Business, Education and Science as defined in the regulations of those faculties.

30. Units of study completed at the University of Sydney Summer School which correspond to units of study in the Table of Units of Study may be credited towards the course requirements.

31. The testamur for the pass degree of Bachelor of Arts (Asian Studies) shall specify the major(s).

Honours Courses

32. To qualify to enrol in Bachelor of Arts (Asian Studies) honours course, students shall

- (a) (i) have qualified for the award of the pass degree;
(ii) have completed at least 48 senior credit points in the subject area concerned, completed at an average of credit level,

and

(b) have met any other entry requirements as specified in the Table of Units Study for the BA, except that the entry requirement must not exceed 64 Senior credit points in the subject area concerned

and

(c) have the written approval of the Chair of department, or Head of School, concerned.

33. To qualify for the award of the Bachelor of Arts (Asian Studies) honours degree a student shall

(a) complete a final year honours course in one or two of the following Asian Studies subject areas:

Arabic Language, Literature and Culture

Arab World, Islam and the Middle East

Asian Studies, including units of study cross-listed for the Asian Studies major

Chinese Studies

Hindi-Urdu

Indonesian and Malay Studies

Japanese

Korean

Sanskrit

Thai

(b) comply with clauses 13 to 27 of the requirements for the Bachelor of Arts (Honours) course.

Requirements for the degree of Bachelor of Arts (Languages)

34. To qualify for the award of the degree a student shall complete units of study having a total value of 192 credit points from the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts including

(a) at least 120 senior credit points, which may include those used to satisfy the requirements of sections (b) and/or (c);

(b) two majors, at least one of which must be one of these languages:

Arabic Language, Literature and Culture

Chinese Studies

Hebrew (Modern)
Hindi-Urdu
Japanese
Indonesian and Malay Studies
French Studies
Germanic Studies
Italian
Korean
Modern Greek
Thai

(c) a minimum of 24 senior credit points (or equivalent) for a semester abroad, or, 48 senior credit points for a year abroad, undertaken in an appropriate university in Europe, the Middle East or Asia usually during the third year of candidature. A minimum of 8 credit points for a semester abroad and 16 credit points for a year abroad must be part of the language major in section (b).

(d) no more than 72 junior credit points.

(e) no more than 18 credit points from units in which a grade of Pass (Concessional) has been awarded.

35.(a) A Part A major consists of 32 senior credit points in a single subject area listed in Part A of the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts or of at least 16 senior credit points from a Part A subject area combined with no more than 16 senior credit points from units of study approved by the Dean for cross-listing with the major, except in the case of Semiotics, Medieval Studies, and European Studies where the entire major may be cross-listed and in such other subject areas as may be approved by the Dean.

(b) A Part B major consists of a major in a subject area from the Faculties of Economics and Business, Education and Science as defined in the regulations of those faculties.

36. Units of study completed at the University of Sydney Summer School which correspond to units of study in the Table of Units of Study may be credited towards the course requirements.

37. The testamur for the pass degree of Bachelor of Arts (Languages) shall specify the major(s).

38. The degree may be awarded with High Distinction or Distinction or Pass on the basis of a Weighted Average Mark, or after completion of an honours course with an honours grade.

Honours courses

39. To qualify to enrol in a Bachelor of Arts (Languages) honours course, students shall

(a) have completed the requirements for the award of the Bachelor of Arts (Languages) with the grade of Distinction or High Distinction

(b) have completed the requirements of the Faculties of Science, Economics and Business, and Education, for subject areas listed in Part B of the Table of Units of Study for the BA, as appropriate and

(c) have met any other entry requirements as specified in the Table of Units Study for the BA, except that the entry requirement must not exceed 64 Senior credit points in the subject area concerned and

(d) have the written approval of the Chair of department concerned.

40. To qualify for the award of the Bachelor of Arts (Languages) honours courses, students shall

(a) successfully complete 48 credit points in units of study at 4000 level in one of the languages listed under 34(b)

(b) comply with clauses 13 to 27 of the requirements for the Bachelor of Arts (Honours) course.

41. A student who is qualified to enrol in two honours courses may either:

(a) complete the honours courses in the two subject areas separately and in succession, one of which must be in one of the languages listed under 34(b), the other may be in a subject area available for the Bachelor of Arts degree, or

(b) complete a joint honours course, equivalent to an honours course in a single subject area, in the two subject areas, one of which must be in one of the languages listed under 34(b), the other may be in a subject area available for the Bachelor of Arts degree,. A joint honours course shall comprise such parts of the two honours courses as may be decided by the Dean.

Requirements for the degree of Bachelor of Arts Informatics

- (d) an Arts Informatics Project to count either as 8 or 16 senior credit points;
- (e) no more than 72 junior credit points in total, including ARIN 1000 and INFO 1000;
- (f) no more than 18 credit points from units in which a grade of Pass(Concessional) has been awarded.

43.(a) A Part A major consists of 32 senior credit points in a single subject area listed in Part A of the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts or of at least 16 senior credit points from a Part A subject area combined with no more than 16 senior credit points from units of study approved by the Dean for cross-listing with the major, except in the case of Semiotics, Medieval Studies, and European Studies where the entire major may be cross-listed and in such other subject areas as may be approved by the Dean.

(b) A Part B major consists of a major in a subject area from the Faculties of Economics and Business, Education and Science as defined in the regulations of those faculties.

45. The testamur for the pass degree of Bachelor of Arts Informatics shall specify the major(s).

46. The degree may be awarded with High Distinction or Distinction or Pass on the basis of a Weighted Average Mark, or after completion of an honours course with an honours grade.

Honours courses

47. To qualify to enrol in a Bachelor of Arts Informatics honours course, students shall have completed the requirements for the award of the Bachelor of Arts Informatics with the grade of Distinction or High Distinction

48. A student may apply to complete an honours course in a subject area in which an honours course is available for the Bachelor of Arts degree, in accordance with clauses 11(b) to 26.

Requirements for the degree of Bachelor of Arts (Media and Communications)

49. To qualify for the award of the degree a student shall complete units of study having a total value of 192 credit points from the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts and for the Bachelor of Economics (Social Sciences) including

- (a) at least 120 senior or intermediate credit points, including those used to satisfy the requirements of sections (c), (d) and (e).
- (b) MECO 1001 (6 junior credit points), MECO 1002 (6 junior credit points) and ENGL 1050 (6 junior credit points) or a unit of study in communication and analytical skills or in other academic skills, as may be prescribed by the Faculty from time to time.
- (c) a major in Media and Communications comprising 32 senior credit points in units of study from the subject area Media and Communications, and a Part A major or one major prescribed for the degree of Bachelor of Economics (Social Sciences).
- (d) three 8 senior credit point units of study in Government and Media, Law and Media and Media Relations, as may be prescribed by the Faculty from time to time.

54. To qualify for the award of the degree a student shall complete units of study having a total value of 192 credit points from the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts and from the Bachelor of Economics (Social Sciences) including

(a) at least 120 senior or intermediate credit points, including those used to satisfy the requirements of sections (b), (c), (d) and (e).

(b) a major in one of the following subject areas:

59. To qualify to enrol in a Bachelor of Social Sciences honours course, students shall have completed the requirements for the award of the Bachelor of Social Sciences with the grade of Distinction or High Distinction

60. A student may apply to complete an honours course in a subject area in which an honours course is available for the Bachelor of Arts degree, in accordance with clauses 11(b) to 26.

Combined degrees (joint resolutions)

Arts/Economics & Business: joint resolutions

Requirements for the degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Commerce

61. A student may proceed concurrently to the degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Commerce.
62. To qualify for the award of the pass degrees a student shall complete 240 credit points from units of study set out in the *Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts, Parts A and B* and the *Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Commerce* including:
- (a) at least 72 senior credit points from units of study in Part A of the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts;
 - (b) one major from Part A as defined in the resolutions for the Bachelor of Arts including at least 16 senior credit points from units of study in Part A;
 - (c) 12 junior credit points in each of Accounting, Econometrics and Economics;
 - (d) at least 64 senior credit points from units of study in Economics and Business subject areas;
 - (e) two majors in Economics and Business subject areas.
63. Students who are qualified to do so may undertake honours in either or both degrees or a joint honours course on completion of the combined degree.
64. Students may abandon the combined degree course and elect to complete either a Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Commerce in accordance with the resolutions governing those degrees.
65. Supervision of all students in the combined degrees will be the responsibility of the Faculty of Arts and the Faculty of Economics and Business which will alternate in an agreed pattern.
66. The Deans of the Faculty of Economics and Business and of the Faculty of Arts shall jointly exercise authority in any matter concerning the combined degree program not otherwise dealt with in the Resolutions of the Senate or these resolutions.

Arts/Law: joint resolutions

Requirements for the degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Laws

67. A student may proceed concurrently to the degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Laws.
68. To qualify for the award of the pass Bachelor of Arts a student shall complete 96 credit points from units of study set out in the *Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts, Parts A and B* and 48 credit points from Law units of study approved for study within the combined degree program by the Dean of the Faculty of Law including:
- (a) at least 48 senior credit points from units of study in the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts;
 - (b) no more than 48 junior credit points from units of study in the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts, Parts A and B, excluding Law units of study;
 - (c) one major from Part A.
69. Students who qualify to undertake honours in the Bachelor of Arts degree may elect to do so either
- (a) by suspending candidature from the Bachelor of Laws degree for one year, with the permission of the Faculty of Law, or
 - (b) after completion of the combined course.
70. Students may abandon the combined degree course and elect to complete a Bachelor of Arts in accordance with the resolutions governing the Bachelor of Arts.
71. Students will be under the general supervision of the Faculty of Arts until the end of the semester in which they complete the requirements for the Bachelor of Arts. After that they will be under the general supervision of the Faculty of Law and will then complete the remaining requirements for the Bachelor of Laws in accordance with the resolutions for that degree.
72. The Deans of the Faculties of Law and Arts shall jointly exercise authority in any matter concerning the combined degree program not otherwise dealt with in these resolutions.

Arts/Music: joint resolutions

Requirements for the degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Music

73. A student may proceed concurrently to the degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Music.

74. To qualify for the award of the pass degrees a student shall complete over ten semesters 240 credit points from units of study set out in the *Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts, Parts A and B* and the *Units of Study for the Bachelor of Music* including:

- (a) at least 18 junior credit points from units of study in Part A of the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts, other than Music;
- (b) at least 72 senior credit points from units of study in Part A of the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts, other than Music;
- (c) one major from Part A as defined in the resolutions for the Bachelor of Arts including at least 16 senior credit points from units of study in Part A, other than Music;
- (d) 12 junior and 32 senior credit points from units of study in the subject area Music in the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Music;
- (e) the 60 professional Music credit points prescribed for the Bachelor of Music, as set out in the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Music.

75. Students who are qualified to do so may undertake honours in either or both degrees or a joint honours course on completion of the combined degree.

76. Students may abandon the combined degree course and elect to complete either a Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Music in accordance with the resolutions governing those degrees.

77. Students will be under the general supervision of the Faculty of Arts.

78. The Chair of the Board of Studies in Music and the Deans of the Faculty of Arts shall jointly exercise authority in any matter concerning the combined degree program not otherwise dealt with in the Resolutions of the Senate or in these resolutions.

Arts/Science: joint resolutions

Requirements for the degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science

79. A student may proceed concurrently to the degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Science (Advanced) or Bachelor of Science (Advanced Mathematics) within either a BA/BSc or BSc/BA course.

80. To qualify for the award of the pass degrees a student shall complete units of study from the Table of Undergraduate Units of Study for the Bachelor of Science and the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts having a total value of 240 credit points including

- (a) at least 100 credit points from Science subject areas;
- (b) at least 12 credit points from the Science subject areas of Mathematics and Statistics;
- (c) at least 24 credit points of junior units of study from at least two Science subject areas other than Mathematics or Statistics;
- (d) no more than 96 credit points from junior units of study;
- (e) a major in a Science subject area;
- (f) at least 72 credit points of Senior units of study in Part A of the Table of Units of Study in the Bachelor of Arts;
- (g) one major from Part A as defined in the resolutions for the Bachelor of Arts including at least 16 senior credit points from units of study in Part A.

81. To qualify for the award of the pass degree in an Advanced stream of the Bachelor of Science degree a student shall satisfy in addition to the requirements of Section 48 or 49 of the resolutions of the Faculty of Science the requirements in Section 22 or 24.

82. Students who are qualified to do so may undertake honours courses in either or both degrees or a joint honours course at the completion of the combined degrees.

83. Students may abandon the combined degree course and elect to complete either a Bachelor of Science or a Bachelor of Arts in accordance with the resolutions governing these degrees.

84. Supervision of all students in the combined degrees will be the responsibility of the Faculty of Science and the Faculty of Arts which will alternate in an agreed pattern.

85. The Deans of the Faculty of Arts and Science shall jointly exercise authority in any matter concerning the combined degrees not otherwise dealt with in these resolutions.

Arts/Social Work: joint resolutions

Requirements for the degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Social Work

86. A student may proceed concurrently to the degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Social Work.

87. To qualify for the award of the pass degrees a student shall complete over ten semesters 240 credit points from units of study set out in the *Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts, Parts A and B* and the Units of Study prescribed for the third and fourth years of the Bachelor of Social Work including:

(a) 96 credit points from the prescribed units of study for the third and fourth years of the Bachelor of Social Work;

(b) 48 junior credit points from units of study in the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts including 12 credit points of Sociology;

(c) 16 credit points of Senior units of study of Sociology including SCLG2521 *Social Inquiry: Research Methods in Society*;

(d) 64 senior credit points from units of study from Part A of the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts;

(e) one major from Part A as defined in the resolutions for the Bachelor of Arts including at least 16 senior credit points from units of study in Part A;

(f) 16 intermediate or senior credit points of units of study in Psychology or Psychology for Social Work.

88.(a) Students may qualify for honours in either degree.

(b) Students who qualify to undertake honours in the Bachelor of Arts degree may elect to do so either

(i) by suspending candidature from the Bachelor of Social Work degree for one year, with the permission of Chair of the Board of Studies in Social Work, or

(ii) after completion of the combined course.

89. The Bachelor of Arts degree will be awarded at the end of the sixth semester if the requirements for the award of the degree have been satisfied and the student may then qualify for the award of the Bachelor of Social Work by completing the units of study prescribed for the third and fourth years of the degree.

90. Students may abandon the combined degree course and elect to complete either a Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Social Work in accordance with the resolutions governing those degrees.

91. Students will be under the general supervision of the Faculty of Arts until the completion of the requirements for the Bachelor of Arts, and after that under the general supervision of the Board of Studies in Social Work.

92. The Chair of the Board of Studies in Social Work and the Dean of the Faculty of Arts shall jointly exercise authority in any matter concerning the combined degree program not otherwise dealt with in these resolutions.

Arts/Theology: joint resolutions

Requirements for the degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Theology

93. A student may proceed concurrently to the degrees of Bachelor of Arts from the University of Sydney and Bachelor of Theology from the Sydney College of Divinity.

94. Applications are made through the Universities Admission centre and are considered in terms of the admission policies of the University of Sydney and the Sydney College of Divinity. A person who already holds either a Bachelor of Arts or a Bachelor of Theology is not eligible for admission to the combined degree.

95. To qualify for the award of the pass degrees a student shall complete over ten semesters 120 credit points from units of study set out in the *Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts, Parts A and B*, including at least 72 senior credit points, and the equivalent of 120 credit points from the requirements for the Bachelor of Theology at the Sydney College of Divinity including:

(a) one major from Part A as defined in the resolutions for the Bachelor of Arts including at least 16 senior credit points from units of study in Part A;

(b) at the Sydney College of Divinity, either two majors and one sub-major or one major and two sub-majors including the equivalent of 24 credit points in each of the areas Biblical Studies, Theology and Pastoral Theology and Practice.

96. Credit for previous studies may be given:

(a) by the Sydney College of Divinity for Theology Studies completed not more than nine years before admission or re-admission to candidature which have not been used to qualify for another award, to a maximum of 48 credit points;

(b) by the Faculty of Arts under its credit policies;

(c) the total credit given by the Sydney College of Divinity and the Faculty of Arts shall not exceed 96 credit points.

97. The degrees must be completed within ten years from the date of admission.

98. Students who have completed the requirements for the Bachelor of Arts and are otherwise qualified to do so may complete an honours course to qualify for the Bachelor of Arts (Honours) provided they suspend their candidature for the combined degree with the permission of the Sydney College of Divinity.

99. Students may abandon the combined degree course and elect to complete either a Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Theology in accordance with the resolutions governing those degrees.

100. Students will be under the general supervision of the Faculty of Arts.

101. The Sydney College of Divinity and the Dean of the Faculty of Arts shall jointly exercise authority in any matter concerning the combined degree program not otherwise dealt with in these resolutions.

Arts/Education: joint resolutions

Requirements for the degrees of Bachelor of Education (Secondary: Humanities and Social Sciences) and Bachelor of Arts

102. A student may proceed concurrently to the degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Education (Secondary: Humanities and Social Sciences) and Bachelor of Arts.

103. To qualify for the award of the pass degrees a student shall complete over ten semesters 240 credit points from units of study set out in the *Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts, Parts A and B* and the *Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Education* including:

(a) at least 72 senior credit points from units of study in Part A of the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts;

(b) one major from Part A as defined in the resolutions for the Bachelor of Arts including at least 16 senior credit points from units of study in Part A;

(c) a major in Education;

(d) at least 32 credit points of units of study in Methods and Practice of Teaching;

(e) 32 credit points in Teaching and Learning including successful completion of the practicum.

104. Students who are qualified to do so may undertake honours in either or both degrees or a joint honours course on completion of the combined degree course.

105. Students may abandon the combined degree course and elect to complete either a Bachelor of Education (Secondary: Humanities and Social Sciences) or a Bachelor of Arts in accordance with the resolutions governing those degrees.

106. Students will be under the general supervision of the Faculty of Education .

107. The Deans of the Faculty of Education and Arts shall jointly exercise authority in any matter concerning the combined degree program not otherwise dealt with in these resolutions.

Arts/Engineering: joint resolutions

Requirements for the degrees of Bachelor of Engineering and Bachelor of Arts

108. A student may proceed concurrently to the degrees of Bachelor of Arts and any stream of the Bachelor of Engineering.

109. To qualify for the award of the pass degrees a student shall complete 240 credit points from units of study set out in the *Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts, Parts A and B* and the units of study prescribed for the BE stream being undertaken (totalling at least 160 credit points) including:

(a) 80 credit points from Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts, of which at least 56 must be senior credit points from Part A;

(b) one major from Part A as defined in the resolutions for the Bachelor of Arts including at least 16 senior credit points from units of study in Part A.

110. Students who are qualified to do so may be awarded honours in the Bachelor of Engineering degree, and they may on completion of the combined program qualify for the Bachelor of Arts (Honours) by completing an honours course.

111. Students may abandon the combined degree course and elect to complete either a Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Engineering in accordance with the resolutions governing those degrees.

112. Students will be under the general supervision of the Faculty of Engineering

113. The Deans of the Faculties of Engineering and Arts shall jointly exercise authority in any matter concerning the combined degree program not otherwise dealt with in these resolutions.

Arts/Nursing: joint resolutions

Requirements for the degrees of Bachelor of Nursing and Bachelor of Arts

114. A student may proceed concurrently to the degrees of Bachelor of Nursing and Bachelor of Arts.

115. To qualify for the award of the pass degrees a student shall complete over ten semesters 240 credit points from units of study set out in the *Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts, Parts A and B* and the units of study prescribed for the Bachelor of Nursing including:

(a) 108 credit points from units of study set out in the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts, including at least 72 credit points from units of study in Part A of the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts;

(b) one major from Part A of the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts as defined in the resolutions for the Bachelor of Arts including at least 16 senior credit points from units of study in Part A;

(c) at least 132 credit points of study listed in the Table of Units for the degree of Bachelor of Nursing.

116. Students who are qualified to do so may undertake honours in either or both degrees or a joint honours course on completion of the combined degree.

117. Students may abandon the combined degree course and elect to complete either a Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Nursing in accordance with the resolutions governing those degrees.

118. Students will be under the general supervision of the Faculty of Nursing.

119. The Deans of the Faculties of Nursing and Arts shall jointly exercise authority in any matter concerning the combined degree program not otherwise dealt with in these resolutions.

SECTION 2

Enrolment in more/less than minimum load

120.(a) A student may not enrol in more than a total of 48 credit points in the first two semesters of study, unless advanced standing or credit has been granted to permit enrolment in senior units.

(b) A student must enrol in at least 9 junior credit points or 8 senior credit points per semester.

(c) A student may not enrol without first obtaining permission from the Dean in additional units of study once the degree requirements of 144 credit points have been satisfied.

(d) The maximum enrolment in a subject area is 18 junior credit points and 64 senior credit points.

Repeating a unit of study

121.(a) A student who has been awarded a Pass (Concessional) in a unit of study may repeat that unit, but, if subsequently awarded a grade of Pass or better, no further credit points will be gained unless the unit of study previously had not been credited under Section 7(f).

(b) A student who has already passed a unit of study which has been credited to the course may not re-enrol in it in order to gain a better grade.

(c) A student may be granted exemption from certain requirements of a unit of study if the Chair of department is satisfied that the relevant competence has been demonstrated.

Cross-institutional enrolment

122. Provided that permission has been obtained in advance, the Dean may permit a student to complete a unit of study at another institution and have that unit credited to his/her course requirements provided that either

(a) the unit of study content is material not taught in any corresponding unit of study in the University, or

(b) the student is unable for good reason to attend a corresponding unit of study at the University.

Restrictions on enrolment

123. Units of study which overlap substantially in content are noted in the Tables of Undergraduate Units of Study for the various degrees. Such units of study are mutually exclusive and no more than one of the overlapping units of study may be counted towards meeting the course requirements.

Satisfactory progress

124.(a) Students under the general supervision of the Faculty of Arts are expected to have passed at least 18 junior credit points in the first two semesters of enrolment and 16 credit points in subsequent years of enrolment.

(b) If a student fails or discontinues enrolment in one unit of study twice, a warning will be issued that if the unit is failed a third time, the student may be asked to show good cause why he or she should be allowed to re-enrol in that unit of study.

Assessment policy

125. Students may be tested by written and oral examinations, exercises, essays or practical work or any combination of these as the Faculty may determine.

126. Where a unit of study is offered at different levels of difficulty, the performance of students will be matched so that a grade obtained at one level indicates a quality of work comparable with that required for the same grade at the other level(s).

127. Chairs of department may arrange for further testing in cases of special consideration, in accordance with Academic Board policy governing illness and misadventure.

128. The award of a Pass (Conditional) in a unit of study is limited to subject areas from the Faculty of Science and entitles the student to be credited with the full number of credit points for that unit of study, provided that the limit on the total credit value specified in the Section 7(f) is not exceeded.

Credit transfer policy

129. Credit will not be granted for units of study completed more than nine years prior to application.

130. Credit may be granted as specific credit if the unit of study is considered to be directly equivalent to a unit of study in the *Table of Units of Study* for the Bachelor of Arts or in the case of combined degrees equivalent to a unit of study available for one of the degrees, or as non-specific credit.

131. For courses under the supervision of the Faculty of Arts and for the components of the Bachelor of Arts in combined degrees, the total amount of credit from previous studies which have not been used for another qualification may not be greater than 96 credit points, including no more than 48 non-specific credit points, and no more than 48 credit points from a completed degree course may be credited (of which 24 must be counted as junior credit points).

132. Students may obtain from the Faculty Office a detailed statement of its credit transfer policy and of its policy on units of study offered by other faculties within the University but not listed in Part B of the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts.

133. All students, notwithstanding any credit transfer, must complete at least 48 credit points in units of study taken at the University of Sydney to qualify for the award of any degree under the general supervision of the Faculty of Arts.

134. A WAM will be calculated for each candidate as an overall measure of the performance in the degrees of Bachelor of Arts (Languages), Bachelor of Arts Informatics, Bachelor of Arts (Media and Communications), and Bachelor of Social Sciences. The WAM is calculated by summing the products of the marks achieved and the weighted credit point values of the units of study taken in the degree and then dividing by the sum of the weighted credit point values, with all attempts at units of study being included in the calculation, except where units of study are discontinued with permission; the formula used is as follows:

$$\text{WAM} = \frac{\sum (W_c \times M_c)}{\sum W_c}$$

where W_C is the weighted credit point value i.e., the product of the credit point value and level of weighting of 1 for 1000-1999 units of study or 3 for 2000-2999 units of study and 3000-3999 units of study; where M_C is the greater of 45 or the mark out of 100 for the unit of study.

Glossary Specific

Completion of a unit of study means that the assessment requirements have been satisfied and a grade of Pass (Concessional) or better in junior units of study or Pass or better in other units of study has been achieved.

A junior unit of study is a 1000 level or first-year stage unit. Its prerequisites or assumed knowledge are non-tertiary qualifications and corequisites are other junior units of study.

An intermediate unit of study is a 2000 or second-year stage unit in the Faculty of Science. Its prerequisites or assumed knowledge are junior or intermediate units of study and corequisites are other intermediate units of study.

A senior unit of study is

(a) in the Faculty of Science, and for the purposes of the degree rules in the combined BA/BSc and the BLibSt. and for assessment of a Part B major in other degrees, a 3000 or third-year stage unit. Its prerequisites or assumed knowledge are junior, intermediate or senior units of study and corequisites are other senior units of study;

(b) in the Faculty of Arts, for the purpose of its degree rules, all 2000 and 3000 units of study with prerequisites of at least 12 junior credit points.

A special entry or honours entry unit is a 2000 or 3000 level unit which specifies that the prerequisites must be passed at a grade higher than pass.

An honours unit of study is a 4000 or fourth-year stage unit offered within an honours course.

An advanced unit of study is a unit which generally parallels a normal unit of study but which provides added breadth of material and/or sophistication of approach, or in the case of language units of study assumes superior skill in or previous study of the language concerned.

A Science major is 24 credit points from senior units in a Science subject area, except that the Psychology major requires 32 credit points from senior units of study in Psychology.

An Arts major is 32 credit points from senior units of study in a Part A subject area, of which no more than 16 credit points may come from cross-listed units of study, except in the case of Semiotics, Medieval Studies, and European Studies where the entire major may be cross-listed and in such other subject areas as may be approved by the Dean.

A major in the Faculty of Economics and Business is usually a three-year sequence of study (in some cases a two-year sequence) in a particular Economics and Business subject area.

A major in the Faculty of Education is 32 credit points from senior units in the subject area of Education.

The Law units of study taken in the combined BA/BLLB cannot be counted as a major, but other Law units of study which are cross-listed to a Part A or Part B major may be counted towards that major.

Cross-listing a Part B unit of study to a Part A subject area means that the unit of study can be counted to that major, but does not necessarily mean that the cross-listed unit of study satisfies the minimum Part A requirements of the various degrees.

Cross-listing a unit of study does not necessarily mean that the corequisites, prerequisites and assumed knowledge for that unit of study are waived.

A unit of study may be cross-listed for any number of majors, but a student may assign a unit of study to only one major.

Dean, unless otherwise specified, means the Dean of the Faculty of Arts.

Faculty, unless otherwise specified, means the Faculty of Arts.

Pass (Concessional) is the grade returned for a unit of study in a Science subject area when the final mark is in the range 46-49. It may be awarded only for junior units of study in the first two semesters of enrolment. Such a unit may be repeated and the result upgraded. A Pass (Concessional) cannot be used as a qualifying unit of study.

Subject area means a defined field of study in the humanities, social sciences and sciences.

Degree (unless otherwise defined) means the Bachelor of Arts.

Requirements means coursework requirements for the degrees awarded or under the general supervision of the Faculty of Arts.

The Weighted Average Mark (WAM or SCIWAM) is the mark based on the calculation used by the Faculty of Science and is applied to four year degrees in the Faculty of Arts and to the combined BA/BSc (details of the method of calculation will be supplied on request). For the Bachelor of Arts, if a WAM is required, it is calculated as the average of all intermediate and senior units of study. Units of study which have been discontinued without failure (DNF) or withdrawn before the HECS census date are not counted in either calculation, but units of study with a result of “discontinued fail”, “absent fail” or “fail” are included.

Generic

Unit of study is a stand-alone component of a course and comprises such lectures, tutorial instruction, essays, exercises and practical work as the Faculty may prescribe.

Qualifying unit of study means a unit which must be completed at the grade of Pass or better before a student may enrol in any unit of study for which that unit of study has been prescribed as a qualifying unit unless waived with the permission of the Dean.

Prerequisite means a unit of study which must be completed at the grade of Pass (Concessional) or better before a student may enrol in any unit of study for which that unit of study has been prescribed as a prerequisite unless waived with the permission of the Dean.

Corequisite means a unit of study in which, unless previously completed, a student must enrol concurrently with any unit of study for which that unit of study has been prescribed as a corequisite unless waived with the permission of the Chair of department concerned.

Advanced standing means recognition of previous experience or studies, meaning that the candidate has satisfied the entry requirements for a unit. Advanced standing does not reduce the number of credit points required to complete the degree course.

Credit may be granted as specific credit in recognition of previous studies completed at another institution which are directly equivalent to a unit of study at this University or non-specific credit in the form of block credit for a specified number of credit points at a particular level and, where

appropriate, in a particular subject area. If credit is granted then the number of credit points required for completion of the degree course is reduced.

Exemption means that a student may be exempted from completing parts of the prescribed work (lectures, seminars, tutorials and practical work) for a unit of study on the basis of previous study. Exemption may be granted for the whole of a unit of study but no advanced standing will be granted.

Cross-listing is the availability of units of study in one subject area for counting towards requirements in other subject areas.

University means the University of Sydney.

Department means department, school or unit.

Course means a structured academic program of study leading to the award of a degree.

Stream means a form of specialisation in which there is a defined program of study, in terms either of subject areas or depth of study.

Program of study means a recommended or prescribed sequence that forms a course or part of a course, and may consist of compulsory or optional units of study as well as other forms of study.

Combined degrees means concurrent enrolment in two degree courses which compresses the duration of the two degree programs.

Double degrees means completing a second degree while enrolment is suspended from the first degree.

UAC means Universities Admission Centre.

Supervision by a faculty covers all areas of policy and procedure affecting students such a degree rules, enrolment procedures and the Dean to whom reference is to be made at any given time.

Amendment of the Resolutions of the Senate and Faculty Resolutions

3.2 Faculty of Arts and Science: Bachelor of Liberal Studies – Revised Resolutions of the Senate and Faculty Resolutions

Resolutions of the Senate: Bachelor of Liberal Studies

Bachelor of Liberal Studies

These Resolutions must be read in conjunction with the University of Sydney (Undergraduate Courses) Rule, which sets out the requirements for all undergraduate courses, and the relevant Faculty Resolutions.

1. Requirements for the Degree

To qualify for the award of the degree students must:

- (a) complete successfully units of study giving credit for a total of 192 credit points; and
- (b) satisfy the requirements of all other relevant By-Laws, Rules and Resolutions of the University.

2. Requirements for the Honours Degree

To qualify for the award of the honours degree students must complete the honours requirements published in the faculty resolutions relating to the course.

Faculty Resolutions relating to the degree of Bachelor of Liberal Studies

These resolutions must be read in conjunction with the University of Sydney (Undergraduate Courses) Rule and the Glossary appended to these Faculty Resolutions.

SECTION 1

Authority of the Deans

1. The Deans of Arts and Science shall jointly exercise authority in any matter concerning the Bachelor of Liberal Studies degree not otherwise dealt with in the Resolutions of the Senate or these resolutions.

Units of Study

2. The units of study, which may be taken for the degree, are set out under subject areas in the Table of Undergraduate Units of Study I for the Bachelor of Science and the Tables of Units of Study for the degree of Bachelor of Arts, including

- (1) designation as Junior, Intermediate, Senior or Honours and, where appropriate, as Advanced units of study,
- (2) credit point values,
- (3) assumed knowledge, co-requisites/prerequisites,
- (4) the semesters in which they are offered,
- (5) the units of study with which they are mutually exclusive.

3. The Deans of Arts and Science may permit a student of exceptional merit who is admitted to the Talented Student Program to undertake a unit or units of study other than those specified in the Table of Undergraduate Units of Study I for the Bachelor of Science.

4. A student who enrolls, in accordance with these resolutions, in a unit or units of study prescribed for a degree other than the Bachelor of Liberal Studies, shall satisfy the prerequisites, co-requisites and other requirements prescribed for such units of study.

Requirements for the Pass Degree

5. To qualify for the award of the degree a student shall complete units of study having a total value of at least 192 credit points, including:

- (1) at least 120 Intermediate or Senior credit points;
- (2) at least one Arts major and one Science major;
- (3) at least 28 credit points, including 16 Intermediate or Senior credit points, from units of study in one language subject area other than English from Part A of the Tables of Units of Study for the degree of Bachelor of Arts;
- (4) a 6 credit point unit of study in communication and analytical skills or in other academic skills as may be prescribed from time to time;
- (5) a minimum of 6 credit points from units of study in Mathematics and Statistics.

6. Unless otherwise defined, a major shall consist of units of study taken in a single subject area from Part A of the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts or from the Table of Undergraduate Units of Study I for the Bachelor of Science.

7. A major in an Arts subject area requires 32 credit points from Senior units of Study in an Arts subject area listed in Part A of the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts, including any units of study specified in the Table of Units of Study as compulsory for that major, or of at least 16 senior credit points from a Part A subject area combined with no more than 16 senior credit points from units of study approved by the Dean of the Faculty of Arts for cross-listing with the major, except in the case of Semiotics, Medieval Studies, and European Studies where the entire major may be cross-listed and in such other subject areas as may be approved by the Dean of the Faculty of Arts.

- 8.** A major in a Science subject area normally requires the completion of 24 credit points of Senior units of study in that area, including any units of study specified in the Table of Undergraduate Units of Study I as compulsory for that major.
- 9.** Candidates shall nominate their choice of majors no later than the beginning of the fifth semester of candidature, but with the permission of the Deans of Arts and Science as appropriate, may change the majors during the candidature.
- 10.** A maximum of 28 credit points may be counted towards the degree requirements from units of study offered by faculties other than the Faculties of Arts and Science.
- 11.** Units of study completed at the University of Sydney Summer School which correspond to units of study in Part A of the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts or from the Table of Undergraduate Units of Study I for the Bachelor of Science may be credited towards the course requirements.
- 12.** The testamur for the degree of Bachelor of Liberal Studies shall specify the majors completed in order to qualify for the award.

Award of the degree

- 13.** (1) A weighted average mark (WAM) will be calculated for each candidate as an overall measure of the performance in the degree Bachelor of Liberal Studies. The WAM is calculated by summing the products of the marks achieved and the weighted credit point values of the units of study taken in the degree and then dividing by the sum of the weighted credit point values, with all attempts at units of study being included in the calculation, except where units of study are discontinued with permission; the formula used is as follows:

$$\text{WAM} = \frac{\sum (W_c \times M_c)}{\sum W_c}$$

where W_c is the weighted credit point value i.e., the product of the credit point value and level of weighting of 1 for 1000-1999 units of study or 3 for 2000-2999 units of study and 3000-3999 units of study; where M_c is the greater of 45 or the mark out of 100 for the unit of study.

(2) The degree shall be awarded with the following grades, as determined by the Deans of Arts and Science on the basis of the WAM:

- (a) High Distinction;
- (b) Distinction;
- (c) Pass.

Honours Courses

- 14.** There shall be honours courses in all Arts and Science subject areas .
- 15.** To qualify to enrol in an honours course, students shall
- (1) (a) have completed the requirements for the award of the Bachelor of Liberal Studies with the grade of Distinction or High Distinction, or
 - (b) be a pass graduate holding an equivalent qualification from another institution;
 - (2) have completed a major at credit average in the subject area relating to the intended honours course (or equivalent at another institution) ;
 - (3) satisfy any additional criteria set by the Head or Chair of Department concerned.
- 16.** Students shall complete the requirements for the honours course full-time over two consecutive semesters.

17. If the Faculties are satisfied that a student is unable to attempt the honours course on a full-time basis and if the Head or Chair of Department concerned so recommends, permission may be granted to undertake honours half-time over three or four consecutive semesters.

18. To qualify for the award of an honours degree, students shall complete 48 credit points of honours units of study in the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts or in the Table of Undergraduate Units of Study for the Bachelor of Science, as prescribed by the Head or Chair of Department concerned.

19. The grade of honours and the honours mark are determined by performance in the honours course.

20. A student with an honours mark of 90 or greater in an honours subject area shall, if deemed to be of sufficient merit by the Deans of Arts and Science, receive a bronze medal.

21. A student may not re-attempt an honours course in a single subject area.

22. A student who is qualified to enrol in two honours courses may either:

- (1) complete the honours courses in the two subject areas separately and in succession, or
- (2) complete a joint honours course, equivalent to an honours course in a single subject area, in the two subject areas. A joint honours course shall comprise such parts of the two honours courses as may be decided by the Deans of Arts and Science.

Transfer to candidature for the Bachelor of Arts or the Bachelor of Science

23. Candidates who at the end of at least four semesters of candidature have completed at least 96 credit points in total, and who intend to satisfy the requirements for entry to a Fourth Year Honours unit of study or joint Honours unit of study for the Bachelor's degrees in Arts or Science, may apply to transfer to candidature for one of these degrees.

24. Candidates who at the end of at least six semesters of candidature have completed units of study which correspond to the entry requirements for Fourth Year Honours for the Bachelor's degrees in Arts or Science may apply to transfer to candidature for one of these degrees.

25. Candidates for the degree may, with the permission of the Faculty concerned, transfer to candidature for the pass degrees of Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science no later than the end of the fourth semester of candidature.

26. If a candidate for the degree has completed the normal requirements for the pass degree of Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Arts (Asian Studies) or Bachelor of Science, he or she may apply to take one of these degrees provided that candidature for the Bachelor of Liberal Studies is abandoned.

27. The maximum enrolment in a single Arts subject area is 18 junior credit points and 64 senior credit points.

SECTION 2

Enrolment in more/less than minimum load

28. A student may not enrol without first obtaining permission from the Deans of Arts and Science in additional units of study once the degree requirements of 192 credit points have been satisfied.

Repeating a unit of study

29. Where a student enrolls in a unit of study which is the same as, or has a substantial amount in common with, a unit of study previously attempted but not completed *at the grade of Pass or better*, the Head or Chair of Department concerned may exempt the student from certain requirements of the unit of study if satisfied that the relevant competence has been demonstrated.

Cross-institutional enrolment

30. Provided that permission has been obtained in advance, the Deans of Arts and Science may permit a student to complete a unit of study at another institution and have that unit credited to his/her course requirements provided that either:

- (1) the unit of study content is material not taught in any corresponding unit of study in the University, or
- (2) the student is unable for good reason to attend a corresponding unit of study at the University.

Restrictions on enrolment

31. Units of study which overlap substantially in content are noted in the Table of units of study for the Bachelor of Arts and in the Tables of Undergraduate Units of Study for the Bachelor of Science. Such units of study are mutually exclusive and no more than one of the overlapping units of study may be counted towards meeting the course requirements.

Satisfactory Progress

32. If a student fails or discontinues enrolment in one unit of study twice, a warning will be issued that if the unit is failed a third time, the student may be asked to show good cause why he or she should be allowed to re-enrol in that unit of study.

Assessment Policy

33. Students may be tested by written and oral examinations, exercises, essays or practical work or any combination of these as the Faculties of Arts or Science may determine.

34. Where a unit of study is offered at different levels of difficulty, the performance of students will be matched so that a grade obtained at one level indicates a quality of work comparable with that required for the same grade at the other level(s).

35. A Head or Chair of Department may arrange for further testing in cases of special consideration, in accordance with Academic Board policy governing illness and misadventure.

Credit Transfer Policy

36. Credit will not be granted for units of study completed more than nine years prior to application, except with the permission of the Deans of Arts and Science.

37. Credit may be granted as specific credit if the unit of study is considered to be directly equivalent to a unit of study in the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts or from the Table of Undergraduate Units of Study I for the Bachelor of Science or as non-specific credit.

38. The total amount of credit granted may not be greater than 96 credit points and may not include more than 48 credit points of units from another degree for which credit is maintained or a degree has been conferred.

39. All students, notwithstanding any credit transfer, must complete a major from each of the Faculties of Arts and Science taken at the University of Sydney.

Glossary Specific

Completion of a unit of study means that the assessment requirements have been satisfied and a grade of Pass (Concessional) or better in Junior units of study or Pass or better in other units of study has been achieved.

Junior unit of study is a 1000 or first–year stage unit. Its prerequisites or assumed knowledge are non–tertiary qualifications and co–requisites are other Junior units of study

Intermediate unit of study is a 2000 or second–year stage unit. Its prerequisites or assumed knowledge are Junior or Intermediate units of study and co–requisites are other Intermediate units of study. (Specific to the Faculty of Science).

Senior unit of study is a 3000 or third–year stage unit. Its prerequisites or assumed knowledge are Junior, Intermediate or Senior units of study and co–requisites are other Senior units of study. (Specific to the Faculty of Science.)

Honours unit of study is a 4000 or fourth–year stage unit offered within an honours course.

Advanced unit of study is a unit which generally parallels a normal unit of study but which provides added breadth of material and/or sophistication of approach.

Major in the Faculty of Arts is normally 32 credit points from Senior units of Study in an Arts subject area, including any units of study specified in the Table of Units of Study as compulsory for that major.

Major in the Faculty of Science is 24 credit points from Senior units of study in a Science subject area, including any units of study specified in the Table of Undergraduate Units of Study I as compulsory for that major (A major in Psychology requires 32 credit points from Senior units of study in Psychology).

Deans means the Dean of Arts and the Dean of Science.

Faculties means the Faculty of Arts and the Faculty of Science.

Arts subject area means a defined field of study in Arts.

Science subject area means a defined field of study in Science.

Degree means the Bachelor of Liberal Studies.

Requirements means coursework requirements for the award of the degree of Bachelor of Liberal Studies.

Student means a person enrolled as a candidate for the degree of Bachelor of Liberal Studies.

TSP means the Talented Student Program in the Faculty of Science.

Generic

Unit of study is a stand–alone component of a course and comprises such lectures, tutorial instruction, essays, exercises and practical work as the Faculty may prescribe.

Qualifying unit of study means a unit which must be completed at the grade of Pass or better before a student may enrol in any unit of study for which that unit of study has been prescribed as a qualifying unit unless waived with the permission of the Dean.

Prerequisite means a unit of study which must be completed at the grade of Pass (Concessional) or better before a student may enrol in any unit of study for which that unit of study has been prescribed as a prerequisite unless waived with the permission of the Head/Chair of Department concerned.

Assumed knowledge is curricular material which is assumed to be known by each student when enrolling in a unit of study.

Co-requisite means a unit of study in which, unless previously completed, a student must enrol concurrently with any unit of study for which that unit of study has been prescribed as a co-requisite unless waived with the permission of the Head of Department concerned.

Credit is granted in the form of credit points towards the requirements of a course on the basis of previous attainment in another course at a recognized tertiary institution.

Credit may be granted as specific credit in recognition of previously completed studies which are directly equivalent to a unit of study at this University or non-specific credit in the form of block credit for a specified number of credit points at a particular level and, where appropriate, in a particular subject area.

Exemption means that a student may be exempted from completing parts of the pre prescribed work (lectures, seminars, tutorials and practical work) for a unit of study on the basis of previous study. Exemption may be granted for the whole of a unit of study but no advanced standing will be granted.

Cross-listing is the availability of units of study in one subject area for counting towards requirements in other subject areas.

University means the University of Sydney.

Department means department, school, or teaching unit.

Course means a structured academic program of study leading to the award of a degree.

Stream means a form of specialization in which there is a defined program of study, in terms either of subject areas or depth of study.

Program of study means a recommended or prescribed sequence that forms a course or part of a course, and may consist of compulsory or optional units of study as well as other forms of study.

Combined degrees means concurrent enrolment in two degree courses which compresses the duration of the two degree programs.

Double degrees means completing a second degree while enrolment is suspended from the first degree.

UAC means Universities Admission Centre.

Supervision by a faculty covers all areas of policy and procedure affecting students such as degree rules, enrolment procedures and the Dean to whom reference is to be made at any given time.

Amendment of the Resolutions of the Senate and Faculty Resolutions

3.3 Faculty of Nursing: Bachelor of Nursing (Honours) – Amendment of the Resolutions of the Senate

Amendment to the proposed Resolutions of the Senate relating to undergraduate courses in the Faculty of Nursing

Bachelor of Nursing (Honours)

These Resolutions must be read in conjunction with the University of Sydney (Undergraduate Course) Rule 1999 and relevant Faculty resolutions.

1. Admission requirements

Applicants for admission to the Bachelor of Nursing (Honours) shall have qualified for the award of a Pass degree with a Weighted Average Mean (WAM) of 65 or higher in units undertaken and be considered by the Faculty and the head of department concerned to have the requisite knowledge and aptitude for an honours course or hold qualifications deemed by the Dean to be the equivalent.

2. Requirements for the course

2.1 To qualify for the award of the degree of Bachelor of Nursing (Honours) a candidate must:

- (a) complete successfully a minimum of 24 credit points of specified Honours units of study; and
- (b) submit a thesis with a value of 24 credit points;

3. Time limits

3.1 A candidate for the degree may proceed on either a full-time or part-time basis.

- (a) A full-time candidate shall complete the requirements for the degree no later than at the end of the second semester of candidature.
- (b) A part-time candidate shall complete the requirements for the degree over a period of four consecutive semesters.

4. Award of the degree

4.1 There shall be three classes of Honours, namely Class I, Class II, and Class III and within Class II there shall be two divisions, namely Division 1 and Division 2.

4.2 The class of Honours shall be determined by the weighted marks achieved in the coursework and thesis components of 30% and 70% respectively.

4.3 The Honours grade will be reported in percentages and the grades for the award shall be:

First Class	80 – 100
Second Class: Division 1:	75 – 79
Second Class: Division 2:	70 – 74
Third Class	65 – 69
Honours not awarded	< 65

These Resolutions must be read in conjunction with the University of Sydney Undergraduate Course Rule, which sets out the requirements for all undergraduate courses, and the relevant Faculty Resolutions.

Requirements for the Pass Degree

1. To qualify for the award of the pass degree the candidates must
 - a) Complete successfully 24 units of study giving credit for a total of 144 credit points; and
 - b) Satisfy the requirements of all other relevant By-laws, Rules and Resolutions of the University.

Requirements for the Honours Degree

2. To qualify for the award of honours degree candidates must complete the honours requirements published in the faculty resolutions relating to the course.

Requirements for the Advanced Diploma

3. To qualify for the award of the advanced diploma candidates must
 - a) Complete successfully 16 units of study giving credit for a total of 96 credit points; and
 - b) Satisfy the requirements of all other relevant By-laws, Rules and Resolutions of the University.

RESOLUTIONS OF THE FACULTY RELATING TO THE BACHELOR DEGREES AND ADVANCED DIPLOMAS IN THE FACULTY OF RURAL MANAGEMENT

These Resolutions must be read in conjunction with the University of Sydney Undergraduate Course Rule, Senate Resolutions for Undergraduate Courses in the Faculty of Rural Management, and the Course Rules of the Faculty of Rural Management.

SECTION 1

Definitions

1. For the purposes of these Resolutions the following definitions shall apply:
 - a) A normal full-time semester workload is defined as four standard units per semester. A candidate who is enrolled in 50 per cent or more of his or her enrolment by the internal mode of study shall be deemed to be an internal student.
 - b) A candidate enrolled in 75 percent of a normal workload shall be deemed to be a full-time candidate.
 - c) A candidate enrolled in less than 75 per cent of a normal workload shall be deemed to be a part-time candidate.
 - d) Academic Head refers to the Coordinator of Undergraduate Programs and Postgraduate Coursework Coordinator as appropriate.
 - e) 'Prerequisite' - a unit of study which is required to be successfully completed prior to enrolling in another unit. The appropriate Academic Head may waive the specified pre-requisite unit if, on the recommendation of the appropriate Course Coordinator, he or she is convinced the pre-requisite requirement has been met by alternative means.
 - f) 'Corequisite' - a condition which requires simultaneous enrolment in another unit. Candidates who have successfully completed or have been granted credit in units specified in this requirement shall be deemed to have met the co-requisite requirement.
A candidate who withdraws or is withdrawn from a co-requisite unit may proceed with the unit for which it is a co-requisite only with the permission of the appropriate Academic Head.
 - g) Assessment Terms refers to the requirements which must be satisfied by the candidate in order for that candidate to be eligible to receive a Pass or higher grade in a unit. A units assessment terms will be specified in the unit information handout provided at the commencement of the semester.
 - h) Examination Terms refers to the requirements which must be satisfied by the candidate in order for that candidate to be deemed eligible to sit the final examination in the unit. A units examination terms will be specified in the unit information handout provided at the commencement of the semester.
 - i) A 'unit' shall consist of lectures, tutorials, seminars, practicals, field excursions, required reading and assessment and other tasks as may be prescribed by the Faculty;
 - j) each unit shall be designated as a 'level I' unit, a 'level II' unit, a 'level III' unit, an 'Honours' unit, or a 'postgraduate' unit, and as either a 'core' unit, a 'course selection' unit or an 'option' unit;
 - k) each 'unit' shall have a standard weighting of 6 credit points;
 - l) a 'core unit' means a unit which must be completed by a candidate in order to qualify for the award of a degree, unless the candidate is granted exemption by the Faculty;
 - m) a 'course selection unit' means a unit which is designated as especially pertinent for the specific award being studied and is a unit in which the candidate may choose to enrol;
 - n) an 'option unit' means a unit additional to the specified core and course selection units in which the candidate enrolls.
 - o) 'The Faculty' refers to the Faculty of Rural Management.

Admission

2. a) Selection criteria for and conditions of admission are determined from time to time by the

University.

- b) Admission into most Faculty of Rural Management courses is available both at the commencement of the year (Semester One) and mid-year (Semester Two).
- c) The Faculty of Rural Management reserves the right to impose intake quotas on any course. The admission of candidates into any course advertised by the Faculty is subject to the Faculty receiving a viable number of applicants to warrant an intake. The admission of a part-time candidate to a course does not oblige the Faculty to schedule evening classes in units in the course. Part-time internal candidates may be expected to attend day classes.
- d) Applicants for admission to Honours candidature in the Faculty of Rural Management shall have:
 - i) maintained a distinction or better level in at least 50% of the units taught in years 2 and 3 of their Pass degree program; or
 - ii) maintained a distinction average in the field in which they propose to undertake their research.

Applicants who meet neither of the above must demonstrate to the Coordinator of Undergraduate Programs that they have the required knowledge and aptitude for the Honours degree.

Requirements for the Pass Degree

- 3. a) To qualify for a pass degree detailed in 4. below, normally a maximum of 9 level I units of study shall count towards the pass degree, and a candidate must successfully complete a minimum of 4 level III units of study.
- b) The appropriate Course Coordinator has the delegated authority to increase the maximum number of level I units that a candidate may complete.
- 4. a) To qualify for the Bachelor of Business (Agricultural Commerce) Pass degree, candidates must satisfactorily complete 24 units (144 credit points):
 - (i) 12 core units (72 credit points),
 - (ii) a minimum of 6 course selection units (36 credit points), and
 - (iii) a maximum of 6 option units (36 credit points) as indicated in the Table of Units I,
 - (iv) 2 Development Documents or a Capability Portfolio as may be prescribed by the Faculty from time to time, and
 - (v) a period of industry experience as may be prescribed by the Faculty from time to time.
- b) To qualify for the Bachelor of Equine Business Management Pass degree, candidates must satisfactorily complete 24 units (144 credit points):
 - (i) 13 core units (78 credit points),
 - (ii) a minimum of 8 course selection units (48 credit points), and
 - (iii) a maximum of 3 option units (18 credit points) as indicated in the Table of Units II, and
 - (iii) a Capability Portfolio as may be prescribed by the Faculty from time to time, and
 - (v) a period of work experience at the College's Horse Unit as may be prescribed by the Faculty from time to time.
- c) To qualify for the Bachelor of Farm Management Pass degree, candidates must satisfactorily complete 24 units (144 credit points):
 - (i) 9 core units (54 credit points),
 - (ii) a minimum of 9 course selection units (54 credit points), and
 - (iii) a maximum of 6 option units (36 credit points) as indicated in the Table of Units III, and
 - (iv) a Capability Portfolio as may be prescribed by the Faculty from time to time.
- d) To qualify for the Bachelor of Horticultural Management Pass degree, candidates must satisfactorily complete 24 units (144 credit points):

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- (i) 8 core units (48 credit points), or 9 core units (54 credit points) if RMMN 3758 Industry Project B is the selected core project unit,
 - (ii) a minimum of 8 course selection units (48 credit points) with at least 2 units (12 credit points) from Group A, 4 units (24 credit points) from Group B, 1 unit (6 credit points) from Group C, and, if RMMN 3758 is not chosen as the core project unit, 1 additional unit (6 credit points) from either Group A, Group B or Group C, and
 - (iii) a maximum of 8 option units (48 credit points) as indicated in the Table of Units IVa and IVb,
 - (iv) a Capability Portfolio as may be prescribed by the Faculty from time to time,
 - (v) a period of industry experience as may be prescribed by the Faculty from time to time, and
 - (vi) a Chemical Users certification.
- e) To qualify for the Bachelor of Land Management Pass degree, candidates must satisfactorily complete 24 units (144 credit points):
- (i) 12 core units (72 credit points),
 - (ii) a minimum of 8 course selection units (48 credit points) with at least 2 units (12 credit points) from Group A and 2 units (12 credit points) from Group B, and
 - (iii) a maximum of 4 option units (24 credit points) as indicated in the Table of Units V
 - (iv) a Capability Portfolio as may be prescribed by the Faculty from time to time
 - (v) a period of industry experience as may be prescribed by the Faculty from time to time, and
 - (vi) demonstrate, to the satisfaction of the Course Co-ordinator, competence in the utilisation of word-processing, spreadsheet and database computer software.
- f) To qualify for the Bachelor of Management Pass degree, candidates must satisfactorily complete 24 units (144 credit points):
- (i) 12 core units (72 credit points),
 - (ii) a minimum of 4 course selection units (24 credit points), and
 - (iii) a maximum of 8 option units (48 credit points) as indicated in the Table of Units VI,
 - (iv) a Capability Portfolio as may be prescribed by the Faculty from time to time, and
 - (v) a period of industry experience as may be prescribed by the Faculty from time to time.
- g) To qualify for the Bachelor of Rural Business Administration Pass degree, candidates must satisfactorily complete 24 units (144 credit points):
- (i) 11 core units (66 credit points),
 - (ii) a minimum of 8 course selection units (48 credit points), and
 - (iii) a maximum of 5 option units (30 credit points) as indicated in the Table of Units VII
 - (iv) a Capability Portfolio as may be prescribed by the Faculty from time to time, and
 - (v) a period of industry experience as may be prescribed by the Faculty from time to time, and
 - (vi) successful completion of TAFE's Keyboard Techniques and Operations, and Word Processing for Operators, or their equivalent.

Requirements for the Honours Degree

5. a) To qualify for the Honours degree candidates must satisfactorily complete 8 core units (48 credit points) comprising:

- b) The unit Research Philosophy and Methods will be completed in the first semester of enrolment with the Research Dissertation started during the first semester and completed in the second semester (or part time equivalent).

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- c) Candidates will undertake coursework units as part of their dissertation. The actual dissertation will represent a minimum of 4 units of study (24 credit points) and therefore coursework will represent a maximum of 2 units of study (12 credit points). The coursework will address any deficiencies in the candidates' knowledge or skills required for their research. The coursework must be approved by the Course Co-ordinator and will normally be equivalent to the units available to candidates enrolled in the Faculty's postgraduate courses or the third year of the the Faculty's bachelor programs. The coursework may come from any unit on offer within a University providing the Head of Department offering the unit is prepared to accept the candidates concerned.
- d) Candidates will be expected to take part in the Research Candidates' Seminars that are organised within the Faculty of Rural Management.
- e) There shall be three classes of Honours, namely Class I, Class II and Class III.
- f) Second Class Honours may be awarded in two divisions, namely Division 1 and Division 2.
- g) An outstanding Honours degree candidate may be awarded the degree with a bronze medal, provided they have achieved first class Honours at the level of at least 90%.
- h) The Honours result will be calculated as follows:

where Mi = percentage mark obtained in Unit i
Wi = the proportional credit point weighting of unit i, with the proportion being based on the credit point weighting of the unit divided by the total number of credit points required for the Honours year.

- (v) a period of industry experience as may be prescribed by the Faculty from time to time, and
- (vi) demonstrate, to the satisfaction of the Course Co-ordinator, competence in the utilisation of word-processing, spreadsheet and database computer software.
- h) To qualify for the Advanced Diploma of Management, candidates must satisfactorily 16 units (96 credit points):

- (i) 7 specified level I and level II core units (42 credit points),
 - (ii) a minimum of 5 course selection units (30 credit points), and
 - (iii) a maximum of 4 option units (24 credit points)
- as indicated in the Table of Units VI
- (iv) a Capability Portfolio as may be prescribed by the Faculty from time to time.
- g) To qualify for the Advanced Diploma of Rural Business Administration, candidates must satisfactorily complete 16 units (96 credit points):
- (i) 9 specified level I and level II core units (54 credit points),
 - (ii) a minimum of 4 course selection units (24 credit points), and
 - (iii) a maximum of 3 option units (18 credit points)
- as indicated in the Table of Units VII
- (iv) a Capability Portfolio as may be prescribed by the Faculty from time to time, and
 - (v) a period of industry experience as may be prescribed by the Faculty from time to time, and
 - (vi) successful completion of TAFE's Keyboard Techniques and Operations, and Word Processing for Operators, or their equivalent.

Grades of Award

7. a) The degree shall be offered in two grades, namely the Pass degree and the Honours degree.
- b) An outstanding Pass degree candidate may be awarded the degree 'with distinction'
- c) The advanced diploma shall be awarded in the Pass grade only, provided that an outstanding candidate may be awarded the advanced diploma 'with distinction'
- d) (i) To receive an award With Distinction a candidate must accumulate at least 70 per cent of the maximum award points available in respect of units assessed at the Faculty in their particular course of study.
- (ii) Any candidate who received a Fail grade in any unit at any stage of a course will be ineligible for an award 'with Distinction'.
- (iii) Where advanced standing or credit have been granted and Withdrawn grades have been recorded, those units will not be included in calculations.
- (iv) Where a candidate upgrades from diploma to degree status, the full study record at Orange Agricultural College and/or for the Faculty of Rural Management will be taken into consideration.
- (v) At least 50% of the Faculty course must be completed through enrolment in Faculty units to be eligible for the award.
- (vi) Award points for each unit of study are related to the standard of pass achieved. Award points are calculated in the following manner for the various passing grades:

SECTION 2

Modes of Study

8. a) Candidates for an award may enrol in units of study by either the internal and/or the distance education mode depending on the unit's mode of offering as determined by the Faculty from time to time.

Maximum Semester Enrolment

9. a) Candidates may not apply for a semester enrolment in more than four units of study, or the equivalent, without the approval of the appropriate Academic Head.

Cross Institutional Enrolment

10. a) Provided that permission has been obtained in advance, the Dean may permit a candidate to complete a unit of study at another institution and have that unit credited to his/her course requirements, provided that either:
- i) the unit of study content is material not taught in any corresponding unit of study in the Faculty, or
 - ii) the candidate is unable for good reason to attend a corresponding unit of study at the Faculty.

Restrictions on Enrolment

11. a) A candidate may not enrol in an option unit if he/she has twice received a Fail grade in that unit.

Leave of Absence

12. a) i) Candidates may be granted a period of approved leave of absence.
ii) An application for leave of absence will only be approved for a period of one semester. A candidate may apply at the end of a period of leave of absence for a further period of leave for the next semester. Such leave will normally be restricted to two consecutive semesters.
iii) Candidates granted leave shall re-enrol as continuing candidates when they resume their course. Such candidates are required to notify Client Services of their intention to re-enrol.
iv) Candidates eligible for re-enrolment who do not re-enrol and have not applied for a further period of leave, will be withdrawn from the course. Such candidates must re-apply for admission to the course.

Satisfactory Progress

13. a) A candidate who fails to demonstrate satisfactory progress shall receive academic counselling and shall normally be placed on probation by the Dean,
b) A candidate who fails to satisfy any condition of probation shall be required by the Dean to show good cause as to why he/she should be allowed to re-enrol in his/her course of study.

Period of Candidature

14. a) The maximum period of candidature, irrespective of the mode of study shall be 9 years. In exceptional circumstances the Faculty Board may extend the period of candidature.

Assessment Policy

15. a) 'Assessment' includes any assignment or written, oral, practical examinations, or other work which a candidate is required to do, and which is intended to be taken into account in determining the final assessment grade in a unit.
b) It is the individual candidates responsibility to be available for all examinations and assessments, including post and deferred assessments. The time or place for an assessment will not be altered to accommodate candidates who are unable to attend.
c) The assessment requirements of a unit of study shall be detailed in a candidate unit information document which will be made available to all candidates in that unit of study

during the first teaching week of the semester in which that unit of study is offered.

Credit

16. a) Candidates who have previously completed studies which are considered by the Faculty to be equivalent to any unit listed in the tables appended to these resolutions may be given credit for that unit provided that the total number of units for which credit is awarded does not exceed more than half the total number of units required for the award.
- b) Credit will not be granted, except in special circumstances, for any unit or units completed more than nine years prior to admission or re-admission to candidature.

Amendment of the Resolutions of the Senate and Faculty Resolutions

3.5 Faculty of Veterinary Science: Bachelor of Veterinary Science – Amendment of the Resolutions of the Senate

Bachelor of Veterinary Science

Amend the Resolutions relating to the Bachelor of Veterinary Science (*Calendar 1999, Vol 1, page 579*) with immediate effect by:

Deleting 8 and 9; and
Re-numbering remaining Resolutions.

Rationale

There is no longer any requirement for the completion of practical clinical work or for periods to be spent in animal management prior to admission in to the Bachelor of Veterinary Science.

3.6 Sydney Conservatorium of Music: Revised Resolutions of the Senate and Conservatorium Resolutions

Senate Resolutions: Bachelor of Music

These Resolutions must be read in conjunction with the University of Sydney Undergraduate Courses Rule, which sets out the requirements for all undergraduate courses, and the resolutions of the Conservatorium College Board relating to the Bachelor of Music degree.

Specialisations

The degree of the Bachelor of Music will be awarded in the following specialisations

Performance

Composition

Music Education

Musicology

Requirements for the Pass Degree

To qualify for the award of the pass degree candidates must

- (a) complete successfully units of study giving credit for a total of 192 credit points; and
- (b) satisfy the requirement of all other relevant By-Law, Rules and Resolutions of the University.

Requirements for the Honours Degree

To qualify for the award of the Honours degree candidates must complete the Honours requirements published in the faculty resolutions relating to the course.

Conservatorium Resolutions: Bachelor of Music

SECTION 1

1. Admission

1.1 An applicant may gain admission to the program by satisfying requirements in each of the following:

1.1.1 The NSW Higher School Certificate [HSC], or its interstate or overseas equivalent, at a level determined each year by the University. Students must have presented a minimum of two units of English and are expected to have presented a minimum of two units of Music for the HSC examination.

1.1.2 An audition and/or interview according to the conditions set out below:

(a) BMus (Performance). Applicants are required to undertake a practical audition at Major level in the nominated instrument or voice according to requirements laid down by the Undergraduate Studies Committee.

(b) BMus (Composition). Applicants are required to submit at least three compositions in different performance media which should represent their present level of achievement as composers and to attend an interview.

(c) BMus (Music Education). Applicants are required to attend an interview for Music Education and to undertake a further audition and/or interview according to their chosen Principal Study in instrument/voice, composition or musicology.

(i) For students wishing to take major or minor study in an instrument or voice: Applicants are required to undertake a practical audition at the level (Major or Minor) at which they intend to study.

(ii) For students wishing to take study in Composition: Applicants are required to submit at least three compositions in different performance media and to attend an interview.

(iii) For students wishing to take study in Musicology: Applicants are required to present an example of recent written work and to attend an interview.

(d) BMus (Musicology)

Applicants are required to present an example of recent written work and to attend an interview.

1.2 Mature age students

1.2.1 Applicants who have attained the age of 21 years by 1 March in the year of intended enrolment may apply for Mature Age Admission.

1.2.2 Applicants for Mature Age Admission must present evidence demonstrating that they have attained a standard of education and experience adequate for entry to the program and have the capacity to successfully undertake study at the tertiary level.

2. Units of Study

2.1 The Units of Study which may be taken for the degree are set out in the Table of Units of Study, published annually in the Conservatorium Handbook.

2.2 Students may take other Units of Study within the University of Sydney with the permission of the Head of School up to a maximum credit point value of 28 credit points.

2.3 Full-time students take Units of Study with a total credit point value of 24 credit points per semester for 8 semesters.

2.4 Prerequisites and corequisites for Units of Study are set out in the Table of Units of Study.

3. Requirements for the Pass Degree

3.1 The degree of Bachelor of Music shall be awarded in two grades, namely the Pass degree and the Honours degree.

3.2 Students in the Bachelor of Music degree specialise in one of four areas: Performance, Composition, Musicology, Music Education.

3.3 Students specialising in Performance, Composition, and Musicology take 8 semesters of a Principal Study.

3.4 Students specialising in Music Education take a minimum of 6 semesters of a Principal Study.

3.5 Principal Study may be taken at a Major (6 credit points) level or a Minor level (3 credit points).

3.6 Principal Study is major level study in Jazz Performance or Composition, or major or minor level study in Voice, Piano, Harpsichord, Organ, Violin, Viola, Cello, Double Bass, Guitar, Lute, Harp, Flute, Oboe, Clarinet, Saxophone, Bassoon, Recorder, French Horn, Trumpet, Trombone, Tuba, Percussion and such other instruments as may be approved by the Undergraduate Studies Committee, or Musicology.

3.7 To qualify for the pass degree in each specialisation, candidates must complete courses to the value of 192 credit points which include:

(a) core requirements **and**

(b) other subjects of the student's choice **and**

(c) the requirements for their specialisation, including a Principal Study, as laid down by the Undergraduate Studies Committee and set out below

- (b) two divisions within class II: (i) and (ii)

4.2 Eligibility for admission to Honours

To be eligible for admission to Honours candidates will normally have achieved the requirements as set out below according to their specialisation:

- (a) BMus (Performance). Candidates should have achieved a Distinction in Principal Study (Major) 4 and 6 and achieved a Credit average in all other courses in the first three years of their program and have successfully completed 144 credit points of study including the pre-requisites for Principal Study (Honours) 7 as set out in the Conservatorium Handbook;
- (b) BMus (Composition). Candidates should have achieved a Distinction in Principal Study Composition 4 and achieved a Credit average in all other courses in the first two years of their program and successfully completed the pre-requisites for Composition 5 (Honours) as set out in the Conservatorium Handbook;
- (c) BMus (Music Education). Candidates should have achieved a minimum of a Credit average in Music Education, Education and Music History, demonstrate a satisfactory record in other subjects and demonstrate a proven capacity to write extended essays of quality;
- (d) BMus (Musicology). Candidates should have achieved a Distinction in Musicology 3 and 4 and a Credit average in all other courses in the first two years of their program;

4.2.2 Restriction on number of Honours candidates in BMus (Music Education)

The number of Honours students in any one year group in the BMus (Music Education) will not normally exceed 25% of the total numbers of that year group.

4.3 Requirements for Honours grade

To qualify for Honours degree, candidates must complete the requirements for the pass degree except as set out below and additional requirements according to their specialisation as set out below:

- (1) BMus (Performance). Candidates should enrol in Principal Study (Honours) 7 and 8 in place of Principal Study (Major) 7 and 8 and successfully complete those units of study.
- (2) BMus (Composition). Candidates enrol in Composition (Honours) 5 - 8 in place of Composition (Major) 5 - 8, and successfully complete those units of study, and take units of study in the Faculty of Arts with a minimum credit point value of 12.
- (3) BMus (Music Education). Candidates must complete Music Education Honours 1: Research Methods 1, Music Education Honours 2: Research Methods 2, Music Education Honours 3: Special Study 1 and Music Education Honours 4: Special Study 2.
- (4) BMus (Musicology). Candidates enrol in Musicology (Honours) 5 - 8 in place of Musicology (Major) 5 - 8 and successfully complete those units of study, and take units of study in the Faculty of Arts with a minimum credit point value of 12.

SECTION 2

5. Details of units of study

Pre-requisites, co-requisites, assumed knowledge, mode of delivery, assessment and course content for units of study are as published annually in the Conservatorium Handbook and as advised in course handouts as set out in 2.1 of the Conservatorium Assessment Policy.

6. Variation of normal load

A normal full-time load is defined as an enrolment in a program of approved units of study to a total value of 24 credit points in any one semester. Students may enrol in a program of units of study at variance to a normal full-time load under the provision laid down in 4.2 and 4.3 of the Rules of the Sydney Conservatorium.

7. Cross-institutional study

Students may request approval to complete a unit or units of study at another university and have those units of study credited towards completing requirements for the Bachelor of Music on written application to the Undergraduate Studies Committee provided that the total credit point value of units of study taken outside the Conservatorium does not exceed 28 credit points for the whole degree. Such requests should be accompanied by the written approval of the relevant dean in the other university to take the proposed unit or units of study.

8. Restriction on enrolment

Rules on enrolment in units of study with the Bachelor of Music are governed by rule 3 and subsections of the Rules of the Sydney Conservatorium of Music.

9. Discontinuation of enrolment

Rules on Discontinuation of Enrolment within the Bachelor of Music are governed by rule 4.6 and subsections of the Rules of the Sydney Conservatorium of Music.

10. Suspension of Candidature and re-enrolment after an absence

Rules on extended leave of absence and withdrawal from a course or unit of study are governed by rules 4.5.5 and 4.6 and subsections of the Rules of the Sydney Conservatorium of Music. Students resuming a course after extended leave of absence or withdrawal from a course shall be subject to the course requirements in effect at the time of resumption, shall be required to re-enrol as directed by the Head of School and shall be required to pass a re-audition and/or interview at a level determined by the Head of School.

11. Satisfactory progress

Rules on progression in the program are governed by rule 4 and subsections of the Rules of the Sydney Conservatorium of Music. The Conservatorium may on the recommendation of the Head of School and in accordance with paragraph 4 and paragraph 5.8 of the Rules of the Sydney Conservatorium of Music, call upon any candidate to show cause why that candidature should not be terminated by reason of unsatisfactory progress towards completion of the degree and where, in the opinion of the Conservatorium, the candidate does not show good cause, terminate the candidature.

12. Time limit

A student shall be required to complete the Bachelor of Music within a period of ten years from commencement of enrolment, except that the requirements for Principal Study shall be completed within a period of ten semesters, as set out in rule 6 of the Rules of the Sydney Conservatorium of Music.

13. Credit for previous study

A candidate may receive credit for previous study at the Conservatorium or at another institution under the regulations set down in rules 1.3, 1.4 and 1.5 of the Rules of the Sydney Conservatorium of Music.

Senate Resolutions: Bachelor of Music Studies

These Resolutions must be read in conjunction with the University of Sydney Undergraduate Courses Rule, which sets out the requirements for all undergraduate courses, and the resolutions of the Conservatorium College Board relating to the Bachelor of Music Studies degree.

Requirements for the Pass Degree

To qualify for the award of the pass degree candidates must

- a) complete successfully units of study giving credit for a total of 144 credit points; and
- b) satisfy the requirement of all other relevant By-Law, Rules and Resolutions of the University.

Specialisations

The degree of the Bachelor of Music Studies is not awarded with particular specialisations.

Conservatorium Resolutions: Bachelor of Music Studies

SECTION 1

1. Admission

1.1 An applicant may gain admission to the program by satisfying requirements in each of the following:

1.1.1 The NSW Higher School Certificate [HSC], or its interstate or overseas equivalent, at a level determined each year by the University. Students must have presented a minimum of two units of English and are expected to have presented a minimum of two units of Music for the HSC examination.

1.1.2 An interview and/or audition according to their proposed Principal Study as set out below.

Students wishing to undertake a major study in an instrument or voice

Students should present an audition according to the requirements laid out for major study in their instrument or voice.

Students wishing to undertake a minor study in an instrument or voice

Students should present an audition according to the requirements laid out for minor study in their instrument or voice.

Students wishing to undertake a major or minor study in composition

Applicants are required to submit at least three compositions in different performance media which should represent their present level of achievement as composers and to attend an interview.

Students wishing to undertake a major in musicology

Applicants are required to present an example of recent written work and to attend an interview.

1.2 Mature age students

1.2.1 Applicants who have attained the age of 21 years by 1 March in the year of intended enrolment may apply for Mature Age Admission.

1.2.2 Applicants for Mature Age Admission must present evidence demonstrating that they have attained a standard of education and experience adequate for entry to the program and have the capacity to successfully undertake study at the tertiary level.

2. Units of Study

2.1 The Units of Study which may be taken for the degree are set out in the Table of Units of Study, published annually in the Conservatorium Handbook.

2.2 Students may take other Units of Study within the University of Sydney up to a maximum credit point value of 28 credit points.

2.3 Full-time students take Units of Study with a total credit point value of 24 credit points per semester for 6 semesters.

2.4 Prerequisites and corequisites for Units of Study are set out in the Table of Units of Study.

3. Requirements for the Pass Degree

3.1 All students take 6 semesters in a Principal Study. Principal Study may be taken at a Major level (6 credit points) or a Minor level (3 credit points). Principal Study is major or minor study in Voice, Piano, Harpsichord, Organ, Violin, Viola, Cello, Double Bass, Guitar, Lute, Harp, Flute, Oboe, Clarinet, Saxophone, Bassoon, Recorder, French Horn, Trumpet, Trombone, Tuba, Percussion, and such other instruments as may be approved by the Undergraduate Studies Committee, Composition or Musicology.

3.2 The degree of Bachelor of Music Studies shall be awarded in one grade, namely a Pass degree. To qualify for the degree, candidates must complete courses to the value of 144 credit points which include:

- (a) six semesters of Principal Study, as defined in 3.1 above
- (b) core requirements
- (c) other subjects of the students choice.

All students take a Principal Study at Major or Minor level in an instrument or voice, or in Composition, or Musicology up to a minimum level of Principal Study 6 in that unit of study, complete Core Units of Study, central to the skills necessary for a music or music-related vocation, and further units of study in an area of the students' own choice, which may be taken either within the Conservatorium or within another faculty of the University.

degree. Such requests should be accompanied by written approval of the relevant dean in the other university to take the proposed unit or units of study.

7. Restriction on enrolment

Rules on enrolment in units of study with the Bachelor of Music Studies are governed by rule 3 and subsections of the Rules of the Sydney Conservatorium of Music.

8. Discontinuation of enrolment

Rules on Discontinuation of Enrolment within the Bachelor of Music Studies are governed by rule 4.6 and subsections of the Rules of the Sydney Conservatorium of Music.

3.2 Course requirements

To qualify for the Associate Diploma in Jazz Studies, candidates must complete units of study to the value of 96 credit points which include:

- (a) Jazz Performance 1-4 (Performance stream) or Jazz Performance (Arranging) 1-4 (Arranging stream) in the area of the student's Principal Study, **and**
- (b) other requirements as set out under 3.3, **and**
- (c) other subjects of the students choice.

SECTION 2

4. Details of units of study

Pre-requisites, co-requisites, assumed knowledge, mode of delivery, assessment and course content for units of study are as published annually in the Conservatorium Handbook and as advised in course handouts as set out in 2.1 of the Conservatorium Assessment Policy.

5. Variation of normal load

A normal full-time load is defined as an enrolment in a program of approved units of study to a total value of 24 credit points in any one semester. Students may enrol in a program of units of study at variance to a normal full-time load under the provision laid down in 4.2 and 4.3 of the Rules of the Sydney Conservatorium.

6. Cross-institutional study

Cross-institutional study is not normally available to students in the Associate Diploma in Jazz Studies.

7. Restriction on enrolment

Rules on enrolment in units of study within the Associate Diploma in Jazz Studies are governed by rule 3 and subsections of the Rules of the Sydney Conservatorium of Music.

8. Discontinuation of Enrolment

Rules on Discontinuation of Enrolment within the Associate Diploma in Jazz Studies are governed by rule 4.6 and subsections of the Rules of the Sydney Conservatorium of Music.

9. Suspension of Candidature and re-enrolment after an absence

Rules on extended leave of absence and withdrawal from a course or unit of study are governed by rules 4.5.5 and 4.6 and subsections of the Rules of the Sydney Conservatorium of Music. Students resuming a course after extended leave of absence or withdrawal from a course shall be subject to the course requirements in effect at the time of resumption, shall be required to re-enrol as directed by the Head of School and shall be required to pass a re-audition and/or interview at a level determined by the Head of School.

10. Satisfactory Progress

Rules on progression in the program are governed by rule 4 and subsections of the Rules of the Sydney Conservatorium of Music.

The Conservatorium may:

- (a) on the recommendation of the Head of School and in accordance with paragraph 4 and paragraph 5.8 of the Rules of the Sydney Conservatorium of Music, call upon any candidate to show cause why that candidature should not be terminated by reason of unsatisfactory progress towards completion of the degree; and
- (b) where, in the opinion of the Conservatorium, the candidate does not show good cause, terminate the candidature.

11. Time limit

A student shall be required to complete the Associate Diploma in Jazz Studies within a period of five years from commencement of enrolment, except that the requirements for Principal Study shall normally be completed within a period of four semesters, as set out in rule 6 of the Rules of the Sydney Conservatorium of Music.

12. Credit for previous study

A candidate may receive credit for previous study at the Conservatorium or at another institution under the regulations set down in rules 1.3, 1.4 and 1.5 of the Rules of the Sydney Conservatorium of Music

Amendment of the Resolutions of the Senate and Faculty Resolutions

3.7 Board of Studies in Social Work: Bachelor of Social Work – Revised Resolutions of the Senate and Board Resolutions

Board of Studies in Social Work: Bachelor of Social Work – Senate Resolutions

The Resolutions of the Senate relating to the degree of Bachelor of Social Work (p. 625, *Calendar 1999, Volume 1: Statutes and Regulations*) are rescinded and replaced by the following new Resolutions from 1 January 2001.

Bachelor of Social Work

1. These Resolutions of the Senate relate to the degree of Bachelor of Social Work and the combined degree course Bachelor of Arts/Bachelor of Social Work.

These Resolutions must be read in conjunction with the University of Sydney (Undergraduate Courses) Rule, which sets out the requirements for all undergraduate courses, and the relevant Board of Studies Resolutions.

Requirements for the Pass Degree

2. To qualify for the award of the pass degree candidates must:
 - (a) complete successfully units of study giving credit for a total of 192 credit points; and
 - (b) satisfy the requirements of all other relevant By-Laws, Rules and Resolutions of the University

Requirements for the Honours Degree

3. To qualify for the award of the honours degree candidates must complete the honours requirements published in the Board resolutions relating to the course.

Requirements for the Combined Degrees

4. To qualify for the award of the two degrees in the combined degree course Bachelor of Arts/Bachelor of Social Work, students must complete the requirements published in the Board and the Faculty of Arts resolutions relating to the course.

Board of Studies in Social Work: Bachelor of Social Work – Board Resolutions

These Resolutions must be read in conjunction with the *University of Sydney (Undergraduate Courses) Rule 1999* and the Glossary appended to these Board Resolutions.

SECTION 1

Units of Study

1. The Board of Studies in Social Work offers units of study as set out in the *Table of Undergraduate Units of Study*

Requirements for the Pass Degree

2. To qualify for the award of the degree a student shall complete units of study having a total value of at least 192 credit points, including:
 - (1) In the first year - 48 credit points - comprising -
 - (a) Introduction to Sociology 1 and Introduction to Sociology 2; and
 - (b) 36 credit points from the table of units of study for the Bachelor of Arts course.
 - (2) In the second year - 48 credit points comprising -
 - (a) 8 credit point Senior level Sociology unit of study; and
 - (b) Social Inquiry : Research Methods in Sociology (8 credit points); and
 - (c) Psychology for Social Work 201 and 202 (16 credit points); or
 - (d) Intermediate level Psychology units of study totalling 16 credit points; and
 - (e) Senior level units of study totalling 16 credit points prescribed for the award of Bachelor of Arts and taken in accordance with the resolutions for that course.
 - (3) In the third year - 48 credit points comprising -
 - (a) Preparation Seminar 301 (6 credit points); and
 - (b) Issue Based Learning Unit 1 (6 credit points); and
 - (c) Issue Based Learning Unit 2 (6 credit points); and
 - (d) Skills Workshop 301 (6 credit points); and
 - (e) Field Education 302 consisting of not fewer than 80 days and such attendance at classes as may be prescribed by the Board of Studies in Social Work (24 credit points); and
 - (4) In the fourth year - 48 credit points comprising -
 - (a) Issue Based Learning Unit 3 (9 credit points); and
 - (b) Field Education 401 consisting of not fewer than 80 days and such attendance at classes as may be prescribed by the Board of Studies in Social Work (24 credit points); and
 - (c) Issue Based Learning Unit 4 (9 credit points); and
 - (d) Integrative Studies 402 (6 credit points).
3. Units of study completed at the University of Sydney Summer School which correspond to units of study in the Table of Undergraduate Units of Study may be credited towards the course requirements.
4. A candidate shall proceed according to the following progression rules:
 - (a) Except with the permission of the Board, a candidate shall not commence the third year without having obtained 96 credit points as outlined in the *Table of Undergraduate Units of Study*;
 - (b) A candidate shall not attempt Field Education 301 without having obtained 120 credit points and having been approved as being ready to undertake field education;
 - (c) A candidate shall not attempt the fourth year without having obtained 144 credit points;
 - (d) A candidate shall not attempt Field Education 401 without having obtained 153 credit points;
 - (e) A candidate shall not attempt IBL Unit 4 without having obtained 177 credit points;
 - (f) a candidate shall not attempt Integrative Studies 402 without having obtained 186 credit

points.

Combined Arts/Social Work Course

5. A candidate qualifies for the combined courses of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Social Work by completing 240 credit points including:
 - (a) at least 28 credit points in Sociology (including Social Inquiry: Research Methods in Sociology); and
 - (b) either 28 credit points of Psychology or Psychology for Social Work 201 and 202; and
 - (c) at least 64 further Senior credit points from the Table of Units of Study for the Bachelor of Arts course, including a major; and
 - (d) the third and fourth years of the Bachelor of Social Work course as set out in the *Table of Undergraduate Units of Study*.
6. The Dean of the Faculty of Arts and the Chairperson of the Board shall jointly exercise authority in any matter concerning the combined degrees not otherwise dealt with in these resolutions.

Honours Course

7. Honours shall be awarded in the following manner:
 - (a) The credit points in the third and fourth years shall be weighted as follows:
 - (b) Third year

 - (b) a weighted average mark shall be calculated and grades of honours will be awarded for the following weighted average marks:

8. In awarding honours at graduation, the Board will taken into account the performance of students generally, including the length of time taken to complete the course and performance in field education;
9. If a candidate graduates with First Class Honours and the Board is of the opinion that the candidate's work is of sufficient merit, that candidate shall receive a bronze medal.

SECTION 2

Field Education

10. The Department of Social Work, Social Policy and Sociology shall be responsible for the selection of field education placements, the approval of students to undertake field education and, in consultation with practitioners who act as field education supervisors, for the evaluation of the candidate's performance in the field;
11. The Department of Social Work, Social Policy and Sociology may withdraw a candidate who has commenced a field education placement if changes to examination results or other evidence alter the candidate's status with respect to the prerequisites for that placement;

12. The Board, acting on the advice of the Chair of the Department of Social Work, Social Policy and Sociology, may, in special circumstances, authorise the Department not to place a candidate in a field education placement or to refuse permission for a candidate to undertake or continue field education;
13. These procedures shall be implemented when a student:
 - (a) while undertaking a field education placement, is excluded by either the University or agency staff from that placement, which exclusion is, as soon as possible thereafter, the subject of written report;
 - (b) while undertaking a field education placement, is the subject of an adverse report in writing from either University or agency staff. This report refers not to unsatisfactory progress resulting in a failure in the placement, but rather to specific incidents or behaviours which, in the opinion of the reporting staff, cast doubt on the student's capacity to perform appropriately as a beginning professional practitioner in social work. Such a report may refer to overall progress in professional development, including academic, emotional and ethical matters. Such a report may be in addition to a failure in the placement; or
 - (c) is considered by University staff in a written report to be unsuitable to undertake field education.
14. The student who is subject to the exclusion or reports set out in paragraph 1 may elect to have the matter dealt with by the Chair of the Department of Social Work, Social Policy and Sociology or by the Special Cases Sub-committee on Practice;
15. The Chair of Department of Social Work, Social Policy and Sociology or the sub-committee shall:
 - (a) provide the student with the relevant written reports;
 - (b) invite the student to present his or her case; and
 - (c) review the reports and related evidence in the light of any submission made by the student.
16. The student may present a case orally or in writing, or both, and may be accompanied to any meeting with the Chair of the Department of Social Work, Social Policy and Sociology or sub-committee by a person of the student's choice. The Chair of the Department of Social Work, Social Policy and Sociology or the sub-committee shall arrange for the presence of a person to keep a record of the meeting. The record of the meeting and the decision taken shall be communicated to the student in writing;
17. The Chair of the Department of Social Work, Social Policy and Sociology or the sub-committee may:
 - (a) allow the student to continue in field education;
 - (b) warn the student that the continuation of the behaviour could result in exclusion from further field education placements and allow the student to continue in field education;
 - (c) recommend to the Chairperson of the Board that the student not be placed or continued in field education unless specified conditions have been met;
 - (d) recommend to the Chairperson of the Board that the student not be placed or continued in field education.
18. The Chairperson of the Board of Studies is authorised to exercise the powers of the Board and decide upon recommendations made under paragraphs 5(17)(c) and 5(17)(d);
19. In the event of a further exclusion or adverse report, the Chair of the Department of Social Work, Social Policy and Sociology or the sub-committee may taken note of the decisions taken in relation to the previous occasion;

20. A decision under paragraph 5(17)(c) constitutes a failure in the field education placement concerned;
21. A decision under paragraph 5(17)(d) constitutes exclusion from the course;
22. Nothing in these procedures interferes with the appeal rights conferred on a student by Senate;

Enrolment in more/less than minimum load

23. A student may not enrol without first obtaining permission from the Chairperson of the Board in additional units of study once the degree requirements of 192 credit points have been satisfied.

Repeating a unit of study

24. Where a student enrolls in a unit of study which is the same as, or has a substantial amount in common with, a unit of study previously attempted but not completed *at the grade of Pass or better*, the Chair of Department concerned may exempt the student from certain requirements of the unit of study if satisfied that the relevant competence has been demonstrated.

Cross-institutional enrolment

25. Provided that permission has been obtained in advance, the Chairperson of the Board may permit a student to complete a unit of study at another institution and have that unit credited to his/her course requirements provided that either
 - (a) the unit of study content is material not taught in any corresponding unit of study in the University, or
 - (b) the student is unable for good reason to attend a corresponding unit of study at the University.

Restrictions on enrolment

26. Units of study which overlap substantially in content are noted in the *Table of Undergraduate Units of Study*. Such units of study are mutually exclusive and no more than one of the overlapping units of study may be counted towards meeting the course requirements.

Satisfactory Progress

27. If a student fails or discontinues enrolment in one unit of study twice, the student may be asked to show good cause why he or she should be allowed to re-enrol in that unit of study.

Re-enrolment after an absence

28. In cases where the Board of Studies permits the re-enrolment of a student whose progress has been deemed unsatisfactory, the Board of Studies may require the completion of specified units of study in a specified time, and if the student does not comply with these conditions the student may be called upon to show good cause why he or she should be allowed to re-enrol in the course.
29. A student whose candidature has lapsed shall not re-enrol as a candidate for the degree unless selected for admission through UAC.

Discontinuation of Enrolment

30. A discontinuation of enrolment after the date specified by the University may be recorded as a Discontinuation with Permission where the discontinuation is a result of the student's failure in a third or fourth year unit of study and where, the student cannot proceed to the next unit.

Time Limits

31. Except with the permission of the Board of Studies, a candidate shall complete the requirements for the course or courses concerned in not more than twice the minimum time for completion at the time of commencement.

Assessment Policy

32. Students may be tested by written and oral examinations, exercises, essays or practical work or any combination of these as the Board may determine.
33. Chairs of Department may arrange for further testing in cases of special consideration, in accordance with Academic Board policy governing illness and misadventure.
34. The Chair of the Board of Studies, on the recommendation of the Head of Department of Social Work, Social Policy and Sociology, may determine the final mark of a candidate in a unit of study before the meeting of the Board of Examiners.

Credit Transfer Policy

35. Credit will not be granted for units of study completed more than nine years prior to application, except with permission of the Chairperson of the Board;
36. Credit may be granted as specific credit if the unit of study is considered to be directly equivalent to a unit of study in the *Table of Undergraduate Units of Study* or as non-specific credit;
37. The total amount of credit granted for units of study from another degree course or for a course where a diploma has been conferred may not be greater than 96 credit points;
38. A student will not be granted credit for field education or work experience;
39. A citizen or permanent resident of Australia who holds a social work qualification obtained in a country other than Australia and which has been assessed by the National Office of Overseas Skills Recognition or the Australian Association of Social Workers as being equivalent to three years of full-time tertiary degree level social work study in Australia, may be admitted to the fourth year;
