1. Definitions

ATAR	Australian Tertiary Admission Rank. This replaced the University Admission Index (UAI) in NSW and the ACT from 2009. All other States, with the exception of Queensland, adopted the ATAR in 2010. Queensland continues to use the OP. When referred to herein, ATAR refers to the Australian Tertiary Admission Rank or equivalent.
ATAR “points”	Reference to ATAR “points” in this policy refers to whole integers in line with common usage in policy statements by other universities and the Universities Admissions Centre.
Award course	<p>An award course is a formally approved program of study that can lead to an academic award granted by the University. An award course requires the completion of a program of study specified by course rules. Award courses are approved by Senate, on the recommendation of the Academic Board. Students normally apply to transfer between Award courses through the UAC. The award course name will appear on testamurs. The University broadly classifies courses as undergraduate, postgraduate coursework or postgraduate research. Unit of study	A unit of study is the smallest stand-alone component of a student’s course that is recordable on a student’s transcript. Units of study have an integer credit point value, normally in the range 3-24. Each approved unit of study is identified by a unique sequence of eight characters, consisting of a four character alphabetical code which usually identifies the department or subject

area, and a four character numeric code which identifies the particular unit of study. Units of study can be grouped by subject and level.

2. Admissions policy

- 2.1** The University's admissions policy is the responsibility of the Senate and of the Academic Board, acting on the recommendation of its Undergraduate and Graduate Studies Committees. The Academic Board has resolved that selection criteria should be clearly expressed so that, as far as possible decisions can be taken by administrative staff at either the Admissions Office or Faculty level.
- 2.2** Recognition of institutions, programs and courses is the responsibility of the Academic Board, acting on the recommendation of its Undergraduate and Graduate Studies Committees. Programs and courses may generally be recognised for the purposes of admission to candidature where the program of study undertaken for the examination and the standard of the examinations are considered to be equivalent to the program and standard required for candidates for the NSW Higher School Certificate or to the equivalent of the completion of a first year undergraduate program of study at the University of Sydney.
- 2.3** The University is required to maintain appropriate records of the basis for admission of students so that the effectiveness of admission criteria can be evaluated. These records should be kept in accordance with University record keeping policy as outlined in the University Record Keeping Manual.
- 2.4** The University's student record systems are required to record the basis for a student's admission with sufficient details to allow statistical reviews of the progression rate of students admitted through special admissions programs (including Broadway and Flexible Entry).

3. Admission Requirements: General Principles

- 3.1** Faculties may impose selection criteria in addition to the applicant's secondary and tertiary record from time to time. Such additional criteria must be reported to the Academic Board for approval and incorporation into the Academic Board's schedule of approved criteria, and a minimum of eight (8) months notice must be given to prospective students.
- 3.2** Applicants are also required to meet any specified English language requirements as specified by the Academic Board (see English Language Requirements).
- 3.3** The Academic Board has resolved that weightings applied to selection criteria must be made public and be the same for all applicants in a course.
- 3.4** Normal admission to the University is based primarily upon academic merit. However, the University recognises that, for many reasons, some applicants are not able to demonstrate their full potential for success at tertiary level study through the normal qualifying examinations. The University, therefore, provides means for such applicants to enter courses. Details may be found in the University of Sydney (Amendment Act) Rule 1999, Part 9, Division 4, Special Admission to Undergraduate Courses for Local Applicants, and Resolutions of the Academic Board relating to Equity programs and Failure and Exclusion.

4. Assumed Knowledge and Additional Selection Criteria

(see also University of Sydney (Amendment Act) Rule 1999, Part 9, Division 6, Additional selection criteria, entry requirement prerequisite and assumed knowledge for local and international students.)

The policy regarding the approval of assumed knowledge requirements and the timeline for the introduction of new or amended requirements are set out in 3.2.2 and 4.4.2 of the Academic Board Resolutions: Creation, Variation and Deletion of Award Courses and Units of Study.

Full details of currently approved assumed knowledge and selection criteria are contained in Schedule 3.

5. Secondary Studies

5.1 More than one Secondary Qualification

5.1.1 The most recent ATAR or equivalent gained from all attempts by a person who has attempted a school leaving examination more than once shall be the secondary school component for determining eligibility for admission.

5.1.2 Offers of admission will be deemed to be made on the correct results of the applicants seeking admission and if the results officially communicated to candidates are subsequently found to be incorrect, the University will act as follows:

5.1.2.1 A higher ATAR or equivalent than that originally awarded

The University will endeavour to admit the applicant to the course to which the correct ATAR would have earned admission, provided that in the opinion of the Dean of the faculty concerned, it is not too late in the year to commence studies effectively.

5.1.2.2 A lower ATAR or equivalent than that originally awarded

The University will reserve the right to withdraw an offer of entry at any time within the first four weeks of the semester for which an offer of entry was made and accepted. If an offer is withdrawn the University will endeavour to place the applicant concerned into the course in which his or her results would have entitled enrolment. No offer of entry will be withdrawn without the approval of the Dean of the faculty concerned and the Registrar.

5.2 Conversion of interstate results

The conversion of interstate and New Zealand results in secondary studies will occur in accordance with the Interstate Transfer Index endorsed by the New South Wales Vice-Chancellors' Conference.

5.3 Flexible Entry Scheme

5.3.1 Faculties may approve flexible entry schemes for specified courses.

5.3.2 Pursuant to Part 9(38) and Part 9(41) of the University of Sydney (Amendment Act) Rule 1999, the University establishes for most undergraduate award courses an ATAR cut-off. Eligible applicants for such courses with an ATAR, or ATAR equivalent, equal to, or greater than, the ATAR cut-off will be admitted on the basis of their ATAR.

5.3.3 Flexible entry schemes for specified courses apply to eligible current domestic, Australian Year 12 recent school leaver, including

International Baccalaureate, applicants with ATAR or ATAR equivalents lying below the ATAR cut-off for that course. Flexible entry schemes will comprise two components:

5.3.3.1 A flexible entry ATAR band, lying between the ATAR cut-off and the lower limit to the band. This lower limit will not normally lie more than 5 ATAR points below the ATAR cut-off;

5.3.3.2 A flexible entry criterion or criteria, additional to the ATAR, which allows admission of eligible applicants whose ATAR lies within the flexible entry band. In order to monitor equity for applicants, flexible entry criteria must be selected from the list approved by the Academic Board from time to time;

5.3.3.3 Faculties wishing to amend their flexible entry criteria must seek the approval of the Academic Board, with any approved changes to be published online and reflected in the any subsequent UAC Guide entries and relevant admissions publications.

5.3.4 Board approved flexible entry criteria are:

5.3.4.1 Performance in the HSC, or HSC equivalent, in subjects relevant to the course;

5.3.4.2 Performance in extra-curricular academic activities relevant to the course (e.g. Science Olympiads);

5.3.4.3 Aptitude for the course, demonstrated by relevant work and/or other experience, submission of a portfolio, and/or submission of a statement of interest in the course. Faculties may use written submissions, interviews, or other methods to obtain information about aptitude.

5.3.5 Applicants may be considered using criteria under flexible entry schemes and under educational access schemes (e.g. Broadway), provided that their ATAR lies within the approved band for both schemes. Admission bands are not normally widened for applicants who are eligible for consideration under more than one special admission program.

5.3.6 The scheme is not available to applicants with a tertiary record or to international students.

5.4 International Baccalaureate Forecast Scores

International students undertaking the International Baccalaureate may be admitted on the basis of forecast scores. Such scores must be at least two points higher than the published admission score for the relevant course.

6. Secondary studies completed overseas

6.1 A completed senior secondary qualification from overseas can be used as the basis for admission to undergraduate courses by applicants if the applicant demonstrates learning outcomes at a standard considered to be equivalent to the program and the standard required of candidates for the New South Wales Higher School Certificate.

6.2 In conjunction with the UAC and other universities in NSW and the ACT, the University has established a list of overseas secondary qualifications deemed equivalent to the NSW HSC.

6.3 In addition to the list referred to in clause 6.2, the Academic Board has also determined that students who achieve a Tier One result in China's National

College Entrance Exam (also known as the GaoKao) will be deemed to have met the requirements outlined in clause 6.1.

7. Tertiary Studies

7.1 Applicants who have completed the equivalent of at least one full-time year of approved tertiary study at an Australian Associate Diploma level or higher (i.e. 48 credit points of study at the University of Sydney, or part-time equivalent) are eligible to be considered for admission to candidature.

7.2.1 Qualifications accredited under the Australian Qualifications Framework (AQF) must be of at least Diploma level or higher and be complete to be considered for admission to candidature if the qualification is from a recognised institution.

7.2.2 The methods used for assessing overseas tertiary qualifications have been established and are reviewed in conjunction with the Universities Admissions Centre and other universities in NSW and the ACT. They are based upon the guidelines established by the National Office of Overseas Skills Recognition.

7.3 Consideration will normally be given to either the applicant's record of tertiary studies or their record of both tertiary and secondary studies, with the better of either record being used to determine their eligibility for admission.

7.4 If the applicant does not have a recognised secondary qualification, only the tertiary record will be considered.

7.5 The best attempt at tertiary study of applicants who have more than one attempt at tertiary study is considered.

7.6 Applicants who have completed some tertiary study may be eligible to receive some credit for completed units of study (see University of Sydney (Amendment Act) Rule 1999 Part 9 Division 8: Granting Credit).

8. Access and Equity Programs

Whilst entry to the University is based primarily upon academic merit, the University recognises that, for many reasons, some applicants are not able to demonstrate their full potential for success at tertiary level study through the normal qualifying examinations. The University, therefore, provides means for such applicants to enter courses. These schemes are outlined in Schedule 4.

9. Failure and Exclusion

9.1 Applicants who have been excluded from an associate diploma, diploma or degree program and who successfully complete at least one semester of study at degree level subsequent to the exclusion or provide a satisfactory explanation of the circumstances for the exclusion may be allowed to compete for admission.

9.2 Applicants with a record of failure and/or exclusion at tertiary study and who believe their studies have been affected by circumstances beyond their control may apply for special consideration by the relevant faculty.

10. Local Fee-Paying Applicants

10.1 Current Federal Government policy does not allow universities to offer local fee paying places.

10.2 Students admitted as local fee paying applicants can continue under the rules in place at the time of their admission.

10.3 Local fee-paying students may apply to transfer to Commonwealth-supported university places and all such applications will be assessed in accordance with the procedure for Commonwealth-supported places.

11. International Fee-paying Applicants

The Academic Board policy on international exchange and fee-paying applicants found below should be read in conjunction with the University of Sydney (Amendment Act) Rule 1999, Part 9 – Admission to Courses, Division 5.

11.1 International Fee-Paying Applicants – General Provisions

11.1.1 Admission to University of Sydney courses under the local quota is restricted to persons having Australian or New Zealand citizenship or who have permanent residence in Australia. Other applicants apply as international applicants and must hold an appropriate immigration authority enabling them to undertake courses of study in Australia.

11.1.2 Except for Exchange and Cotutelle students, International applicants will be considered for entry to the University on a fee-paying basis only. Those attempting an Australian Year 12 or International Baccalaureate in Australia must apply through the Universities Admissions Centre. Other international applicants will need to apply directly to the University.

11.1.3 The Dean of each faculty sets academic selection standards for international students that should ensure that those admitted as international students have a reasonable likelihood of success.

11.2 Foundation Programs

11.2.1 International applicants who have successfully completed an approved University Preparation Program which was commenced as an international student are eligible for consideration for admission to candidature.

11.2.2 The following preparation programs have been approved by the Academic Board for admission of international applicants:

11.2.2.1 foundation programs offered by public higher education providers in Australia that are authorised to self-accredit their courses under the Australian Qualifications Framework (AQF); and

11.2.2.2 foundation programs offered by public higher education providers in New Zealand that are authorised to self-accredit their courses under the New Zealand Qualifications Framework (NZQF); and

11.2.2.3 the Advanced International Certificate of Education, University of Cambridge.

11.2.3 The Academic Board will consider recognising foundation and preparatory programs offered by private higher education providers in Australia and New Zealand subject to the courses in:

11.2.3.1 Australia being accredited under the AQF at Certificate IV level; and

11.2.3.2 New Zealand being accredited under the NZQF at Certificate IV level.

- 11.2.4 The Academic Board will consider recognising foundation and preparatory programs offered by overseas higher education providers on a case-by-case basis.
- 11.2.5 Unless otherwise specified by a particular Faculty, admission standards for foundation and preparatory courses that are recognised for admission by the Academic Board shall be set in accordance with the relevant Universities Admissions Centre (UAC) schedule.

11.3 Tertiary Studies

Applicants who have completed the equivalent of at least two full-time semesters of approved tertiary study at Associate Diploma or higher level (i.e. 48 credit points of study at the University of Sydney, or part-time equivalent), or equivalent, are eligible for consideration for admission, in accordance with the criteria specified for local applicants. Such applicants may be eligible to receive some credit for completed units of study. (see University of Sydney (Amendment Act) Rule 1999 Part 9 Division 8: Granting Credit)

12. Change of Residency of International Fee-Paying Students

12.1 Prior to semester census dates

12.1.1 If a student is granted permanent residency prior to 31 March for a standard semester 1 enrolment, or prior to 31 August for a standard semester 2 enrolment, and their ATAR or equivalent (based on the applicant's secondary and/or tertiary record) is equal to or above the ATAR of the Commonwealth-supported cohort for the same course, and there are places available, the student's residential status will be converted to that of Commonwealth-supported.

12.1.2 If the student's ATAR or equivalent (based on the applicant's secondary and/or tertiary record) is below that of the Commonwealth-supported cohort for the same course, the student's residential status will be converted to that of a local fee-paying student.

12.2 After semester census dates

If a student has a change in residency status to that of permanent residency after 31 March for a standard semester 1 enrolment, or 31 August for a standard semester 2 enrolment, the student will continue as an international fee-paying student for that semester, and (except in the case of Medicine) change status to that of local fee-paying for second semester but may subsequently compete for a Commonwealth-supported place should places be available.

13. English Language Requirements

13.1 Applicants who have not completed an Australian educational qualification have to provide proof of proficiency in English through internationally recognised tests such as IELTS (Academic version) or TOEFL or through satisfactory completion of an appropriate course at the University's Centre for English Teaching unless the applicant has a record of satisfactory achievement in secondary/tertiary studies in an English-speaking country, or in a secondary/tertiary institution where the language of instruction was in English (i.e. where the applicant has completed senior secondary study or at least one year of full-time university study).

13.2 For students from those countries who are required by the Commonwealth Government to provide IELTS or TOEFL results for a student visa, and who do not have a record of satisfactory achievement in secondary/tertiary studies in an English-speaking country, this test result will be the primary assessment

- tool used for determining whether the student has satisfied English language requirements.
- 13.3 Where there is insufficient evidence of current English competence relevant to a particular course of study, faculties reserve the right to ask the applicant to undergo a further assessment of written and/or spoken English. Faculties that prescribe such further assessment are required to report the circumstances and the form of the assessment to the Undergraduate Studies Committee .
- 13.4 All applicants must either have a record of satisfactory achievement in secondary/tertiary studies in which the language of instruction was in English or must meet one of the following English language requirements as a condition of entry:
- 13.4.1 a qualification accepted by the University as proof of an international student's proficiency in English as specified in Schedule 5;
 - 13.4.2 overall band score of IELTS 6.5 (with a minimum of 6.0 in each band);
 - 13.4.3 Paper-based TOEFL 577 plus TWE (Test of Written English) at 4.5 (scores older than two years are not accepted);
 - 13.4.4 Internet-based TOEFL 90 plus 23 for Writing and 22 for Reading, Speaking and Listening;
 - 13.4.5 scores older than two years from the semester start date are not accepted.
 - 13.4.6 Faculties may request that the Academic Board approve English language requirements above the minimum set out in above. Approved Faculty variations above the minimum requirements are set out in Schedule 1 of this policy.
 - 13.4.7 Specific courses for which English language requirements are discretionary are listed in Schedule 2.
- 13.5 International Baccalaureate students who have gained the diploma can be regarded as having met the University of Sydney minimum English requirements, provided they have met one of the following criteria:
- 13.5.1 Completion of English A1 at Higher or Standard Level;
 - 13.5.2 Completion of English A2 at Higher or Standard Level;
 - 13.5.3 Completion of English B at Higher Level with Grade 4 or more; or completion of English B at Standard Level with a Grade 5 or more.
- 13.6 A conversion table for different English language skills tests accepted by the University is provided as Schedule 7 of this policy.

Schedule 4: Admission Schemes

S4.1 Educational Access Scheme: The Broadway Scheme

S4.1.1 The Broadway Scheme is designed to assist applicants who have experienced long term educational disadvantage to gain entry to the University.

S4.1.2 The scheme can assist current or previous candidates for NSW/ACT Year 12 and interstate equivalent programs attending high school or a TAFE college or overseas equivalent and who have suffered long-term educational disadvantage, or severe disadvantage during Years 11 and/or 12 or equivalent.

S4.1.3 The methods used for assessing long term educational disadvantage have been established and are reviewed in conjunction with the Universities Admissions Centre and other universities in NSW and the ACT. They may include (but not exclusively) adverse home environment, adverse, study conditions, chronic illness, or disability or personal trauma, disrupted schooling, English language problems, excessive family responsibilities, family disruption, financial hardship, geographical isolation or physical abuse.

S4.1.4 Applicants approved under the scheme are allowed to compete for admission with an ATAR or equivalent of up to five rank points below the course cut-off or equivalent.

S4.1.5 The Broadway Scheme is not available:

S4.1.5.1 To applicants who have a record of tertiary studies; or

S4.1.5.2 To full-fee paying international applicants; or

S4.1.5.3 For entry to local fee paying courses.

S4.2 Cadigal Program

The Cadigal Program is guided by the principle that improving Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander (ATSI) participation in higher education is not simply a matter of opening the doors. It is dependent on the provision of appropriate support to students entering courses under special admission arrangements. It takes into account the educational disadvantage experienced by ATSI people. It aims to address such disadvantage by providing preparatory studies for ATSI people wishing to undertake degree level study, the option to undertake the first year of study on a reduced load, and the opportunity to participate in an on-going support program.

In addition to the avenues currently available to all students seeking entry into University courses, special provisions are proposed for ATSI people seeking admission to University courses under the following categories:

S4.2.1 HSC applicants - completion of the NSW Higher School Certificate (or equivalent) with the minimum ATAR as set by the Cadigal Program for the course applied for.

S4.2.2 Mature age applicants - must be 21 years or over. These applicants will be eligible for consideration for admission upon meeting one or more of the following requirements:

S4.2.2.1 Completion of an approved tertiary preparation course relevant to the course of study applied for;

S4.2.2.2 Completion or partial completion of an accredited course at a tertiary institution; or

S4.2.2.3 Demonstration of, to the satisfaction of the Dean, the capacity to succeed in course work at University level.

Selection of applicants will be based on application and interview. Under this Program it is proposed that up to 5% of University places will be made available to suitable ATSI applicants.

S4.3 Mature Age Applicants (Local Students)

S4.3.1 To be eligible to apply under the Mature Age Entry Scheme candidates must meet all four of the following criteria. Candidates must:

S4.3.1.1 be at least 21 years of age on 1 March of the year of entry to the University;

S4.3.1.2 not have an ATAR or equivalent interstate or overseas qualification that would enable them to compete for normal admission;

S4.3.1.3 not have been completed at least two full-time semesters (part-time equivalent) of study in a Bachelor's degree or higher level qualification, an Associate Diploma or higher level qualification, or not have completed an AQF Diploma or Advanced Diploma, at a recognised tertiary institution;

S4.3.1.4 have completed one of the following approved preparation courses:

S4.3.1.4.1 a University Preparation Course offered by the University's Centre for Continuing Education

S4.3.1.4.2 the Tertiary Preparation Certificate Course offered at a NSW TAFE college

S4.3.1.4.3 a Limited HSC (The University of Sydney does not use the Limited HSC for automatic selection. Applicants who present more than nine units at the HSC and are eligible for an ATAR will not be considered under the Mature Age Entry Scheme.)

S4.3.1.4.4 the Open Foundation Course or NEWSTEP Program offered by the University of Newcastle

S4.3.1.4.5 the University Preparation Program offered by the University of New South Wales

S4.3.1.4.6 enrolled nursing qualifications for entry to the Bachelor of Nursing

S4.3.2.1 Faculties will determine the minimum level of academic merit required and the offers to be made, taking into account results achieved in any one of the above preparation courses.

S4.3.2.2 Results of the preparation courses above are valid only for two full-time years or equivalent immediately following completion of the course with the exception of enrolled nursing qualifications.

S4.3.3 For courses in the Faculty of Health Sciences which are vocationally oriented, work experience and completion of relevant TAFE courses and AQF courses from accredited providers may be taken into consideration. In addition, applicants may be interviewed to evaluate personal qualities and likelihood of success.

S4.3.4.1 Levels of assumed knowledge specified for each course or equivalent, are normally considered as prerequisites for Mature Age Entry Scheme applicants. (see Assumed Knowledge and Additional Selection Criteria).

S4.3.4.2 Mature Age Entry Scheme applicants are also required to meet any additional, selection criteria such as (but not limited to) interviews, work portfolios or practical examinations.

S4.3.5 The Mature Age Entry Scheme is open for entry to most Commonwealth-supported based undergraduate courses offered through UAC, with the exception of such courses as may be determined by faculties from time to time.

S4.4 Elite Athletes or Performers

S4.4.1 Preamble

Elite athletes or performers who believe that their training, competitive or performance commitments have affected their HSC preparation may apply for special consideration under the Elite Athletes or Performers Scheme. Applicants eligible for consideration under more than one special admission scheme will not be granted a concession of more than five ATAR points in total.

Approval under this scheme does not guarantee admission but allows applicants, who have been assessed as being “elite” and can demonstrate sporting or performance commitments have impeded their HSC performance, to compete for a place with an ATAR of up to five ranks below the reported Commonwealth-supported course cut-off or equivalent for the year of admission.

Assessment of elite status will be undertaken by the Elite Athletes Assessment Panel for athletes and by the Elite Performers Assessment Panel for performer applicants, normally prior to the publication of HSC results for Semester One offers. Determination of whether individual applications qualify as elite for the purposes of this scheme will be made in line with the criteria set by the Assessment Panels from time to time.

Applicants deemed to be of elite status by the Elite Athlete or Elite Performers Assessment Panel will be considered for admission by the relevant faculty. Qualifying as an Elite Athlete or Performer under this scheme does not constitute an offer for admission to the University.

S4.4.2 Application for Special Consideration as an Elite Athlete or Performer

S4.4.2.1 Persons wishing to apply for special consideration as an elite athlete or performer must apply to the Admissions Office by completing the application form available from the University website or Admissions Office. Applications close on the last day of business in October of each year.

S4.4.2.2 Applications received by the Admissions Office are recorded and a letter of acknowledgement of receipt is sent to each applicant.

S4.4.3 Assessment of Elite Status

S4.4.3.1 In the case of **Athlete** applications, these are forwarded by the Admissions Office to the Elite Athletes Assessment Panel for assessment of elite status;

S4.4.3.2 In the case of **Performer** applications, these are forwarded to the Elite Performers Assessment Panel;

S4.4.3.3 Assessment of elite status in both cases is based on advice from referees and liaison with appropriate experts in the relevant sport/performance area;

S4.4.3.4 Advice regarding elite status is sent to the Admissions Office by the relevant assessment panel after approval of the Selection Committee.

S4.4.3.5 Applications are forwarded to the relevant Faculty for their consideration. Faculties then forward recommendations for offers to the Admissions Office.

S4.4.4 Notification to Applicants

S4.4.4.1 The Admissions Office will notify applicants in writing of the outcome of their application.

S4.4.5 Elite Athlete and Performer Selection Committee and Assessment Panels

The Elite Athletes and Performers Selection Committee will comprise members of both Assessment Panels. Additional members may be appointed by the Chair of the Academic Board to provide additional expertise as required and to ensure gender parity.

S4.4.5.1 A Selection Committee shall be convened during admission periods to oversee the Elite Athlete and Performer Scheme, comprising:

S4.4.5.1.1 the Chair of the Academic Board or nominee, to act as Chairperson

S4.4.5.1.2 the Chair of the Undergraduate Studies Committee or nominee

S4.4.5.1.3 the Director of the Student Centre or nominee

S4.4.5.1.4 the Director of Academic Affairs (Education Portfolio)

S4.4.5.2 The Selection Committee will oversee the criteria used by Panels to assess 'elite' status.

S4.4.5.3 The membership of the Elite Athlete Assessment Panel shall comprise:

S4.4.5.3.1 at least one member from the Selection Committee, as listed in S4.4.5.1, who shall act as Chairperson, and

S4.4.5.3.2 two staff members from Sydney University Sports and Fitness

S4.4.5.4 The membership of the Elite Performer Assessment Panel shall comprise:

S4.4.5.4.1 at least one member from the Selection Committee, as listed in S4.4.5.1, who shall act as Chairperson, and

S4.4.5.4.2 two University staff members appointed by the Chair of the Academic Board

S4.4.5.5 Panels will meet as necessary during admissions periods.

S4.4.5.6 The Selection Committee shall report annually to the Undergraduate Studies Committee of the Academic Board (via the Admissions Sub-Committee) regarding the scheme.

S4.5 Rural Students Entry Scheme (Faculty of Health Sciences)

The purpose of the Rural Student Entry Scheme is to redress the imbalance that currently exists in the proportion of health care professionals within urban and rural settings. The Faculty of Health Sciences endeavours to support the rural health community by enabling suitable students with significant rural backgrounds to compete for a separate entry quota. The Faculty has set a small number of places in its undergraduate courses for prospective rural students who meet the selection criteria outlined below. (The reduced ATAR will reflect a degree of educational disadvantage, but should not compromise the applicant's ability to meet the academic requirements of the course). Applicants must be Australian Citizens, New Zealand Citizens or Australian Permanent Residents.

S4.5.1 Criteria for Selection

For current New South Wales HSC students or equivalent, an ATAR of not less than 5 points below the main round cut off mark for the year of entry. All New South Wales HSC students from the previous year (or equivalent) are eligible to apply if they have not completed one full-time year (or part-time equivalent) of tertiary study and meet the ATAR cut off as described above for current New South Wales HSC students. (Tertiary study refers to Diploma,

Advanced Diploma, Bachelors Degree or higher qualification recognised by the University of Sydney).

S4.5.1.1 Applicants must have completed at least the last four years of secondary education at a rural school (the definition of “rural” is detailed below).

S4.5.1.2 Applicants must have lived in a rural area for a significant period of time (the definition of “rural” is detailed below).

S4.5.1.3 Applicants must be able to demonstrate a commitment to a career in a rural health setting. (This may include an exceptional record of involvement and achievement in community affairs at school or local community level in a rural environment).

S4.5.2 Definition of “Rural”

The basis for the definition of “rural” will be the area encompassing the rural NSW Area Health Service regions, as announced by the NSW Department of Health on 16 March 1966, or the equivalent definition of rural applicable to other States. Basically, all of New South Wales is considered rural with the exception of Sydney, Central Coast, Newcastle, Wollongong, the Blue Mountains and their surrounding areas.

S4.5.3 Application Process

In addition to lodging an application with the University Admission Centre (UAC), applicants must complete a Rural Student Entry Scheme application form and return it to the Faculty of Health Sciences by the due date (usually late November). All supporting documentation including a reference from the applicant’s School Principal and at least one other rural community leader must be attached to the application form. Applicants who meet all of the criteria for selection will then be ranked according to their confirmed ATAR.

S4.6 Rural Students Entry Scheme into Pharmacy

S4.6.1 Criteria for Selection

S4.6.1.1 For current New South Wales HSC students or equivalent, an ATAR of not more than 5 points below the main round cut off mark for the year of entry. All New South Wales HSC students (or equivalent) from the previous year are eligible to apply if they have not completed one full-time year (or part-time equivalent) of tertiary study and meet the ATAR cut off as described above for current New South Wales HSC students. (Tertiary study refers to Diploma, Advanced Diploma, Bachelors Degree or higher qualification recognised by the University of Sydney).

S4.6.1.2 Applicants must have completed at least the last four years of secondary education at a rural school (the definition of “rural” is detailed below).

S4.6.1.3 Applicants must have lived in a rural area for a significant period of time (the definition of “rural” is detailed below).

S4.6.1.4 Applicants must be able to demonstrate a commitment to a career in a rural health setting. (This may include an exceptional record of involvement and achievement in community affairs at school or local community level in a rural environment).

S4.6.2 Definition of “Rural”

The basis for the definition of “rural” will be the area encompassing the rural NSW Area Health Service regions, as announced by the NSW Department of Health on 16 March 1966, or the equivalent definition of rural applicable to other States. Basically, all of New South Wales is considered rural with the exception of Sydney, Central Coast, Newcastle, Wollongong, the Blue

Mountains and their surrounding areas. In other states, similar definitions will apply.

S4.6.3 Application Process

In addition to lodging an application with the University Admission Centre (UAC), applicants must complete a Faculty of Pharmacy Rural Student Entry Scheme application form and return it to the Admissions Office, Student Centre by the due date (usually the last date for change of preference for Main Round offers). All supporting documentation including a reference from the applicant's School Principal and at least one other rural community leader must be attached to the application form. Applicants who meet all of the criteria for selection will then be ranked according to their confirmed ATAR.

S4.7 Special Consideration for Admission Scheme

S4.7.1 This scheme is for applicants with a record of tertiary study who have experienced some form of disadvantage during their secondary or tertiary studies. It is not strictly speaking a special admission scheme, as it is available to applicants with a record of tertiary study, but it serves a similar purpose. Applicants are required to submit a statement to the Admissions Office, accompanied by supporting documentation which proves their claims. This application is in addition to the mandatory application for admission through UAC.

S4.7.2 The scheme is available for admission into all of the University's undergraduate courses which are offered through UAC. However, only applicants who can demonstrate a serious disadvantage will be eligible for consideration. The scheme is not an avenue for applicants to submit personal statements or references which provide superfluous information about themselves but do not establish that they have been disadvantaged.

S4.7.3 Applicants who receive consideration under this scheme will normally only be eligible for admission if their results are already within five ranks of the applicable cut-off. If you require further information about this scheme and/or an application form you can contact the Admissions Office. Applicants for this scheme should make their submissions in August or September, at the same time as lodging their on-time UAC applications.

S4.8 Inspired by Business Program Pilot Scheme

S4.8.1 The Business School will pilot this scheme for 2012 admission to the Bachelor of Commerce.

S4.8.2 The scheme is open to students of identified schools who:

S4.8.2.1 are completing secondary studies in 2011;

S4.8.2.2 have been recommended to the scheme by their school Principal;

S4.8.2.3 complete and lodge an official application;

S4.8.2.4 successfully interview for the program;

S4.8.2.5 apply for the Bachelor of Commerce through UAC; and

S4.8.2.6 achieve an ATAR of 80 or higher.

S4.8.3 Applicants not satisfying the criteria listed under S4.8.2 are ineligible for the scheme.

S4.8.4 The Business School will report on the progress of the scheme, to the Admissions Sub Committee, following the conclusion of first semester 2012.
