#### Objectives:

- Develop a sound understanding of the core principles of private international law in the major legal systems and of the tactical and strategic concerns in international litigation.
- Ability to advise clients on exposure risks for businesses with assets in multiple jurisdictions.

#### Content:

- The unit examines, from a comparative perspective, questions of domestic courts' jurisdiction over foreign parties, international conventions regulating such jurisdiction, and the recognition and enforcement of judgements against assets, across the main world legal systems. This will include European continental states, the UK and Commonwealth (Australia, Canada etc) and the USA. Particular attention will also be given to internet jurisdiction, worldwide freezing orders, and international commercial arbitration.

#### Assessment:

#### Legal Professional Development (LPD)

You can enrol in this unit on an LPD basis. Continuing Legal Education is a requirement of the Law Society of New South Wales. Practising solicitors are required to obtain

10 units of MCLE annually in order to maintain registration as a legal practitioner. Continuing Professional Development is also a requirement of the New South Wales Bar Association. Barristers are required to accrue 10 points each practising certificate year. Seminars, courses and units of study offered under Sydney Law School's LPD Program meet the necessary requirements of both the Law Society of New South Wales and the New South Wales Bar Association in relation to their individual members.

#### Single Unit Enrolment

You can enrol in this subject on a single unit or non-award basis if you do not wish to commit to a Masters or Graduate Diploma. You can continue to add units via this method and, provided you meet the relevant requirements, you can also qualify for a Graduate Diploma or Masters if you so wish.

#### Cross-Institutional Study

Candidates in other faculties at the University of Sydney or at other universities can enrol in this unit, subject to approval by the Associate Dean (Postgraduate Coursework) and their home institution.
