

The A M Taylor Scholarship in Orthopaedic and Traumatic Surgery
Terms & Conditions of Award

Established in 2008 by the estate of the late Beatrice Mary Taylor (AM Taylor Fund) to enable students in Stage 3 of the Medical Program to undertake an elective term in Orthopaedic and Traumatic Surgery.

The scholarship is awarded under the following conditions:

1. The name of the scholarship will be the A M Taylor Scholarship in Orthopaedic and Traumatic Surgery.
2. The scholarships will be awarded by the Dean of Sydney Medical School on the recommendation of the A M Taylor Scholarship Committee (chaired by the Sydney Medical School Head of Department of Orthopaedics & Traumatic Surgery) to Australian citizens or Australian permanent residents approved to undertake an elective term in Stage 3 of the Medical Program.
3. Applicants will be assessed on overall academic merit as well as the quality of the application and its relevance to orthopaedic and trauma surgery.
4. Successful recipients will undertake supervised clinical attachments (eight weeks, with possible extension of a further three weeks) in approved academic orthopaedic units in Australia and overseas. Under certain circumstances, it may be possible for two students to attend the same unit.
5. Travel insurance will be covered by the University of Sydney. All other expenses must be met by the student.
6. The scholarships are intended to cover return economy airfares and a per-diem allowance (varying with location).
7. The scholarships may be taken in conjunction with other scholarships currently held by the applicants, excluding other elective term scholarships.
8. The recipient may be required to refund all or part of the scholarship if he/she fails to complete the elective term as detailed in the application.
9. On completion of the Elective, students are required to submit an 'Elective Term Report' of between 1,500 and 5,000 words, as detailed on the Elective application.
10. A number of scholarships may be offered each year, dependent on the quality of applicants and availability of funds.
11. Sydney Medical School has the discretion not to award the scholarship if there is no applicant of sufficient merit.
