

# FACULTY OF LAW - HONORARY TITLES PROVISIONS 2013

- (1) These provisions set out the requirements for recommending a candidate to be conferred a title as per the <u>Honorary Titles Policy 2013</u> and <u>Honorary Titles</u> <u>Procedures 2013</u>. They apply in addition to the provisions set out in those documents.
- (2) All requests should be discussed at the appropriate cluster group meeting (and noted as such), prior to the nomination. If there is no appropriate cluster group, requests should be discussed with the Pro Dean.
- (3) Consideration should also be given to a nominee's involvement: for example, a lunchtime seminar, Continuing Professional Development (CPD) seminar, published research or supervision of a research student. It is expected that the nominator will take an active role to involve the title holder within the faculty.
- (4) Once considered by the cluster group or Pro Dean, the nominator must complete a *Checklist* as set out in the Schedule to these provisions, and forward all relevant documentation to the Faculty Administrative Officer. - (5) The following criteria for nomination apply in addition to those set out in the *Honorary Titles Policy* 2013.,

#### (6) Adjunct Professor

- (a) A person may be nominated as an Adjunct Professor if:
  - they are a judge; QC; SC; partner (for at least 5 years) in a major law firm; or equivalent standing for people who do not fall into these groups such as senior public servants etc, and
  - (ii) teaching the whole (or in exceptional cases, a part) of a unit of study, and on an on-going basis.
- (b) The Dean will approve appointments less than 12 months only in cases where it is known and expected that the arrangement would not exceed 12 months. All other nominations should be recommended to the Senate Chair Appointments Committee for a 3 year appointment.

#### (7) Adjunct Lecturer, Senior Lecturer, Associate Professor

These titles may be used for those that do not meet all the criteria for the title of Adjunct Professor but who contribute in a similar way to the faculty. In most cases, the title *Adjunct Lecturer* is appropriate.

#### (8) Research Affiliates

In rare cases, it is possible for a person to be appointed an Adjunct even if not involved in the teaching program in a substantial way. Consideration should also be given to the appointment of such individuals as *Research Affiliates* (refer <u>Affiliates Policy</u>). These can be considered on a case by case basis.

# (9) Visiting titles

(a) Visiting academics (either from overseas or within Australia) who are visiting the faculty for the purpose of teaching on an ad hoc or occasional basis, such as teaching a postgraduate intensive, may be given a "visiting" title.



- (b) The title of *Visiting Professor* may be conferred on a Professor from another university, or a person with equivalent status. The Visiting Professor would be expected to make a significant contribution to any or all of the teaching, research, scholarship or creative work of the University.
- (c) The title of *Visiting Scholar* may be conferred on an academic visitor with whom it is desirable that the School have a formal association, on a short-term basis, without that person necessarily making a major contribution to the research, scholarship, creative work or teaching programs.
- (d) Apart from teaching, these titles may also be used for overseas and local occasional visitors who are otherwise making a significant contribution to the faculty, such as working on a joint ARC project, undertaking significant work or research in association with a Centre, or delivering a major lecture while visiting the faculty.
- (e) Visiting titles should be given for the period of the visit (eg. one month).

### (10) Honorary academic titles

This is generally for retired staff members – refer Honorary Titles Policy 2013.

#### (11) Emeritus Professor

This is generally for a retiring professor in recognition of sustained distinguished service – refer Honorary Titles Policy 2013.

#### (12) Affiliates

May be made for an individual who is not a conferred title holder and is contributing to the university research productivity or claims an affiliation – refer <a href="#">Affiliates</a>

# (13) Honorary Awards
