The key Natufian settlement of Wadi Hammeh 27 (12,000—12,500 cal BCE), located two kilometres north of ancient Pella, is one of the most spectacular sites of its kind, featuring the largest, most complex pre-Neolithic architectural complex discovered in the Middle East. The first part of this presentation recalls the events that led to the first series of excavations at Wadi Hammeh 27 under the aegis of the Pella project in

the 1980s. It then proceeds to summarize the results of the new La Trobe fieldwork seasons, held in Jordan in 2014 and 2015.

Dr Phillip Edwards holds a long-term research interest in the archaeology of the Jordan Valley, particularly in those stages leading to the appearance of earliest village life. He began archaeological fieldwork in Jordan in 1980, and in 1990, he moved to La Trobe University to lecture in archaeology,
