

## Exciting News Regarding the IH Cabin: from Dennis Schatz

#### **Some History:**

Two years ago, the University was considering getting rid of the IH Cabin in the Belanglo Forest. They thought there might be better University-operated facilities in the bush that could provide the kind of experience desired for IH residents when IH reopens. As the SUIHAA representative on IH Council, I was tasked with determining who was using the cabin and for how much of the year.

Fortunately, Faith Gamban-Sevilla, who was the IH Registrar right before the House closed, was still at the University and could provide information regarding the use of the cabin for the six years from 2015 through 2020. While IH residents used the cabin, there were three other high-level users of the cabin, some more than IH residents. These were the MacArthur Astronomical Society, plus two IH alumni: Iqbal Qureshi and Sean Kristoffersen. What Faith also conveyed is that Sean and Iqbal both offered to be caretakers of the cabin until IH reopened.

After I had conversations with Sean and Iqbal, and then with University staff, the University indicated its willingness to pursue a way for Iqbal and Sean to assume responsibility of the cabin. After significant conversations with the University, the Forestry Commission that provides the permit to use the land, and the

assistance of Craig Collie, IH Council Deputy Chair, we are now ready to convey exciting news.

#### The Exciting News:

Thanks to the University agreeing to cover the personal liability insurance for the cabin, the Forestry Commission issued a permit to Iqbal and Sean to be the caretakers of the cabin until IH reopens. Much progress has already been made, especially by Iqbal, to get the cabin ready for IH alumni to book stays at the cabin. Recent progress includes:

- New mattresses purchased and placed in the cabin
- Lawn mowed
- Cleaned and vacuumed inside, including both the bathroom sinks and showers
- Cleaned and wiped kitchen bench, microwave, kettle, fridge, and stove.
- Cleaned the toilets.
- Cleaned all the cobwebs from the front of the cabin.
- Fixed the outside wooden benches and made another one
- Old carpeting removed and new carpet to be installed in June
- Washed the front of the cabin and will then spraying soon to keep the insect and spiders away
- New doors for the toilets to be installed soon

### Booking Your Stay at the Cabin:

Anyone wanting to book a stay should email both Iqbal (<a href="mailto:iaqureshi@hotmail.com">iaqureshi@hotmail.com</a>) and Sean (<a href="mailto:seank@gmp.usyd.edu.au">seank@gmp.usyd.edu.au</a>) to express your interest. The cost is 2 nights for \$180 and 3 days for \$240. Alumni can book for family and friends, with the condition that on the booking form the alumnus puts their name as the hirer so the responsibility rests with the alumnus.

Finally, a BIG THANKS to Iqbal and Sean for taking on this caretaking responsibility, plus a thanks to Craig and staff members at the University that helped make the permit process possible.



## **IH Redevelopment**

### Redevelopment Update

You may have been reading about the challenges with university students finding affordable housing, both for international and Australian students. Since the last newsletter, the *Australian Universities Accord Final Report* was issued, which identified two key recommendations related to improved housing and services for international students.





Citing these recommendations, the SUIHAA Committee sent the message below to Vice Chancellor Scott and USyd Chancellor-elect Thodey indicating the value of a redeveloped IH in satisfying these recommendations and the importance of redeveloping IH as soon as possible:

From: Sydney University International House Alumni Association (SUIHAA)

SUIHAA represents more than 5000 alumni of the Sydney University International House from the years 1967 to 2020. The SUIHAA Leadership Committee members read with interest the recent *Australian Universities Accord Final Report*. We were especially interested to see these two recommendations:

Recommendation 22 – A strengthened international education system, with higher quality courses that are better aligned with Australia's skills and migration needs, more diversified international student source markets, more international students studying in regional campuses, and improved alumni engagement programs and research networks.

Recommendation 23 – Ensure trust and integrity within the Australian student visa system is maintained and ensure providers have appropriate risk management strategies for international education including managing demand volatility and access and availability of affordable student housing.

IH Redevelopment update

The importance of providing appropriate and affordable international students housing has not only been recognized in the *Accord* report, but in many other publications (e.g. *Australian Financial Review*, 11 March 2024). It is clearly a high priority need for the University.

SUIHAA suggests this need for international student housing is a reason for the University to rethink the priority of International House redevelopment. International House is a recognised success story of the University: fifty plus years of running a harmonious, multicultural co-ed residence and international program, with highly satisfied residents and alumni who attest loyally to the value of the IH model to their lives.

We appreciate the desire to systematically consider what should happen with the area between the Wentworth Building and the Seymour Centre. At the same time, we believe that the need for international student housing, and the conditions of the International House Trust Deed that mandates an international house on the current site, should encourage the University to plan without delay for a redeveloped International House.

An International House serving 500 to 600 residents with a common dining area and appropriate program spaces, like other international houses around the world, can serve as a nexus for

building relationships between Australians and international students. In addition, if the area on the corner of City Road and Cleveland Street is thoughtfully developed, other services for the University's international students, such as counselling and English language help, can also be effectively provided, making this part of campus a hub for international students.

The alumni of International House are convinced that the redeveloped International House will be a vital addition to the University's services for international students and enhance its reputation as a top provider of university education. The alumni and are ready to assist the University in any way to hasten the re-establishment of International House on the current site. IH Redevelopment update More recently, the Australian government proposed the possibility of capping the number of international students at each university, citing the lack of appropriate housing as a significant reason for this proposal – see the recent article in The Guardian at <u>Australia's international student cap has been called 'chaotic' and 'populist' – so how would it work? | Australia news | The Guardian</u>. We followed up with USyd staff to see if this new issue will result in a quicker redevelopment of IH.

We should learn more when the University's Project Control Group (PCG) for IH meets in July where they will discuss the implication of these two reports with regards to IH redevelopment. The PCG will also get an update on the progress of the Wentworth Redevelopment as the first stage of the City Road Redevelopment Masterplan. IH Council leaders Greg Houseman and Craig Collie are on the PCG. They are both IH alumni, so the interests of IH will be represented.

We will be sure to keep you updated in future SUIHAA Newsletters with any new developments.

Personal Perspective from IH Alumni (1971–1973) Birute Don (formerly Leveris) Regarding the Accord Report - Renovation, rehabilitation, rebuild or sale?

The Australian Universities Accord Final Report released in February 2024 has 47 recommendations for Government consideration and aims to create a long-term reform plan for the higher education sector to meet Australia's future skills needs. Recommendation 23 clearly places responsibility on providers, like the University of Sydney, to have "appropriate risk management strategies for international education including managing demand volatility and access and availability of affordable student housing."

International House at the University of Sydney closed in December 2020 and it has been vacant for over 3 years. Its future is even more uncertain given there is no approved funding or plans approved for the redevelopment of the site or buildings.

In March 2024, the SUIHAA Committee sent an excellent message to the University of Sydney urging it to "hasten the re-establishment of International House on the current site." SUIHAA and others have offered to help the University to "rethink the priority of International House redevelopment." Given the current labour shortages and higher construction costs, it would be quicker and cheaper to renovate International House rather than totally demolish it.

More recently, in May 2024, the Australian Government announced a budget focussed on the need to increase the supply of housing and related it to migration and the need to place a cap on international students. It also announced its intentions to force universities to increase their supply of student accommodation for domestic and international students.

The Education Services for Overseas Students Amendment (Quality and Integrity) Bill 2024 if passed, could place a cap on international students. This cap may be able to be exceeded if additional student accommodation is provided by a university. A draft International Education and Skills Strategic-Framework for international education shows that the government intends to allow "managed growth" of overseas student numbers when enrolment caps are applied from 2025. Since the University of Sydney has recently relied on international students for nearly 50% of its income it needs to give higher priority to re-establishing International House as soon as possible.

In April 2024, various Australian newspapers had articles on the SIRIUS building in the Rocks area of Sydney. It is a stunning building with magnificent views of Sydney harbour. The property was previously owned by the NSW Government and used for public social housing for about 50 years.

The current NSW Minister for Housing, Rose Jackson, considers "it was an outrageous transaction to sell the Sirius building but at least it was not demolished."

To address the shortage of rental accommodation, the City of Sydney has released for comment a Local Environment Plan to encourage build-to-rent and co-living dwellings as the solution to increasing the housing supply. Council has also suggested the conversion of vacant investment properties, especially offices into residential use. It is less difficult, less complex and less risky to convert former residential buildings, like International House, into residential use.

International House is on NSW Government land since the University of Sydney is a public university. The building has the same "brutalist" or modern architecture as the Sirius building. It was also extremely well built and structurally sound since leading builders and architects built it. International House, like Sirius, was built to last. And that's unlike the housing we've seen go up in the past 10 years with the serious defects making them uninhabitable or unsafe (e.g., Mascot Towers which is still vacant and various buildings with combustible cladding).

Demolition of IH would be a negation of the work that went into establishing International House mainly by the Rotarians. International Houses around the world have been successful in fostering the ideal 'That brotherhood and sisterhood may prevail'. Redeveloping International House on its current campus site would reduce the pressing need for student accommodation while at the same time testifying to the importance of bridging cultural and national differences. Sydney University is less complete without International House. This is especially important given the wars in Ukraine and Gaza and the recent protests at universities about these inhumane wars.

Hopefully, the University of Sydney will reconsider its priorities and be able to obtain funding for the re-establishment of International House on its current site and keep the majority of the building intact. Renovation or rehabilitation is preferable to demolition and rebuild on so many factors; environmental; economic; socially among others. I am reminded of my mother's words of wisdom, which have often been quoted by others:

- "Waste not want not"
- "Use it or lose it"
- Que sera sera (whatever will be will be)
- Money isn't everything


