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Professor Gregory Fox

Director (Interim), Sydney Southeast Asia Centre Professor of Respiratory Medicine NHMRC Leadership Professorial Fellow, Faculty of Medicine and Health Research Leader, Woolcock Institute of Medical Research Respiratory Physician, Royal Prince Alfred Hospital, Camperdown Area Director of TB Services, Sydney Local Health District

Greg Fox is interim Director of the Sydney Southeast Asia Centre at the University of Sydney, and Professor of Respiratory Medicine. He has led clinical trials and research relating to infectious diseases and chronic disease for the University of Sydney in Vietnam for over a decade. His research, in combination with guideline development work for the World Health Organisation, have contributed to changes in global TB policies and clinical practice. Professor Fox works clinically as a Respiratory Physician at Sydney's Royal Prince Alfred Hospital.

Tiho Ancev is a Professor of Agricultural and Resource Economics. He holds degrees from Saints Cyril and Methodius University (Bachelor), University of Iceland (Master) and Oklahoma State University (PhD). His main research areas are agricultural, environmental, natural resource and energy economics. Tiho's main contributions have been in water economics and policy, economics of energy, economics of air pollution and climate change policies, and economics of precision agriculture and agricultural input use. He has published widely on these topics in top international peer reviewed journals. Tiho has led and contributed to national and international research projects in these research areas. He is currently the Managing Editor-in-Chief of the Australian Journal of Agricultural and Resource Economics.

Dr Natali Pearson is a Senior Lecturer in the Discipline of Archaeology and Curriculum Coordinator at the Sydney Southeast Asia Centre (SSEAC).



Her research focuses on maritime heritage in Southeast Asia, with her recent book *Belitung: The Afterlives of a Shipwreck*, published by the University of Hawaii Press and NUS Press. Natali's DECRA Fellowship, commencing in 2025, will focus on maritime heritage diplomacy and sunken warships in Malaysia, Indonesia, and Timor-Leste.

Pacific examines how environmental and humanitarian histories have impacted contemporary issues related to the climate crisis and the forced displacement of asylum seekers and refugees. Her edited books include Crafting Enlightenment: Artisanal Histories and Transnational Networks (2021); Drawing Climate: Visualising Invisible Elements of Architecture (2021); Land Air Sea: Architecture and Environment in the Early Modern Era (2023). Her current monograph Corporate Ethics and the Architecture of Asylum addresses how multinational contractors who build detention centres in offshore sites are complicit in violating human rights.

Dr Kerrie Wiley

Sydney Horizon Fellow, Sydney School of Public Health, Faculty of Medicine and Health



Dr Kerrie Wiley originally trained as a clinical microbiologist and worked in research and development / technical services for

several pharmaceutical companies for over a decade before she decided to retrain in clinical epidemiology and public health.

Along the way, she discovered qualitative research and fell in love with how it could provide insights into complex public health problems. She left her clinical life behind and became a leading social scientist who is using mixed methods research to tackle the issue of vaccination uptake.

While she's still fascinated in the epidemiology of disease, Dr Wiley believes it cannot be addressed without also using social science to understand the influence of human behaviour. Social science explains why people make the choices they do, what motivates them to act, and how barriers can be removed.

In the field of vaccination, her methods provide insights into how to improve access, how to normalise vaccination, and how to address vaccine hesitancy.

Her Sydney Horizon project aims further understanding of the enablers and barriers to vaccination of both humans and animals, with the aim of developing new approaches to increase vaccine uptake in agriculture as well as human health. The project will look at human and animal vaccination in Australia and beyond. Importantly, it also aims to establish best practice for embedding social science in public and animal health decision making.

Becoming Outstanding Partners Enhancing our Academic Engagement in Southeast Asia

Associate Professor Susan Banki

Senior Lecturer in Human Rights, School of Social and Political Sciences, Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences

Susan Banki studies the political, institutional, and social contexts that explain the roots of and solutions to human rights violations

and social justice abuses. In particular, she is interested in the ways that questions of sovereignty, transnationalism, and citizenship/membership have shaped our responses to conflict and injustice. Susan has conducted extensive field research across the Asia-Pacific on refugee/migrant protection, statelessness and border control. Her current projects include: the work of diasporas in responding to acute crises at home; humanitarian responses to complex displacement contexts; and the role of creative arts in transnational activism.

Professor Budiman Minasny


Professor in Soil-Landscape Modelling, School of Life and Environmental Sciences, Faculty of Science

Associate Professor Sonia Liu

School of Life and Environmental Sciences, Poultry Research Foundation, Faculty of Science

Associate Professor Sonia Liu is a poultry nutritionist from the University of Sydney, Australia. Her research focuses on reduced

protein diets, digestive dynamics of nutrients, amino acid nutrition in layers and broilers and feed grain quality.

Sonia has more than 100 peer-reviewed scientific publications. She is the recipient of 2015 Australian Department of Agriculture, Science and Innovation Award for Young People, 2018 The Australia Awards - Endeavour Research Fellowship and 2019 Australia Research Council Discovery Early Career Researcher Award. She is currently an Australia Research Council Industry Fellow and College of Experts member.

Associate Professor Minh-Ngoc Tran

Discipline of Business Analytics, University of Business School

Minh-Ngoc holds a BSc and MSc in Mathematics from Vietnam National University, Hanoi, and a PhD in Statistics from the National University of Singapore. His research spans statistical

methodologies and applications, with a focus on advancing Data Science in Southeast Asia.

Minh-Ngoc's work is internationally recognised and published in leading journals and conferences. He has secured nearly \$2 million in research funding, including three ARC grants. Professor Michael J Dibley

Faculty of Science

Professor Michael Dibley is an internationally recognised epidemiologist with over 30 years of research experience. He has been a Professor of Global Public Health Nutrition at the

University of Sydney since 2015. His involvement with Indonesia began in the 1970s as a medical student. He worked in Indonesia for a decade in the 1990s, and from 2015 to 2020, he collaborated on a nutrition BCC trial in East Java to improve child growth. In 2023, he hosted 15 Australian Award Fellows from Indonesia to analyse trends and determinants in child undernutrition. Recently, he has led efforts to establish an MoU between the University of Sydney and the Indonesian Ministry of Development Planning (BAPPENAS).

Associate Professor Alejandro Montoya

Director of Environmental Engineering, School of Chemical and Biomolecular Engineering, Faculty of Engineering

Dr Alejandro Montoya is an accomplished associate professor at the School of Chemical Engineering at the University of Sydney.

His research focuses on developing compact, environmentally friendly, and energy-efficient chemical reactors. His work addresses solutions for waste and mineral valorisation, biomass conversion, carbon material utilisation, plastic reprocessing, advanced wastewater treatment, and nanomaterial applications. Dr Montoya has secured approximately AU\$10M in funding from diverse sources, often as lead chief investigator, establishing robust research streams in biofuels, critical minerals, and wastewater treatment.

He developed the new Environmental Engineering Honours degree at the University of Sydney, welcoming its first cohort in 2025. He currently leads the degree focusing on promotion, curriculum alignment, and industry engagement.

Dr Archita Mishra

Sydney Horizon Fellow, Senior Lecturer in Infection, Immunology and Inflammation, School of Medical Sciences, Faculty of Medicine and Health

Dr Archita Mishra is a Sydney Horizon Fellow at the University of

Sydney. Dr Mishra leads the 'Early-life Microbiome and Immunity' lab and her research is focused on understanding the role of gut-microbes in immune development. Dr Mishra's seminal work has shown the presence of microbes during human fetal development and their impact on immune-memory.

Dr Mishra completed her PhD from Indian Institute of Sciences and then did her post-doctoral work at Singapore Immunology Network, ASTAR.

Dr Mishra has received highly prestigious fellowships like the Human Frontier Science Program (HFSP), INSA Medal for Young Scientist, and the Rain BrightSpark Fellow Award.

Dr Mishra is part of global consortiums like Human Cell Atlas where she heads the Global Microbiome initiative and her research findings have been published in leading journals like Cell, *Immunity*, *The Lancet*, etc.
