About this guide

This unit selection guide is designed for **first year Secondary Education** students (commencing from 2022 onwards) in the Sydney School of Education and Social Work at the University of Sydney. If you are entering Years 2 to 5 of your candidature, you are considered a "continuing student" and you must use a different guide. Please <u>email your Program Support team</u> member about this immediately.

You really don't need to read all the pages in this document; however, you should read <u>pages 1 to 4</u> carefully, as well as the <u>pages referring to your</u> **TWO teaching areas.**

The last part of this document has a very interesting selection of pages that you might want to look at, after you have enrolled for your units of study in Year 1.

Please <u>email your Program Director</u>, or Program Support Manager, if you have questions about the units in your first year.

University Terminologies

This guide will use terms that you must remember, as your understanding of them will have an impact on your progression and unit of study selections.

Most units of study at this University are worth 6 credit points (cp). A **major** refers to a specific collection of 48cp, while a **minor** is a specific collection of 36cp. The collections are found in the Online Handbooks.

Most **second teaching areas** are worth 24cp, with a maximum of 12cp of 1000-level units. You have the option of expanding this to a minor, under specific conditions.

SSESW degrees can only be done on campus, so remote learning is not a possibility.

We expect all students to adhere to the <u>Faculty's 90% attendance rule</u>.

A few TIPS to remember

Regardless of your teaching area, there are a couple of tips you should always remember when choosing your subjects in your first year.

- TIP #1: Your first teaching area MUST be a minor, at least. A minor is the minimum for a first teaching area. It is your call if you want to expand that to a major. For students in the BEd/BAS, the first teaching area must be a major.
- TIP #2: You need to make sure that the first year units you take will lead to your second year units. This unit selection guide has been designed with this in mind, so if the unit you want is not listed here, there is most likely a very good reason for it. If lost, always refer to the University Online Handbooks.
- TIP #3: Your units of study must always align with accreditation. During enrolment, you must always refer to the unit selection guide to insure that what

you are enrolling in will not "go to waste". It is possible to graduate from this degree and **not** be eligible to teach, so you must be very careful in your selection. If the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) is not going to accept your unit, there is no reason why you should take it.

- TIP #4: You have to have a second teaching area. All teachers in the state of NSW need to have two teaching areas. While there are a few exceptions to this, all of you need to plan for two teaching areas.
- TIP #5: Choose units carefully. The units you choose must have the code \$1C or \$2C. Do not choose \$1CIJA or any combination similar to that unless you've already spoken to us about it.

A few MORE TIPS to remember

TIP #6 Please remember that you should choose two first year subjects for each teaching area.

Technically, you can enrol in a maximum of 18cp (3 subjects) for one teaching area, but we **discourage** this. For example, if you want to be an English teacher, you have several ENGL1XXX units to choose from; that does <u>not</u> mean you can choose five ENGL1XXX units in your first year.

TIP #7 Consider enrolling in a potential alternative teaching area. Life sometimes sends curve balls and it's best to be prepared for them.

In **Sample #1**, Pat wants to teach Drama (first teaching area/minor) and Business Studies (second teaching area), and has enrolled in the units above. Because he is not sure that he can do well in accounting, he has decided to enrol in Geography as well. This means that, if he fails in *BUSS1030 Accounting, Business and Society* but still does well in *GEOS1001 Earth, Environment and Society*, he'd still be generally on track with the degree by swapping second teaching areas. He would need to overload, or enrol in Summer School later on, to catch up on that failed unit.

TIP #8 Changing your units. It is <u>absolutely acceptable</u> to swap units until the Friday before classes start in Week 1. However, it is harder to drop units in this degree, especially if the units pertain to your teaching areas. In the rare event that you are given permission to drop a unit, please note this must be done before the census date, so that you can avoid academic and financial penalty.

Aboriginal Studies

If you want to Aboriginal Studies to be your first or second teaching area, you have to enrol in *INDG1001 Intro to Indigenous Cultures*, and *INDG1002 Introduction to Indigenous History*.

Aboriginal Studies is slowly growing in popularity in high schools, and we do encourage students to consider it as a teaching area.

We would also recommend that you use your elective space to study other topics within the HSIE space, such as Business Studies (WORK1003 or WORK1004), History, Geography, Legal Studies, or Economics (ECOP or ECON).



Ancient History

It is a requirement by NESA for Ancient History teachers to have also done one Archaeology unit on top of your Ancient History units. If Ancient History is your minor/first teaching area, you must enrol in **one ARCO1XXX** unit <u>in your elective space</u>, or choose a 2000– or 3000– level ARCO unit further down the track.

Because Ancient History teachers are also required by NESA to have units in Modern History, it is recommended that you enrol in HSTY as back-up unit (see **TIP #6** on page 2) – but if you wish to have a different back-up teaching area, that is fine too. You can always do an HSTY elective next year. **However, you cannot have Modern History AND Ancient History as your two teaching areas.**

In **Sample #3**, Kayla retains the option of swapping Ancient History with Modern History as a major/first teaching area. However, she will need to do one ARCO 2000- or 3000-level unit in later years. In **Sample #4**, Kayla cements her decision to have Ancient History and English as her two teaching areas. She will not need to do an ARCO or HSTY unit later on.



Drama

If you want to be a Drama teacher, you need to do specific units in Theatre and Performance Studies. In your first year, you have to enrol in *PRFM1601 Making Theatre (CORE)*, and *PRFM1602 Dangerous Performances* or *PRFM1603 Placemaking and Performance* (not both).

Economics (as Political Economy)

If you want to be an Economics high school teacher, you HAVE TO enrol in ECOP units (Political Economy), <u>not</u> ECON (Economics). You can take ECON units as elective units, but that means you forfeit a back-up teaching area, which is not really advisable – however, at the end of the day, this is up to you. In order to be accredited to teach Economics, you HAVE TO enrol in *ECOP1001 Economics as a Social Science* and *ECOP1003 International Economy and Finance*.

SPECIAL NOTE

Because Business Studies and Economics share Stage 4 and Stage 5 syllabi, it is not possible for you to take both Business Studies AND Economics (as Political Economy) as your first and second teaching areas

English

English has the most number of first year units within the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences. However, you should only do 12cp (2 ENGL1XXX units) in your first year, with **ENGL1017 as a core unit**. If you really, *really* want to, you can do 18cp (3 ENGL1XXX units) but that means you no longer have a back-up teaching area (see **TIP #6** on page 2), which we never recommend.

In our accreditation with NESA, Jewish Studies is considered a special language unit. To prepare for this, and to ensure that you get accreditation with NESA, it is important that you enrol in Hebrew language units in <u>your second and third year</u>.

Sample #13 is what we call a "double-method" language enrolment.

In the example above, Lorenzo asked for a test with the *Department of Korean Studies*. Because he did well in the language test, the academic wanted to place him in a higher level of Korean language. Because *KRNS3622* is the highest language level, he must get a language proficiency certificate in order to get accreditation.

Because he starts at the Introductory Level in Italian, he has decided to do a minor in both areas.

This is another example of a "double-method" language enrolment.

In **Sample #14**, Jo* took a proficiency test with the *Department of Spanish and Latin American Studies*, **and** the *Department of Chinese Studies*. Because they are a near-native-level speaker of both Spanish and Chinese, both departments wanted to place them in the highest level of Spanish and Chinese. Because of this, Jo must get the language proficiency certificate for both languages for accreditation.

It is **very common** for Year 1 LOTE students to start with an advanced unit of study, especially if they are native speakers, strong heritage speakers or did exceptionally well in their HSC. If you think this is your situation, you need to contact the relevant SLC office to book a language test **immediately**, so that an academic can assess where you are at, and if necessary, give you the language proficiency certificate.

Modern History

You must enrol in HSTY1001 if you are doing a <u>major or a minor in Modern</u> <u>History</u>—the other HSTY1XXX unit can be anything. If you are only aiming for a second teaching area (24cp), you can mix and match any which way you want – the core unit truly does not matter (although it is a good unit).

Just remember that, for accreditation reasons, Modern History teachers must also enrol in *at least* one Ancient History unit. It is recommended that you enrol in Ancient History back-up units (see **TIP #6** on page 2) – but if you wish to have a different back-up teaching area, that is fine too. You can always take an ANHS unit later on. <u>However, you cannot have Modern History AND Ancient History as your two teaching areas.</u>


Also for accreditation, one of your Modern History units must be Australian history, we have used HSTY1089 Australia Now! In the example, but there are also units focused on Australian History at 2000 and 3000-level.

In **Sample #16**, Jonas retains the option of swapping Modern History to Ancient History as a minor/first teaching area. With his enrolment, it is perfectly acceptable to have two History units in Semester 2, as long as he enrols in two English units in the first semester, to balance things out. If he chooses to stick to Modern History as a first teaching area, he will not need to do another Ancient History unit in later years.

For a second teaching area, you need to enrol in *BUSS1030 Accounting, Business and Society* (Sem 1 or 2), and either *WORK1003 Foundations of Work and Employment* (Sem 1), or *WORK1004 Foundations of Management* (Sem 2) - NOT BOTH.

EAL/D

Teaching English as an Additional Language or Dialect (EAL/D) is fairly popular, because it is a versatile teaching area aimed to assist high school students from non-English speaking backgrounds in developing their English language skills. You can use these skills not only in the high school classroom, but also in adult learning centres where demand would be fairly high, due to the booming migrant population in Australia.

In order to get accreditation to teach EAL/D, you need to take units from the Linguistics (LNGS) Handbook.

Accreditation Requirements for Double Science: Biology, Chemistry and Physics (BCP)

In order to get accreditation to teach Biology, Chemistry and Physics, NESA requires students to have a minor (as a minimum) in that respective teaching area. The only exception to this is if you decide to teach **Double Science** - that is, two out of the three Science teaching areas listed on this page.

For those interested in **Double Science**, please refer to the tables below.

Biology as a first teaching area (major)

Chemistry or Physics can be a second teaching area (24cp)

Biology as a first teaching area (**minor**)

Chemistry or Physics must be (at least) at 30cp, with one unit at 3000-level. Best to have a minor.

Chemistry as a first teaching area (major)

Biology or Physics must be a second teaching area (24cp).

Chemistry as a first teaching area (minor)

Biology or Physics can be a second teaching area (24cp) or a minor.

Physics as a first teaching area (major)

Biology or Chemistry must be a second teaching area (24cp).

Physics as a first teaching area (minor)

Biology or Chemistry can be a second teaching area (24cp) or a minor.

Mathematics does not count as a Science teaching area within NESA accreditation. Students who take Maths as a teaching area must complete a Biology or Chemistry or Physics minor.



LANTITE

The Literacy and Numeracy Test for Initial Teacher Education Students (LANTITE) is a federally mandated test for all students enrolled in primary or high school teacher education degrees. No matter what state or territory you aim to teach in Australia, you are required to pass the two test components, literacy and numeracy.

At the University of Sydney, you are expected to pass both LANTITE components within the first year of your degree. You will not be allowed to enrol in your final placement unit, without meeting the requirements of the LANTITE.

For Year 1students

You need to enrol in *EDLN2000 LANTITE*—in either semester. This zero-credit point unit has no impact on your timetable and your enrolment fees. Its main purpose is to help us track your progress in terms of completing both LANTITE components.

If you pass both LANTITE tests either during or after the semester of enrolment for EDLN2000, you will get an automatic mark of *SR* (*Satisfied Requirements*) against that unit.

If you do not pass both LANTITE tests during the semester of enrolment for EDLN2000, you will receive an automatic mark of *RI (Result Incomplete)*, which can remain your mark until the end of your penultimate year.

If you do not pass both LANTITE tests by the second semester of your penultimate year, you will receive a mark of **AF** (**Absent Fail**) for this unit and the completion of your final year may be delayed.


FAQs

1. I want to study units that do not relate to my teaching areas. Can I do that?

You only have 12cp to do so. We do not encourage you to prioritise interest subjects as your enrolment should align with teaching areas first.

2. Why is my unit selection so strict? My friends in other degrees can do whatever they want.

Unlike other students in most University degrees, Education students are required to align with NSW Education Standard Authority (NESA) rules. NESA will check your transcript at the end of your degree and you will only be given accreditation to teach if your units align with their requirements.



In the four-year degree, you are only required to have a major in Education Studies. The second major is optional and we strongly recommend that you talk to a Program Support team member first if a double major is what you would like.

4. Can I do this degree part-time?

This degree can be done full-time or part-time but please be aware that you can only progress in your degree if you have completed units for the previous year.

5. Can I go on Exchange in this degree?

You can go on Exchange ideally in Sem 1 Year 2. Any other time and it may delay your graduation in this degree. The University website has an entire section for going on Exchange.

Speak to your Program Support team member if you want more advice.

6. What is the LANTITE? When do I have to do it?


The LANTITE is a two-part exam which <u>all</u> NESA-accredited Education students must complete. For more information about this, <u>click on this link</u>. You have to complete both test components by the end of the second semester of your second year. You can take it now if you want to—there is no "expiry date" once you've passed both components. You can enrol in EDLN2000 <u>next year</u> (not now).

7. Can I change my teaching areas?

Only up until a certain point, and only if you choose the right units in order to be accreditation at the end of your degree. Please see your Program Director, or a Program Support staff member in Education 307, if you have ANY questions and concerns about your unit of study selection.

8. What are the attendance rules for this degree?

Like all FASS degrees, we have a 90% attendance rule. Students must reach out to their unit of study coordinators if there are issues with attendance. Please note that this degree must be done on campus, so remote learning is not a possibility.
